#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Bunce School is a log building, constructed in 1888 in the mountains of rural Boulder County. With the Continental Divide as a backdrop, the schoolhouse is set just off Hwy 7 in a wooded area some four miles south of the small community of Allenspark.

The schoolhouse is constructed of broad axe hewn logs, square notched at the corners. The building, roughly 25' by 17', rests on stone rubble piers. The front entrance is in the west gable end with, as originally constructed, only a small stoop at the front door. Other bays include two windows on the north side and two on the south, all approximately 2' wide and 5' in height and spaced equidistant. All the bays have plain wood surrounds. The roof is covered by corrugated tin.

The interior consists of one open room, the walls and ceiling of which are now covered with a very closely corrugated sheet metal. (The date it was installed has not been established.) The flooring has been covered with vinyl tiles.

There are two other buildings on the property. They include a 1920s or '30s frame front gable garage with overhead track door, which sits to the north side of the schoolhouse, and a frame outhouse of early 1900s construction. The outhouse is located approximately 25' to the east of the garage and is a contributing building. The garage, in deteriorated condition and of no historic or architectural interest, is non-contributing.

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 $^{1}\mathrm{Over}$  the years a series of porches were built, some with simple roofs and wood railings. This evolved into a fully enclosed porch which was used for storage. The porch was removed in 1985 except for the flooring.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Bunce School is a well preserved example of the structures that served as educational facilities in the high mountain areas of Colorado in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. It is one of only two log schoolhouses left in Boulder County. As with similar facilities, "The Bunce" also served as a focal point for most of the community life of the surrounding mountain area.

The school dates to the early settlement period of Allenspark. Alonzo Allen, for whom the community is named, either homesteaded or "squatted" in the area in 1864. In 1896 George Mack homesteaded at a location nearly two miles west of Allen's original homesite, naming it the Allenspark Land and Townsite, which became today's community of Allenspark. Except for a brief period from about 1903 to 1912 during which there was a flurry of gold mining activity, the community has maintained a small population.

Bunce School was organized as Boulder County School District #49 on April 24, 1886. The school building was constructed in 1888 by V.H. "Dick" Rowley and J. H. Bunce. An exmayor of Louisville, Kentucky and an early settler in the area, Bunce served as president of the school district from 1894 to 1897. By 1893 the school had grown to 24 students and to 41 by 1896, serving mainly the vicinity of Allenspark. The school continued in operation until 1940 when the district was consolidated and a new school building was constructed in the community.

Although the building was no longer used as a school, the then owner of the property, L.B. Kelley, deeded the school and the land to the new school district #59 on July 26, 1954. Further consolidations occurred, and the School District transferred ownership of the property to the Allenspark Fire Protection District on February 25, 1969.

In the early years, school and community social life were closely intertwined. Bunce School functioned as a community center from its construction in 1888 until 1951, when a new gathering place, the St. Vrain Pow Wow Grounds, was acquired. Little use was made of the building after that date until the Fire District reopened it as an administration and recreation center for the volunteer fire fighters. In the 1970s the building was leased to the Colorado State Forestry Service as an operations center in its major effort to control pine beetle infestation. Several uses for the building are presently under consideration; however, under the terms of the deed, any use must be school or community-related by a governmental or non-profit organization.


