Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Constructed in 1924-25, the Lincoln Arms Apartments is a three-story brick building with a parapet roof, concrete foundation with a basement, and very modest Prairie School stylistic features. No significant alterations have been made to the building.

The Lincoln Arms is a simple rectangular building with its narrow end facing the street. The symmetrical facade consists of a center door flanked by one bay of Chicago-type windows on either side. The entrance is framed by two brick piers with geometric stucco panels and a larger stuccoed panel over the doorway. Those stuccoed panels are a modest reference to the Prairie School style. Across the top of the facade is a simple projecting cornice. The rear facade is also symmetrical, consisting of a central door flanked by a pair of projecting bays which house either an enclosed service porch or sunroom. The parapet roof slopes to the rear and the walls are capped with tile coping. There are no other buildings on the property.

The Lincoln Arms is an example of the double-loaded corridor type of apartment, which has a central hallway with apartments opening off either side. There are stairs and an outside door at each end of the hall.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Constructed in 1924-25, the Lincoln Arms Apartments is one of over 180 "urban apartments" built in Salt Lake City during the first three decades of the twentieth century, a period of unprecedented expansion and urbanization. Over 60 percent of those buildings are either listed or eligible for listing in the National Register. Urban apartments are significant under Criterion C as a distinct and important type of residential building in the city. Apartments are remarkably consistent with one another in terms of building plan, height, roof type, materials, and stylistic features. These and other characteristics mark them as a new and distinct type of early twentieth century residential building. Under Criterion A, urban apartments are significant for their association with the rapid urbanization of Salt Lake City during the 1890s-1930 period. The growth that took place during those decades spurred the construction of two opposing types of housing in the city: urban apartments and suburban homes. Suburban homes represent a rejection of urban conditions. Apartments, on the other hand, document the accommodation of builders and residents to the realities of crowded living conditions and high land values. They were a significant new housing option that emerged in response to the growth that transformed Salt Lake City into an urban center during the early twentieth century.

The building permit for the Lincoln Arms Apartments was issued on November 18, 1924, to N. Myrtle Bratt, who owned the property in conjunction with her husban Phillip T. Bratt. Mr. Bratt, a general contractor in the city, was listed as the builder. Estimated cost of the 32-unit building was \$42,000.

The Bratts sold the building to Katie R. Stevens in June 1926, soon after its completion. Subsequent owners included J.B. Arnovitz and James L. White (1931-32), who invested in several apartments in the city, J.H. and Elizabeth Angel (1932), who also owned other apartments, and National Building Loan Association (1932-37+).
