The Jackson Post Office was built in 1916 at the corner of Broadway and Hawk Streets in Jackson, Breathitt County, Kentucky. Breathitt County is located in east central Kentucky and is characterized by picturesque, mountainous terrain. The economy of the area has been traditionally linked to coal and lumber.

Designed by Oscar Wenderoth and built by the J. S. Rogers Construction Company, the 20,000 square foot building cost \$85,000.00. It housed the federal courthouse, Army Recruiting Station, county health board, and the post office. In recent years, the federal court offices have moved to Lexington and Pikeville, and the post office has relocated outside of town.

The Jackson Post Office is a three-story, rectangular building with a hip roof. The walls are a light brown brick with whitish sandstone trim. The eaves are wide and are ornamented with curved wooden brackets. On all of the facades, the third floor is separated from the first by a wide, fluted stone band.

The northeast, or front, facade has seven bays on the first floor. There are three arched doorways, flanked on each side by an arched window equal in size to the doorways and a smaller rectangular window with 8/8 glazing. On the windows and doors on the first floor, sandstone has been used as an accent for the keystones, sills, and wainscotting. Sandstone steps lead from the first floor of the building down to Broadway. The second floor is also seven bays, with rectangular windows identical to those found on the first floor in glazing, size and ornamentation. Four stone medallions symbolizing the state flank the central windows. The second story has twelve rectangular windows with 8/8 glazing. The windows on the third floor are smaller and squarer than those of the first and second floors.

The rear or southwest facade is five bays. Because of the slope of the terrain, the basement is exposed on the rear on the building fully revealing the stepped stone watertable which is obscured on all the other facades. Other than the basement entrance, there are no other doors on the rear facade. The first floor has three large three-part windows centrally located on the face. They are flanked to either side by the smaller rectangular windows also found on the front facade. On the second floor, directly above the three-part windows, are three large arched windows similar to those found flanking the doorways on the first floor of the front facade. The tops of the second floor windows extend into the third floor and are flanked to each side by a single, almost square window.

The side, or southwest and southeast, facades of the building are five bays, all originally windows. The windows on each floor correspond in size and detailing to the rectangular

windows of the first, second and third stories of the front and rear facades.

The first floor of the interior of the building contains the public lobby for the post office and the mail sorting area. It has a tile floor and black marble baseboards. There are transoms above the service desks. Granite steps lead to the second floor courtroom which has oak paneling, brass light fixtures, and marble and tile flooring. The steps to the third floor offices are slate.

On the southeast facade, there is a metal, three-story fire escape built in 1980. It is accessed through windows on the second and third floors which have been converted to doors. The metal doors and the fire escape have been painted a light brown to blend with the color of the brick on the building.

On the rear of the building is a modern loading dock.

The Jackson Post Office is significant under Criterion C as a sophisticated example of high style design in the local architectural context. The building's Renaissance Revival styling is a product of the mid-1910s, later in the development of Jackson's downtown. It is also significant under Criterion A in the themes of government and communication from its construction in 1914 until the close of the historic period in 1940. As a post office, the building was the county's primary and best representative of the federal government and the most important agent of local and extra-local communication.

Breathitt County was formed in 1839 with Jackson, originally known as Breathitt Town, named the county seat. Early travelers boated on the North Fork of the Kentucky River, which flowed through the town, as well as plied oxcart paths. For two decades after 1891, when the Kentucky Union Railroad made Jackson its railhead, the community prospered as a boom town. Trade in Jackson revolved around the region's rich coal and timber resources, as the population skyrocketed from 8,705 in 1890 to 17,540 in 1910.

Among the important business buildings arising during this period were the Jackson Deposit Bank (1900), First National Bank (1910), and the Hargis Commercial Bank (1912). The Ewen Hotel (1905) and Jefferson Hotel (1913) were added to numerous boarding houses. The Hippodrome, a movie theater, first opened in 1906. Other civic improvements included sidewalks, and street lights, as well as the Lexington Steam Laundry--all very unusual for Kentucky mountain towns.

On Halloween night in 1913, a fire on Broadway destroyed thirty-six buildings, including the post office. Its 1916 replacement provided space not only for the postal service, but additional federal agencies.

In 1984 the Kentucky Heritage Council, the state's preservation office, awarded a matching survey and planning grant to the Jackson Heritage Council to identify buildings significant to the town's history. Most of the buildings inventoried in the business district were built in the boom days. The majority are red brick structures with metal storefronts exhibiting local interpretations of the Italianate style. Pressed metal cornices with brackets, and elongated roundheaded windows with hood moldings and brick corbelling are common.

The Jackson Post Office is the largest and most elaborately detailed building in the community from the early 20th Century. It differs from other commercial or governmental buildings in its use of a light brown bricks and sandstone for keystones, watertable, window sills, and medallions. Because the Postal Service has vacated the structure, National Register listing is sought to aid in the building's preservation.
