DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The U.S. Forest Service Remount Depot consists of corrals and thirteen white frame buildings constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1934. A Cape Cod architectural style dominates: drop siding, shuttered windows, dormers, and gabled roofs shingled with green asphalt. The following feature comprise the complex. They have also been numbered on the enclosed base map.

1. The original entrance to the compound has been reconstructed and the two white sentry pylons repositioned.

2. The sheltered scales standing in front of the barn (feature 3) were used to weigh the mules and their loads.

3. The 39x90' barn has a gambrel type roof, allowing for hay storage, with two ventilation cupolas and weather vanes. There are sliding doors at each end of the main floors cement alley. Besides the stalls, the building has a room for grain storage that is lined with shelves for pack saddle storage. This equipment room is now a carpenter shop and the rest of the building is used for supply storage.

4. A loading ramp constructed of milled beams and soil.

5. The 16x30' stallion barn has sliding double doors at each end of the main floors alley. It also has a gambrel roof with two cupolas.

6. From the 18x30' saddle shop, workers supplied the entire Northern Region with pack saddles.

7. The 24x40' blacksmith shop was moved to its present location in 1938 and now serves as a maintenance shop.

8. During the fire season, four pack strings of ten animals each were always kept ready in the corrals within the grounds.

9. The garage was custom-built to accommodate the specially designed Kenworth stock trucks. The green, cab-over-engine vehicles had aluminum tiered stock racks on the back to hold a pack string of nine mules and a saddle horse. Their 450 horsepower motors were the largest gasoline engines used at the time. The 30x94' seven-stall garage contains a workshop, wood shed, toilet, shower room and bunks with space for fifty men in the loft.

10. The 24x80' classroom building was used for training sessions and meeting purposes and also housed a garage and truck maintenance shop. The interior has been remodeled for its present use as the District's engineering offices.

11. The current District Ranger's office, 30x38', was originally a bunkhouse. The interior has been remodeled for office use.

12. The cookhouse was originally 30x38' with a 15x15' mess hall added later. The original cooler remains in the basement but the building is used only as an office today.

13. The Remount Supervisor's dwelling (1200 square feet) has six rooms, a garage, and a basement. The only recorded modification to this building (the current District Ranger's residence) is insulation installation in 1974.

14. The original two-story 40x30' ranger station office building was converted to a four-bedroom residence with 30x7' porch in 1959.

15. The westernmost 40x30' residence was originally the District Forest Ranger dwelling. It has a 30x7' porch and had insulation installed in 1974.

16. Garage

17. The single-story foreman's dwelling (600 square feet) was built in 1938 one-third mile north of the complex. It has four rooms, full basement, front and back porch, and a recently installed sewer system. This building lies one third of a mile north of the building complex. For management purposes it is not included in the nomination at this time but will be nominated separately at a later date.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The U.S. Forest Service built and maintained its only Remount Depot between 1930 and 1954. It was modeled after U.S. Army Cavalry Remount Depots. Land for the Remount Depot was purchased in July 1930. The buildings were constructed between 1933 and 1935 by the Civilian Conservation Corps. At the peak of its operation the Remount Depot employed over 60 full-time people and maintained between 100 and 200 pack animals prepared for dispatch during the fire season. During the winter months the saddle shop and sign painting shop serviced the entire Northern Region while the blacksmith shop provided horse and mule shoes for Forest Service animals throughout the U.S.

The mission of the Remount Depot was to provide trained packers and pack strings to supply Forest Service firefighting crews in the Northern Rocky Mountain States. To meet this challenge the Forest Service bred its own horses and mules. Specially designed Kenworth trucks were used to transport fully loaded pack strings to fires at a moments notice. These mule teams were frequently dispatched to the Selway in Idaho, Central Montana, Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks and once to northern California.

By the 1950's, aerial firefighting techniques (i.e., smokejumpers and helicopters) had brought obsolescence to the pack strings. The Remount Depot became the Ninemile Ranger District for the Lolo National Forest in 1954. The complex still serves this function today.

The Ninemile Ranger station would be the only C.C.C. built and currently occupied site listed on the National Register of Historic Places in Region 1. Also this was the first training area for the U.S. Forest Service smokejumpers in theearly

1940's.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The southern boundary for the U. S. Forest remount depot begins at the junction of (Eastside) Ninemile valley road and remount road. From here it tuns west in a straight line along the North edge of (Eastside) Ninemile valley road 450 feet. The boundary then turns due north and runs in a straight line 360 feet. The boundary then turns N46° W and runs 480 feet along the backside of the corrals. 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A conscious effort has been made by Ninemile District Ranger's to maintain the historic integrity of the remount depot structures. As Forest Service reliance on livestock declined and the winter range acreage was closed, the usefulness of the Remount Depot faded. By 1954, the Ninemile Ranger District had absorbed the entire complex and the final 28,000 acres of pasture in the Flathead Valley had been (shut down). Structural modifications have been primarily restricted to building interiors. The original white frame, green-roofed exteriors have been kept the same, as well as the grounds of grass, red maple, aspen, apple, cottonwood and ponderosa pine trees.
