The Pasco Carnegie Library is a rectangular building with a high-ceilinged main floor and a daylight basement. It has a gable roof with parapets at the ends. The principal facade is on the west and features a projecting central bay, which also has a parapet. Two flights of stairs rise from the sidewalk to an intermediate landing and, inside the building, to the main level. The exterior surface of the building is stucco and the roof is U-shaped tiles, both of which are characteristic of Mission style.

#### a. History

The history of Pasco's Carnegie library began a few years after the city was founded when the city council applied for a grant in 1909. The grant was awarded in 1910 and the city council promptly acquired the property and passed the necessary ordinances. The library building was completed and opened its doors in 1911. Community support was strong, perhaps because establishment of a library would be a sign that the community was to be a permanent settlement. The building served the community until the early 1960's as a library. It then was used for various purposes, including a western store, but the city retained ownership. It was recently turned over to Franklin County for use as an historical museum

#### b. Evaluation of Significance

This building was an important part of the cultural and social life of Pasco and parts of Benton and Franklin counties. It was placed on the state register, but the state review board found it ineligible for the national register at its meeting on March 13, 1981 because it was not sufficiently important architecturally. The nomination presented to the board did not include the information that the architect, C. Lewis Wilson, designed two of the state's finest courthouses, those of Pacific and and Franklin counties.
