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Section 7, Description

The Roswell Butler Hard House is a large, two-story Italianate building, tee-shaped in plan, and constructed of red brick produced locally. The building, with low-pitched hip roof, is sited on an impressively landscaped lot in the town of Antioch, near the San Joaquin River. While there have been some alterations since the house was completed in 1869, overall the appearance is very close to the original.

Construction on the Hard House began in 1867. At the time it was the only dwelling made of the local hard red brick. The brick walls are load bearing. The brick itself is laid in common bond with a header course every six courses. The gray-white mortar appears to have been re-painted in the past.

The main elevation of the house features a three-bay wide main portion and a narrower two-bay wide side portion. Windows are tall, and double-hung, with two panes in the top sash and four panes in the lower. The small railings installed over the bottom half of the second story windows are original and match the ornamental iron fence and gate. The main entrance is off-center, topped with a small, modern overhang. Originally the house had an elaborate verandah supported with slender columns running across the full facade. It was removed in the 1920s. Ornament on the building is very spare, with lintels over the windows, and a bracketed wood cornice. The hipped roof is covered with diamond-shaped composition shingles. Sheet metal was used for the flashing, gutters, downspout and rainwater leaders. Two brick chimneys are found, one is in the main portion and one in the side portion.

At the rear is an addition, probably constructed in the 1920s. The addition is topped with a shed roof, surfaced with asphalt composition roll roofing. Also on the property is a cistern, dating to the early years of occupation. The cistern, which is in the back yard, provided a water source for the residents. The cistern is covered with a shallow dome of mortar. It was one of Antioch's few at that time and is now the only one known to exist.

The surrounding grounds show signs of some consideration and concern as to time and placement of the garden and flowers to benefit all the seasons. Ponderosa lemons, cedar trees, pepper

trees, a century plant and a variety of evergreens and plants still exist. A botanist from the Univeristy of California, Berkeley, inspected the yard and determined that many of the plantings date to the nineteenth century.

The interior of the house appears to be historic and intact and relatively unchanged from its original condition. The interior plaster surfaces of the building are typically flat and unornamental. This is not true for the central hall and two eastern rooms on the first floor. These areas have decorative plaster ceiling cornices and decorative cast plaster ceiling medallions. The floor and window casings are heavy moldings. Simple panels are located below the side and rear windows. The front windows, which extend to the floor, have the same heavy moldings and frames and are shuttered. The original wood trim is redwood, except for the oak stairs, ornamental oak newel and balusters, and the three oak fireplaces.

The ceilings are unusually high. The walls are thick, even the interior ones. All the lighting fixtures are original and were convered from gas in the 1920s. Wallpaper appropriate to the period covers most of the walls. On one wall of the southeast second story room there is a good view of the historic wallpaper underneath.

The contributing elements on the property are the house, historic fence and cistern.

#### Section 8, Significance

The Hard House is one of the most historic structures in the city of Antioch, as well as one of the few remaining links to Antioch's heritage. The building was the home of the first mayor of Antioch, Roswell Butler Hard, and also the first meeting place of the Board of Trustees in 1872. Begun in 1867, the Hard House is a fine example of graceful Italianate simplicity. It was found to be National Register eligible in the city's historic resources inventory conducted in 1988.

Roswell B. Hard was one of the early pioneers in Antioch. He carved out a place in history for his contributions to the growth

of Antioch with his civic and public life. Few elected officials have had that much responsibility in their position. Mr. Hard showed the caring, nurturing and dedication that marked his public life and growth of Antioch's early government.

Mr. Hard was born at Jericho, Vermont on August 29, 1829. He married Leonora Humphrey and they moved to California in 1852. An active Mason, Mr. Hard was a butcher and later a builder by trade, also a businessman and rancher. He was very active in the affairs of the area and was vice president of the Contra Costa Farmers' Club in 1870. He was influential in county politics and served as Contra Costa County Supervisor from 1866 to 1868. He was elected Sheriff in 1867. In 1868 the county courthouse and jail in Martinez was severely damaged by an earthquake. The County Board of Supervisors authorized Sheriff Hard to build a jail in Antioch and set aside funds for its construction. Mr. Hard appointed his brother David as Deputy Sheriff and together they built the jail. At about this same time, Sheriff Hard was building his own residence, and was also building another two story brick building as well.

By 1871 Antioch was about to become incorporated. A petition was circulated and signed by 102 voters. Mr. Hard was elected mayor by the Board of Trustees after Antioch was approved for incorporation in 1872 by the state legislature. The first and subsequent meetings of the Board of Trustees took place in the front parlor of the Hard House, around the fireplace. Although primarily used as the family residence, the house was also a constant site for meetings of the early government of Antioch and many civic, social and fraternal weekly and monthyly meetings. The local chapter of the Masonic order used one of the rooms upstairs for their monthly fraternal meetings.

Mr. Hard was re-elected as mayor and served until 1874. He continued to be active in community life until his death in 1888. The period of significance for the building has been ended at that date.

In its graceful simplicity, the Hard House is a good example of Italianate architecture, and the town's only example in that style. It is also one the oldest buildings in the county.

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
