Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Duluth Civic Center Historic District consists of four government buildings and one monument situated around a mall and public square at the corner of Fifth Avenue West and First Street in downtown Duluth. The design plan of the mall, square, and St. Louis County Courthouse were completed by Daniel H. Burnham and Company in 1909.

The county courthouse is the focal point of the complex, set in the direct top-center of the mall complex facing down the Fifth Avenue mall toward the Duluth harbor. As with many other Burnham-designed public buildings, the courthouse is of Neo-Classical/ Renaissance design. The ground floor, with its round-arched windows and rusticated stonework, was inspired by early Renaissance Italian palace architecture. Above this is a floor with a simple series of nine paired windows (above each of the nine arched windows on the first floor). The wide mullions separating these paired windows are in turn surmounted by an imposing portico of eight Ionic columns which supports a frieze with an inscription from a text written by ex-president Charles W. Eliot of Harvard University. A broad classic cornice with acanthuses spans the entire structure and conceals a brownshingled, hipped roof. Between each of the columns are plain, rectangular windows with brown transoms and mullions. The front entrance is located beneath the middle arched window with lion's-head stone detailing directly above.


On the non-principal facades of the building Dormic columns replace the Ionic motif. Circular carved stone designs are uniformly placed along the frieze. Small, one story wings are located to each side.

The interior is noted for its exceptional marble and granite floors, and oak woodwork. The first floor contains the lobby while court rooms and county offices are housed in the remainder of the five story buildings. Construction costs totaled nearly \$1,000,000.

The Duluth City Hall is at the east side of the Civic Center mall, slightly downhill from the courthouse. Constructed in 1928 by the Duluth architectural firm of Shefchik and Olsen, its design is in keeping with Burnham's overall plan; structural similarities between it and the courthouse are not coincidental. The first floor consists of a series of round-arched windows, paired windows above them on the second, then Doric columns elevating four stories to a plain frieze, modest classical cornice, and flat roof, with rusticated stonework the structural norm. This is the pattern throughout the building except at the rear (north) side, where it is only two stories high (the building takes on a U-shaped form from the third to fourth floors), and in the front (south) side where the basement floor has been exposed. Construction costs totaled slightly over \$1,000,000. In 1937, \$80,000 was spent to construct a stone retaining wall and concrete approaches. In 1983 a skywalk was connected from City Hall to the new Government Services Building across Fourth Avenue West.

The City Police Department has its offices on the basement level, a lobby is located on the first floor with some office around it, and the second, third, and fourth floors house the remaining city offices.

The Duluth Civic Center Historic District is significant for its architectural and community planning links with Daniel H. Burnham and the "City Beautiful Movement" of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Burnham was one of the pioneers of city planning and was one of the first American architects to emphasize the relationship between buildings and their sites. Burnham developed some of the first comprehensive plans for such major cities as San Franscisco (1905) and Chicago (1906). Although ge gained national recognition for these projects, he also worked in many smaller communities as well. His plan for the Duluth Civic Center selected Fifth Avenue West as its axis because that avenue served as a gateway to the city from both the railroad depots and the (then operating) passenger ship docks at the waterfront approximately 3^{1}_{2} blocks down the hill from the St. Louis County Courthouse. The formal arrangement of his plan for the Civic Center site and the classical elegance of his design for the St. Louis County Courthouse represent Burnham's concept to provide Duluth with well-executed monumental buildings, tied into the heart of the city by broad promenades, thereby linking them directly with the city's residents.



The Federal Building-U.S. Courthouse and Custom House is located at the west side of the Civic Center mell, balancing the City Hall. Structural characteristics are, again, very similar to the other two buildings. Round-arched windows on the first floor, plain pared windows on the second, Doric columns leading up to the fifth, with plain frieze, classical cornice, and flat roof at the top. Similar to City Hall, the basement floor is exposed on the front (West First Street) side. The scale of the Federal Building is 163' by 177', the other two buildings being very similar in size.

The building was designed by federal architects in 1929 and the cost was \$1,200,000. On the first floor is a post office and lobby, with the remainder being used for federal offices.

Constructed in 1923 according to designs by architects Holstead and Sullivan, the Saint Louis County Jail is situated directly across Second Street from the Civic Center main complex. It is similarly constructed of gray granite and executed in a Neo-classical style. The Jail is four stories in height on a high, battered basement. Corners are highlighted by quoins and bays defined by shallow pilasters. The upper portion of the corner bears a sculptured cartouche or shield, above which is an animal head and roundel. An inscription in bold letters occupies the frieze. The cornice consists of closely spaced modillions supporting a projecting roofline embellished with acroteria. Windows have been modified by glass-block infill.

Completing the Civic Center Historic District is the Soldiers and Sailors Monument which is situated directly in the center of the public square. It was designed by Minnesota architect Cass Gilbert. The monument commemorates Duluth veterans who died while serving their country overseas. A descending fountain, constructed during the late 1960s, gravitates down the embankment in front of the monument.
