Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Intact surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Gray House is a fine example of a one and one-half story, frame dog trot with an original rear ell. It has a corrugated metal gabled roof, walls are clad with weatherboard, and the entire structure rests on a stone pier foundation. The building was constructed c. 1875, and has had only minor alterations. It is currently unoccupied and in fair condition.

Located on the south side of the intersection of County Roads 758 and 46, this building is located two miles northeast of Crosby. This town was once a bustling railroad town. The Missouri and North Arkansas Railroad transported tourists to Crosby where they were then taken by buggies to Armstrong Springs.

The main, or east, elevation is dominated by a centrally located three bay hipped roof porch. It is supported by chamfered posts that are decorated with simple capitals. The east elevation of both pens are fenestrated with symmetrically placed, four-over-four double-hung wood sash windows. The trot is sheathed with flush boards and entered by a single door from each of the pens. The gable end of the northern pen is terminated by a single shouldered brick chimney. A similarly located chimney is found on the west elevation of the rear ell. This chimney, however, is single shouldered and constructed of cut stone. The building's final chimney is located at the southern edge of the gable peak in the southern pen of the dog trot. This interior chimney is of brick construction.

All three gable ends have gable returns. A single window, similar to the ones found on the east elevation, is located west of the northern pen's chimney. The north elevation of the ell is relieved by a centrally placed door and east of this a four-over-four double-hung wood sash window. Single four-pane, fixed frame windows flank the cut stone chimney on the west elevation of the ell. The ell-shaped staircase leading to the sleeping loft is located in the northwest interior corner of this room. A hipped roof porch originally extended from the south elevation of the ell around to the west elevation of the southern pen of the dog trot. The southern half of this porch, however, has been enclosed. A single window, that has been covered up with corrugated metal, relieves the south elevation of the enclosed porch while a single door exits the north elevation onto the porch. This portion of the porch is supported by chamfered posts similar to ones found on the east elevation. A single door exits the rear ell's south elevation onto the porch; the single window located west of this door has been covered with corrugated metal.

A combination smokehouse/wellhouse is located approximately twenty feet southwest of the house. It is constructed of hand-hewned, half-dovetail notched, logs and has a sheet metal covered gable roof. Chinking consists of horizontal boards and the entire structure rests on a stone pier foundation. This structure was constructed at the same time as the house.

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Significance

When this building was constructed, c. 1875, it was one of numerous one and one-half story, frame dog trots built in White County during the Railroad Era. While there are still eighteen such houses left in the county, few reflect the period in which they were constructed. Not only is the Gray House a practically unaltered example of this type of structure, it also dates to the earliest portion of the Railroad Era. It is one of the last extant examples that depicts a time when Crosby was a well visited town. These are the reasons why this building is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance.


