Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Lutcher United Methodist Church stands on a quiet residential block within the St. James Parish town of Lutcher. Constructed in 1901, the vernacular building shows the influence of both the Queen Anne Revival and Gothic Revival styles. The church has experienced very little change over the years. Thus, its National Register eligibility remains intact.

The building's Queen Anne features include 1) asymmetrical massing composed of two gabled masses anchored by a front facing, four-stage tower, and 2) the presence of fishscale shingles decorating the two gables as well as the belfry's second stage. The church's Gothic Revival characteristics include 1) simplified lancet windows created by surmounting regular sashes with triangular shaped lintels, 2) two triple lancet windows containing vernacular lozenge shaped tracery, and 3) the use of quatrefoil decorations within the lintels and upon brackets found on the gables. Other architectural features of interest include 1) a round stained glass window above the altar, 2) the use of translucent colored glass within the lancet windows, and 3) small brackets on the belfry's second stage.

The church's interior contains a vestibule, auditorium and parlor. A pastor's office and robing room are found behind the auditorium. The interior decoration is plain, with two sets of paneled, folding doors being the most outstanding feature. These doors separate the auditorium and parlor. The walls and ceiling are covered with horizontal beaded board, and the auditorium has a simple chair rail. The auditorium's ceiling is in the shape of a faceted vault.

The church's original cypress shingled roof was covered with corrugated metal sometime before the mid-1960s. The only other change to the exterior occurred in 1965, when the entrance stoop was covered by a new pent roof supported by a thin post. This roof was attached to the main building at an angle slightly different from that of the original roofline. This change was made in order to protect the building's original doors, which were deteriorating. Additional work was necessary that year to repair damage caused by Hurricane Betsy. Of these repairs, only the placement of linoleum over the water damaged floors was an actual change. The change in flooring and roofing materials is not serious enough to impact the building's historic character. Although the

addition of the porch does impact the entrance, the church's original architectural character still stands forth. As a rare architectural landmark within the community, the Lutcher United Methodist Church is a worthy candidate for National Register listing.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Lutcher United Methodist Church is locally significant in the area of architecture because it is a landmark within the late nineteenth/early twentieth century architectural heritage of Lutcher.

The small community of Lutcher was founded by the Lutcher and Moore Cypress Lumber Company in 1891. Because the community was first and foremost a mill town, the residences and other buildings erected by the company were, for the most part, plain and utilitarian structures. Only the company office and a handful of the manager's homes could claim even a modicum of style. This fact is verified by the St. James Parish Historic Structures Survey. Conducted in 1987-1988, the survey identifies approximately 400 Lutcher structures as being at least fifty years of age. This surviving building stock consists primarily of small undistinguished bungalows, generic shotguns, simple galleried cottages, and extremely plain Queen Anne style cottages. In contrast to this comparatively humble patrimony, the Lutcher United Methodist Church is a styled building incorporating distinctly articulated elements from both the Gothic Revival and the Queen Anne. Its combination of single and triple lancet windows (some exhibiting lozenge-like tracery), quatrefoil decorations, fishscale shingles, asymmetrical massing, and four stage bell tower sets the structure apart from every other building within the community.

Historical Note

The congregation of the Lutcher United Methodist Church organized in 1898 and obtained its first minister in 1899. In 1988 the Methodist Conference recognized the church for its status as the first Protestant house of worship in Louisiana's river parish region. Members take pride in the fact that, after the damage caused by Hurricane Betsy in 1965, they refused the funds allocated for the restoration project by the Louisiana Methodist Conference and financed needed repairs themselves.
