The site of the ghost town of West Newton is located about half way between Fort Ridgely and New Ulm, Minnesota near the spot where one of the early ferries crossed the Minnesota River. At one time the village included the Alexander Harkin store and post office, a hotel, three saloons, a livery stable, two blacksmith shops, a brewery, a sawmill and a wagon works. Today the store, a hotel (now a residence) and a cemetery are all that remain.

The one story store building was built in 1871 of native pine and black walnut held together with square head nails. It is located behind the farm house overlooking the river. Harkin also had a carriage house and a grainery across from the store.

The Harkin-Massopust store is presently in a deteriorated condition. When the store was closed in 1901 none of the merchandise was removed or changed. Much of this stock still remains today, along with the wood burning stove and display cases. The Harkin family home also remains though it has been enlarged and extensively remodeled.

The store building is typical of the once-common mid-nineteenth century rural stores which dotted southwestern Minnesota. These stores often had open porches running the entire length of their fronts where customers and town-folk would gather to discuss the news of the day. They were utilitarian buildings of a non-permanent nature - their size, appearance, and merchandise ever-changing to meet the demands of the market. The rural character of the Harkin-Massopust Store has remained in an unaltered state although it has been the victim of years of weathering and deterioration.

In later years the store was linked to the original portion of the house by means of a wooden passageway. A storage lean-to on the west side of the store has been recently removed due to its extensively deteriorated condition. This lean-to was not original to the store building.

The house was originally a typical two story simple classic-revival farmhouse constructed in the 1860's of square-hewn logs and sided with clapboard. This served as both residence and store until the present store was constructed in 1871. In the latter part of the nineteenth century, an addition was made to the house by removing the original porch (similar in form to that on the store) and constructing a two story section to the front. This addition contains a parlor and bedroom, with an unfinished second story. The original house and addition are presently in a good state of preservation.



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In 1901, with the advent of Rural Free Delivery, the post office and store in West Newton were closed. All the merchandise, with the exception of the perishables, was left on the shelves and most remains in the store today. Even the account books have been preserved, showing a total of \$3,700 in unpaid accounts at the time of the store's closing.
