Summary Paragraph

Located south of Little Rock's central business district and east of the Paul Laurence Dunbar School Neighborhood Historic District, within the Quapaw Quarter, is the Governor's Mansion Historic District, the core of which comprises one of the oldest intact residential neighborhoods in Little Rock. While rooted in the build-out of Little Rock during the late nineteenth century, the Governor's Mansion Historic District evolved and matured over the course of approximately 75 years, resulting in a rich collection of architecture that represents the growth and diversification of this distinctive residential neighborhood. Reflecting the architectural significance of the area, the Governor's Mansion Historic District was listed in the National Register in 1978, and then subsequently expanded in 1988 and 2002. This nomination includes a re-evaluation of the buildings in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, based on a comprehensive re-survey of all built resources in the district completed in July 2016, and seeks to expand the district's boundary to account for contextually-compatible domestic architecture previously outside of the district that, based on the results of the 2016 survey and review by the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program, was identified as sharing a common architectural vocabulary with

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the existing district. The proposed boundary expansion extends the Governor's Mansion Historic District to the west side of South Chester Street between Wright Avenue and Roosevelt Road. This amendment also seeks to expand the period of significance for the district, which was originally defined as ending c. 1939; the 2002 amendment included a period of significance extending to 1952 for the added area. This amendment proposes extending the period of significance for the district to 1965, which accounts for the use and natural evolution of domestic architecture within the entirety of the district during the mid-twentieth century (much of the district reflects this period of ownership in the incorporation of additions at the rear of properties and other nominal material changes dating to modern ownership) and a period of reinvestment when lots, particularly on the fringes of the district, were outfitted with new dwellings that effectively completed the build-out of the area. This amendment will increase the number of contributing buildings within the district to 626 properties, adding 87 contributing buildings through the boundary expansion. Sixty-three (72%) of the 87 contributing properties in the expansion area were constructed prior to World War II, sharing a developmental context with the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended; the remainder (24 properties or 28%) reflect the mid-twentieth century build-out of the community. The properties added through the expansion are consistent with the styles and forms located elsewhere throughout the district, representing many of the predominant styles dating from the late nineteenth to mid twentieth century: Folk Victorian, Queen Anne, Craftsman, Colonial Revival, Tudor Revival, American Foursquare, as well the American Small House (Minimal Traditional) and Ranch house. Two historic commercial buildings and one historic school are also located in the expanded area.

Narrative Description

District Re-evaluation

This nomination includes a re-evaluation of the resources in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, based on a re-survey of the district that was completed in July 2016 under review by the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program. The survey was funded through a combination of the City of Little Rock's Certified Local Government (CLG) program, local support, and the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program. The purpose of the re-survey was to document and evaluate individual resources within the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, to appropriately account for changes to properties following the first comprehensive survey of the area in 1988. The survey also looked at the district, as amended, more broadly than as was considered in 1988, to more fully account for the historic build-out and, primarily, residential adaptation of properties within the district over time. This review indicated that the mid twentieth century brought a period of evolution and investment by way of improvements and rehabilitation of individual properties and build-out on remaining vacant lots that perpetuated the area's longevity. Thus, this amendment will increase the district's period of significance to ca. 1880-1965, accounting for the full cycle of investment resulting in the growth of the community and sustainment of its identity.

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In order to account for changes to properties that resulted in a loss of integrity, demolition of existing contributing and non-contributing resources, and the expanded period of significance, each of the properties in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, was re-evaluated. Resources that no longer retain sufficient integrity to contribute to the district are now considered non-contributing, while resources that have undergone rehabilitation in the last 30 years and now exhibit enhanced integrity are now considered contributing. In addition, those resources that retain integrity and reflect the later development of the neighborhood are identified as contributing resources. As a result of these re-evaluations, 79 properties in the district, as amended, were changed from non-contributing to contributing, and 109 properties were changed from contributing to non-contributing. Of the 109 properties that became non-contributing, 43 had been demolished since the previous survey. The status of individual properties is included in the table below.

Boundary Expansion

This nomination also expands the boundary of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, extending the boundary to the west side of South Chester Street between Roosevelt Road and Wright Avenue. The majority of the area within the expanded boundary is residential in nature and shares an architectural vocabulary with properties in the existing district, particularly those along its western edge. An examination of residential properties in the expansion area reveals a commonality in forms, massing, and stylistic treatment between those properties located along South Izard and Chester Streets, as well as intersecting east-west streets, and those residences within the existing district, as amended, particularly along South Izard and State Streets. Two historic commercial properties and one historic educational property, Rightsell School, are also located in the expansion area.

The expanded area is bounded to the north by Wright Avenue and to the south by Roosevelt Road, major thoroughfares south of downtown Little Rock. It abuts the existing district, as amended, from Wright Avenue to West 22nd Street, and is bounded to the west by residential properties facing South Ringo Street, within the Paul Laurence Dunbar School Neighborhood Historic District. By way of this boundary increase, the district will be expanded to include an additional 87 contributing resources. Sixty-three (72%) of the 87 contributing properties in the

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expansion area were constructed prior to World War II, sharing a developmental context with the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended; the remainder (24 properties or 28%) reflect the mid-twentieth century build-out of the community. The properties added through the expansion are consistent with the styles and forms located elsewhere throughout the district, representing many of the predominant styles dating from the late nineteenth to mid twentieth century: Folk Victorian, Queen Anne, Craftsman, Colonial Revival, Tudor Revival, American Foursquare, as well the American Small House (Minimal Traditional) and Ranch house.

As further discussed in Section 8, the expanded boundary also addresses the evolving demographics of the Governor's Mansion Historic District over time, particularly during the mid twentieth century, reflecting shifts from a predominately white area to one that was blended interracially along its western borders, extending into the predominately African-American neighborhood beyond to the west. This shift, previously ignored in the 1988 nomination for the Governor's Mansion Historic District, is reflected in the expanded boundary, which includes resources such as the Rightsell School, at the center of community planning and desegregation discussions in Little Rock, and a variety of housing styles and forms that complement those already listed within the district. The composition of the contributing and non-contributing properties are presented in the table below and are described, according to general patterns and characteristics, following.

Italianate (1 contributing):

One house within the expanded boundary reflects the Italianate architectural style. Constructed ca. 1890 (PU1879), the house exhibits a transition from Italianate to Queen Anne with its long, narrow windows and hip roof with wide eaves. Queen Anne elements were originally exhibited in the porch posts.

Queen Anne (7 contributing; 3 non-contributing):

Three houses within the expanded boundary reflect the Queen Anne architectural style. Constructed between ca. 1890 and ca. 1920, each displays Queen Anne elements such as spindled porches, fish scale shingles, verge board, projecting pavilions and projecting bays. The William Stanton House (PU1978) exhibits almost all of these elements. The Connor House (PU1981) exhibits a turret, another common Queen Anne element. The Dalhoff Rental Cottage #3 (PU1860) also exhibits elements of Colonial Revival and the Shelton-Williams House (PU1993) exhibits Craftsman elements. These additional architectural styles reflect construction during the transitory period from 19th century Victorian architectural styles to the popular architectural styles of the early twentieth century.

Three Queen Anne houses are non-contributing structures because of substantial alterations to each.

Folk Victorian (4 contributing):

Four houses within the expanded boundary exhibit elements of the Folk Victorian architectural style. A style that mimics the much more elaborate Queen Anne and other Victorian styles, Folk Victorian examples are usually identified by their porch spindlework or gables clad with novelty siding.¹ The examples within the expanded boundary date from the late 1890s to ca. 1920. All exhibit minimal Folk Victorian detailing, such as the House at 1011 West 24th Street (PU6650) which only exhibits sawtooth siding beneath the gable, as does Ogden House (PU1999), which exhibits fishscale shingles.

Colonial Revival (5 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Five houses within the expanded boundary reflect the Colonial Revival architectural style. Constructed primarily after World War I, these houses reflect one of the most popular architectural styles during this period. They are located throughout the expanded boundary. The William Stanton House #2 (PU1979), constructed ca. 1906 is probably the most ornamented example within the expanded boundary. It exhibits a dentiled cornice, Tuscan porch columns and

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turned balusters. The ca. 1922 Vinsonhaler-Conner House (PU1753) is a much simpler example, exhibiting only a Colonial Revival door surround.

One Colonial Revival structure (PU1878) is non-contributing due to the addition of replacement siding, windows and doors.

Dutch Colonial Revival (6 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Seven houses within the expanded boundary reflect the Dutch Colonial Revival architectural style. Constructed ca. 1900 to ca. 1920, the majority of the houses are clustered together. They all exhibit the defining characteristic of the Dutch Colonial Revival style – the gambrel roof. However, they exhibit various degrees of ornamentation, with the Shaheed House (PU1869) being one of the more ostentatious of the style. The Samuel Jones House (PU1835) is unique amongst the type within the expanded boundary in that it is a combination of the Dutch Colonial Revival and Craftsman styles with its gambrel roof, dormer and rafter tails.

One house (PU1761) is non-contributing because of the addition of replacement siding and windows, as well as numerous additions.

American Foursquare (2 contributing):

Two structures within the expanded boundary are of an American Foursquare plan. The American Foursquare is characterized by two-story, two-bay square or rectangular plans, low-pitched hipped roofs, front dormers and one-story, full-width front porches. One house within the expanded boundary displays Colonial Revival style detailing, whilst the other displays Craftsman ornamentation.

The Theodore Dalhoff House (PU1756), exhibits elements of the Colonial Revival style, with its dentiled cornice and Tuscan column porch supports. The House at 905 West Charles Bussey Ave (PU1865) exhibits elements of the Craftsman style such as multi-light windows, brackets and rafter tails.

Craftsman (17 contributing; 7 non-contributing):

The Craftsman architectural style is the most prevalent within the expanded boundary, with 24 examples of this style present. The style is characterized by low-pitched, gabled roofs with wide eaves, rafter tails, wood shingles, knee braces, battered porch piers and tapered porch posts. The majority of the buildings exhibiting the Craftsman style were constructed during the interwar period, from 1918 to 1940. They are often found throughout the expanded boundary.

The Patillo House (PU1850) is a modest example of a Craftsman house that exhibits only wide eaves with rafter tails multi-light windows and brick porch piers. The Alex M. Keith Jr. House

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(PU1752) is another modest example that exhibits a clipped gable roof, wide eaves with rafter tails and multi-light windows.

Of the 23 Craftsman-style dwellings in the expanded boundary, nine are Craftsman Bungalows. The Craftsman Bungalow was an extremely popular house style during the early twentieth century. It was easily adaptable, with numerous variations across the country. This housing type was an affordable option for the growing Governor's Mansion Neighborhood during the interwar years.

The Southern Bungalow is the most common form of the Craftsman Bungalow found within the expanded boundary, with four examples. The Southern Bungalow was a variation of the typical Bungalow. They are almost always front-gabled with space for an attic and deeper than they are wide with a prominent front porch.² Southern Bungalows are almost always of frame construction. All of the Southern Bungalows within the expanded boundary exhibit these characteristics with some variation. The Brickhouse Rental House (PU1854) exhibits stone porch piers with brackets and half-timbering beneath the gables, whereas the McNutt-Romich House (PU1846) is nearly identical to the Brickhouse Rental House, except that it is clad with a brick veneer and exhibits tapered stone piers.

The other Bungalow type within the expanded boundary is the California Bungalow. Made popular by the California architects Greene and Greene, the California Bungalow is the typical Bungalow, using rusticated materials, and exhibiting elements such as a shed dormer, wood shingle siding, wide eaves, rafter tails, knee braces, battered porch piers and tapered porch posts. The Perry Allen House (PU1876) is a simple example that features a half-width porch with rafter tails.

One Craftsman apartment building (PU1864) is found within the expanded boundary. It is a large, two-story hip roof stucco building that exhibits wide eaves with brackets and multi-light windows.

Seven Craftsman dwellings are non-contributing because of the addition of replacement siding, windows and doors, and/or additions.

Tudor/English Revival (4 contributing):

Tudor or English Revival houses are characterized by half-timbering, arched windows and doors, steeply gabled roofs and large façade fireplaces. The four examples within the expanded boundary date to the interwar period, from ca. 1925 to ca. 1929. The Goodrich House (PU2015) is the most elaborate example and exhibits a steeply pitched roof, arched entry, Gothic arched window and a large stone façade fireplace. The Oberste House (PU1845) exhibits both Tudor Revival and Craftsman elements, with its arched windows and façade dormer.

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Plain/Traditional (15 contributing; 11 non-contributing):

Twenty-six buildings with no particular stylistic influence are found within the expanded district boundary. These buildings were constructed from ca. 1890-1950. The majority of these structures exhibit very little stylistic ornament. However, several buildings exhibit isolated elements of architectural styles, such as the House at 1922 South Chester Street (PU1966), which exhibits elements of both the Folk Victorian and Colonial Revival architectural styles and the Henry Weideman House (PU1838), which exhibits elements of the Colonial Revival style.

Eleven buildings are non-contributing because of the addition of replacement siding, windows and doors, and/or additions or they were constructed after the period of significance.

Minimal Traditional/American Small House (9 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Ten structures within the expanded boundary are categorized as being an American Small House. Constructed from ca. 1930 – 1950, the American Small House was an affordable, well-built single family house that was a response to the Great Depression and the housing shortage that ensued post World War II. It is characterized by a square or rectangular plan, one or one-and-one-half-stories and a side-gabled roof, possibly with a front-gabled extension. The façade entry is almost always centered.³ American Small Houses can be ornamented with various styling, although any stylistic details are always rather simple in nature. The examples located within the expanded boundary date from ca. 1939 to ca. 1948 and exhibit Colonial Revival or Tudor Revival details.

Several American Small Houses within the expanded boundary are clustered together along West 19th Street. The remaining structures are isolated throughout. They are nearly identical to one another, exhibiting a one-story, side-gabled form with a brick veneer exterior or clad with aluminum siding. The Humphrey House (PU1721), Davis House (PU1722), Benham House (PU1723) and Dyer House (PU1724) all exhibit large front-gabled porches, although the porches at the Humphrey House and Dyer House have been enclosed. The Dickson House (PU1738) is an aluminum clad example that is oriented with the shorter elevation toward the road. The Thomas P. Terry Duplex (PU1873) is a multi-family example.

One house (PU1843) is non-contributing due to the addition of replacement siding and windows.

Ranch (14 contributing; 5 non-contributing):

The Ranch House is one of the more prevalent structures found throughout the expanded boundary, with 18 buildings. The Ranch House is the most common house form from the mid-twentieth century and beyond throughout the nation. It quickly surpassed all other residential

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forms within the expanded boundary post World War II, as vacant parcels were subjected to infill development and as older homes were replaced with the more modern form. The majority of Ranch Houses are scattered throughout the expanded boundary.

There are various sub-types of the Ranch House, but all exhibit a one-story form with a long, low roofline. Ranch houses are almost always of frame construction and can have a brick or stone veneer. All but one example within the expanded boundary are clad with a brick veneer; one is clad with composite siding. The majority of the Ranch Houses within the expanded boundary are of the Linear Ranch variety. The Linear Ranch is a long form that is twice as long as it is wide, usually with either an integrated carport or attached garage. The Taylor House (PU1730) is a Linear Ranch example with an attached garage and Colonial Revival details.

Other Ranch House sub-types found within the expanded boundary include the Carrie Johnson Duplex (PU1833), which can be categorized as a Courtyard Ranch. It exhibits two wings that create a courtyard on its façade. The Barlow House (PU1744) is a Compact Ranch house, the earliest form of Ranch House. It exhibits a short, rectangular form. Four properties are Ranch duplexes.

Five Ranch Houses are non-contributing. All but one date to after the period of significance for the expanded district; the remaining non-contributing house exhibits major alterations.

Commercial (2 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Three commercial buildings are located within the expanded boundary, although only two are contributing. The Price Mobil Service Station (PU1951), located along Wright Avenue, is relatively unaltered and features a flat roof. Even though the Mitchell Brothers Building (PU1733) has been altered by the enclosure of all windows, it retains its basic, ca. 1890 form and parapet roof.

The remaining non-contributing commercial building dates to after the period of significance.

Educational (1 contributing):

Constructed ca. 1906, Rightsell School, located at 911 West 19th Street, is a two-story, brick, hip roof H-plan structure with Colonial Revival details such as a concrete water table and inset brick panels. Additions were completed in 1930 and 1954. The school is named after Jacob R. Rightsell, the second superintendent of the Little Rock School District.⁴

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Vacant Parcels (17 non-contributing):

Seventeen of the 46 non-contributing resources are vacant lots. The majority of these lots once contained buildings that have since been demolished, many in recent years.

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Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The Governor's Mansion Historic District was originally listed in the National Register in 1978, encompassing 20 square blocks, for its architectural significance. The district was expanded substantially in 1988, following an amendment that brought the historic district to approximately 65 square blocks. In 2002, a second expansion added another two blocks. This nomination seeks to further expand the boundary to include properties along the western edge of the existing district boundary, which share a common architectural vocabulary and developmental trends and help convey important contextual transitions in the neighborhood during the mid twentieth century that were previously ignored. This expanded area adds a contiguous area to the district's western boundary that supports eligibility of the district under Criterion C in the area of architecture, embodying the architectural forms and stylistic applications that were popular from the nineteenth to mid twentieth century. While the 1988 nomination noted that development in the Governor's Mansion Historic District was curtailed c. 1940, this nomination also seeks to expand the period of significance to c. 1965 to account for mid twentieth century evolutions in the neighborhood, a distinct period of development that is reflected in the built environment today in both adaptations of earlier properties and mid-twentieth century infill that continued the build-out of the community. This period also coincides with the effects of demographic transitions in the neighborhood, which began in the early twentieth century and carried through the period of development in the western portion of the existing district, as amended, and sections of the proposed boundary expansion as African-American ownership of properties became a common thread in this area. While such trends were previously excluded from the 1988 expansion, they serve as the developmental backdrop for the area and lend context to the architectural fabric of the community for which it is noted, a pattern also consistent with the 2002 expansion.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

In 1978, the Governor's Mansion Historic District was successfully nominated to the National Register of Historic Places. At that time, the boundaries and period of significance for the district were defined so as to include only the developmental core of the area, excluding many contextually-related properties beyond. In 1988, a substantial amendment was made to the Governor's Mansion Historic District, pulling in hundreds of related resources that perpetuated the district's significance under Criterion C, which "derives both form the presence within the district of certain major examples of late-19th and early-20th century residential architecture [...] and from the wide array of houses, generally in good condition, that together represent the full range of architectural styles popular during the late 19th and early 20th centuries."⁵

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While the 1988 expansion, which greatly increased the boundary of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, noted that the "boundaries of the original [1978] Governor's Mansion Historic District were arbitrarily drawn and do not reflect all of the historic resources in the neighborhood," the 1988 amendment also had shortcomings.⁶ This is evidenced, in part, by the 2002 expansion, which noted that "a pattern of development that relates to the southern boundary of the historic district went unnoticed," omitting properties along Louisiana Street that otherwise share a common context. These properties were subsequently added through the 2002 expansion, pulling in a mix of middle-class dwellings and more modest cottages that not only complemented the build-out of the neighborhood as described in the 1988 nomination but also helped to convey the importance of post-World War II era development in the district, which "brings into focus another distinct period in the neighborhood's development" that was characterized by new construction, adaptation of existing buildings, and conversion to multi-family use.⁷ The 2002 expansion also helped to further expound on the demographic context of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, acknowledging the transition between a predominately white neighborhood and African-American residents at the fringes, with the neighborhood serving as a "dividing line" in the racial composition of the area.⁸ Notably, these trends recognized in the 2002 expansion are remarkably consistent with those evidenced in the expanded boundary proposed under this nomination. Certainly, based on the results of the July 2017 survey, other oversights appear to have been made in the 1988 amendment, which took a narrow view of the neighborhood's developmental context and failed to account for resources along the western edge that are associated with broader patterns evidenced in the district. While the 1988 amendment noted that resources in this area were "excluded because of the extent of alteration and demolition its buildings have suffered," the July 2017 survey illustrates the narrowness of this view, which sacrificed the context of the district for an arbitrary "best of the best" approach that limits a true understanding of development patterns and architectural shifts.⁹ Also, while the 1988 nomination notes that the area experienced "ongoing residential development" that ended c. 1940, this fails to appropriately account for a period of adaptation and investment during the mid twentieth century that resulted in much of the built environment present today and coincides with a period of demographic shifts in the neighborhood extending from the early 20th century.¹⁰

Consistent with the existing Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, the expanded boundary represents the development that spread from north to south into what was then known as Wright's Addition, bordered by Wright Avenue to the north, West 21st Street to the south, and South Cross and Ringo Streets on the west and east, respectively. South of West 21st Street to Roosevelt, development was centered in Wat Worthen's Addition. As noted in the 1988 nomination, development in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, proceeded in

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the early 1880s and continued substantially between 1890 and 1930, resulting in a rich array of residences representing both modest cottages and substantial dwellings reflecting the prevailing stylistic applications of the period.¹¹ Approximately 80% of the housing stock in the district, as amended, was noted as dating to this period in the 1988 nomination. The dwellings presented in the 2002 amendment continued these trends, although they more consistently reflect the early to mid twentieth century development of the neighborhood in the presence of Colonial Revival, Craftsman, and Minimal Traditional dwellings, as well as numerous duplexes.¹²

The resources in the proposed expanded boundary reflect a consistent development pattern and array of building forms and architectural styles relating to the period. The earliest phases of development in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, are well represented, with 12 resources dating to the 1890s. The first decades of the twentieth century brought the most substantial development, as was the case elsewhere in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, with 45 resources constructed between 1900 and 1919 and an additional 20 resources constructed between 1920 and 1929. These numbers are remarkably consistent with the composition of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended and described in the 1988 nomination. As described in that document, "the heaviest concentration (nearly 60% [of resources were built] in the 1900-1930 period [...] As is to be expected of a neighborhood that experienced its greatest growth during the early 20th century, the historic district is full of excellent examples of the Colonial Revival and Craftsman styles—well over 300 of them. The Queen Anne style also is well-represented, and several large English Revival houses attest to the area's popularity through the 1920's."¹³ This same language could be applied to the proposed expansion area, evidencing the contextual relationship between the two areas and the expansion area's ability to support eligibility of the district under Criterion C. Certainly, of the extant resources covered by this nomination, more than 55% were built in the 1900-1930 period, resulting in a rich collection of Colonial Revival, Dutch Colonial Revival, American Foursquare, Craftsman, and English Revival architecture that complements that of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended. Scattered throughout are hallmarks of the first period of development, reflected in the Queen Anne, Folk Victorian, and traditional cottages dating from the 1890s and into the 1900s. While erroneously excluded from the 1988 amendment, these resources perpetuate the trends evidenced throughout the district, as amended, and, in total, accurately capture the material composition of the landscape associated with the Governor's Mansion Historic District. Consistent with the original intent of the 1978 nomination for the Governor's Mansion Historic District, the expanded area retains "an unusual degree of visual,

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architectural cohesiveness with structures representing every major architectural style used during Little Rock's dynamic growth period in the late 19th and early 20th centuries."¹⁴

The expanded boundary also complements mid twentieth century trends experienced in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, particularly as relayed in the 2002 nomination, which expanded upon the idea that resources from this era represent an important and "distinct period" associated with the neighborhood as it relates to adaptation of existing dwellings, new construction on remaining lots, and conversion of many dwellings into multi-family units to serve returning GIs and their families in the aftermath of World War II.¹⁵ This important trend, which perpetuated growth and sustainment of the Governor's Mansion Historic District into the modern era, was largely ignored in the 1988 amendment, which ignored the contributions of the mid twentieth century as they relate to the identity of the neighborhood. That amendment correctly identified that some development at the core did begin to taper off in the Depression era, but it omitted that there was a resurgence in investment in the area in the post-World War II period. While the reasons for this are unknown, it is likely that this period of development was then only 20-30 years in the past and was not contextually understood as a continuation of investment patterns in the neighborhood. The 2002 nomination sought to correct this, extending the period of significance to 1952 to capture those resources resulting from and/or adapted during the immediate post-World War II era (a point that was then 50 years in the past). Yet, that extension also falls short, failing to recognize the importance of transitions and development patterns of the 1950s and early 1960s, which are central to understanding the fabric and identity of the Governor's Mansion Historic District as it appears today. As such, this nomination seeks to extend the period of significance for the district to include the period dating from 1880 to 1965.

In the expanded area, the modern era is represented by 29 resources that date from 1940 to 1965, reflecting the continued investment that was placed in the Governor's Mansion Historic District during the period. Continued investment during this period reflected the continued stature of the area over time as a place warranting renewed interest, even as some blocks in the district, as amended, began to experience a decline during the 1960s and 1970s. Through such, the district avoided the perpetuation of vacant lots that remained in other such areas of the period as historic sections of Little Rock fought off patterns of suburbanization that concentrated investment elsewhere in the community. As a result of this period, a number of American Small House (Minimal Traditional) and Ranch house forms were added to the area, serving as affordable and efficient constructions in a post-World War II world that valued different modes of construction. It was also during this period that many of the dwellings in the district, as amended, took on their final forms, characterized by nominal material changes and functional additions that reflect mid twentieth century residency and adaptation. While some buildings have been restored in the total

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district have been restored to eliminate such adaptations, many retain historic additions at the rear of properties, minor adjustments to fenestration patterns, and material influences that have become part of their identity. It should also not go unrecognized that two contextually important events occurred during the mid twentieth century that also sustained the Governor's Mansion Historic District. These includes the construction of the Governor's Mansion in 1950 and the creation of the Quapaw Quarter Association in 1961, which, among other things, largely protected the historic fabric in the area by encouraging the rehabilitation and restoration of those resources central to the community's identity.¹⁶

Extending the period of significance to 1965 also allows for a full understanding of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, over time, appropriately taking into account its contextual background and developmental shifts over time, which are reflected in the built environment. While such transitions were accounted for to some degree in the 2002 amendment that recognized the overlap between the primarily white tenants at the core of the Governor's Mansion Historic District and the African-American tenants along its fringes, the 1988 amendment had erroneously eliminated this important context from the story of the neighborhood. The 2002 amendment sought to rectify this as it pertained to Louisiana Street, accounting for the "dividing line" nature of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, and the transitions that occurred along the fringes of the neighborhood, which were important to its identity and contextual development over time.¹⁷

These trends played out even more so in the western portion of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, and in the expanded boundary presented in this nomination. As described in the 1988 amendment, the neighborhood experienced "white flight" to the suburbs in the mid twentieth century, which resulted in changing demographics, but the context is more complex than is presented in that nomination and further gives merit to extending the period of significance to 1965 to appropriately account for the developmental context of the total district.¹⁸ While true that the area as a whole witnessed substantial "white flight" and a resultant influx of African-American residents during the mid twentieth century, patterns appeared much earlier in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, as conveyed in the 2002 amendment and further illustrated in the context of the expanded boundary under this nomination. The reality is that, as described in 1961 in a discussion of school desegregation, the transitory nature of demographics in the neighborhood had begun in the early twentieth century: "Residential patterns [in the western portion of Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended] have been gradually changing over the years," with Rightsell School, located in the proposed expanded boundary, located within the "approximate dividing line between white and Negro residential

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neighborhoods.”¹⁹ This long-standing transition was described more intently in a finding of lawsuit brought against the Little Rock School Board in 1962 in response to the proposed conversion of Rightsell School into an African-American school:

“It is true, as appellants state, that the area about this school is now and has always been a high-grade White residential section and the homes and buildings within that area have, since the erection of that school, reflected affluence and culture. They still do.

But the gracious and imposing homes and substantial business structures that rimmed the settlement at the landing at Little Rock many years ago were not sufficient to confine the needs of the population to that area and the stately and imposing schools and churches were not sufficient to still the growing pains of an expanding community. People migrate and populations shift in response to economic and other needs and when that migration starts, we bend our efforts not to stopping the inevitable but we bend our facilities to caring for the newly created condition.

Such is the case before us. A shift in population has presented the problem than an area [the Governor's Mansion Historic District] exclusively White 55 years ago can now muster but 300 White children out of a registration of 944.”²⁰

Rightsell School and the transitioning demographics in the western portion of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, and the proposed expanded boundary became central in discussions of interracial neighborhoods and school facilities in Little Rock, particularly in once prominent white areas. The 1988 nomination failed to account for this, erroneously excluding contextually-important residential properties and the Rightsell School, which convey these important developmental contexts. While demographic and socioeconomic transitions had begun in the early twentieth century, the issue came to a head in 1961, when the Little Rock School Board proposed converting Rightsell School, which historically served “what once was Little Rock's most fashionable residential areas [Governor's Mansion Historic District],” into a segregated African-American school.²¹

At the center of the issue was Rightsell School, which started as a four-room building constructed in 1906, and grew to include 16 classrooms and various specialty areas such as a band room and visual education room. Long-serving the Governor's Mansion Historic District, it was noted that “some of Little Rock's most prominent residents attended” the school.”²² However, while it had historically served white populations, it increasingly became home to larger and larger percentages of African-American students as the demographics at the western end of the Governor's Mansion Historic District began to change during the twentieth century.

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This was particularly true as African-American populations swelled in the Paul Laurence Dunbar School Neighborhood Historic District, located to the west, and its associated Dunbar School became overcrowded. Witnessing this evolution of character over time, the Little Rock School Board voted in 1961 to begin conversion of Rightsell School into a segregated African-American school starting in the fall semester of 1961, noting that as a result of changing demographics, "It's just as simple as this... We've got an extra white school on our hands and we're crowded to the rafters in the colored schools." Going further, the Board recognized the issues associated with transitions that the Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, had been experiencing, but noted that "The Board does not fix and cannot control neighborhood residential patterns or trends and the present problem is common to all metropolitan areas of constantly shifting populations."²³

Not unsurprisingly, the decision of the Board brought considerable debate to the forefront. A group of property owners in the Governor's Mansion Historic District, including the proposed expansion area, served by the school, brought suit against the Board to prevent conversion to a segregated African-American school on the premise that it would erode property values in this portion of the district.²⁴ The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) also brought suit against the Board, but for a different reason. The NAACP argued that the conversion perpetuated segregation and discrimination and made calls for an integrated school facility at Rightsell, an outcome likewise not favored by some property owners.²⁵ The reality was set, though. The Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended and inclusive of the proposed expanded boundary, had been undergoing a transition for some time, a transition that is important to understanding the developmental context of the area from the early to mid twentieth century. As shown in planning maps accompanying the debate around Rightsell School, the area had changed during the course of the twentieth century. What was once a nearly exclusively white area, was now interracial, even if predominately white. Blocks of housing between 19th Street and 21st Street from South Ringo Street to the east side of Chester Street, encompassing a portion of the proposed expanded boundary, were interracial, while blocks between 21st Street and 24th Street were still nearly all white. To the east, within the proposed expanded boundary, blocks immediately south of Rightsell School were interracial, as were scattered blocks between South Izard and Gaines Street, within the existing Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended. Moreover, glossed over in the 1988 nomination, is that the demographic composition of the existing Governor's Mansion Historic District, as amended, had likewise transitioned, further evidencing the contextual similarities between the proposed expanded boundary and the district, as amended, which were originally omitted. Specifically, many blocks between South Gaines Street and Broadway Street had witnessed an influx of other ethnicities into the mid twentieth century. While not previously discussed in the 1988 nomination, it would have been these residents, alongside white residents, that constructed many

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of the post-World War II dwellings and made many of the adaptations that now characterize and inform the visual character of the neighborhood.²⁶

The discussion surrounding transitions in the Governor's Mansion Historic District and use of Rightsell School, ultimately resolved c. 1963 following the School Board moving forward with conversion to an African-American school in the years before desegregation, illustrate the importance of appropriately accounting for the context of a place and moving beyond a narrower "best of the best" approach as employed in the 1988 nomination to take in the fabric of a total area that shares a similar developmental and architectural context, extending from the earliest phases of developing in the late nineteenth century to the transitions brought about during the mid twentieth century. As was conveyed in the 2002 amendment that absorbed properties along Louisiana Street, most of the places in the proposed boundary expansion are not going to be considered "premier works of architecture" in a narrowly-focused view, but they are part of the neighborhood fabric and help convey important trends in architecture and development that allow for a more full understanding of the Governor's Mansion Historic District and its place within the overall context of Little Rock. It is in this light that the expanded boundary (and expansion of the period of significance to 1965) supports eligibility of the district, more accurately accounting for the full spectrum of development associated with the area and enhancing contextual understanding of the period reflected in the built environment.

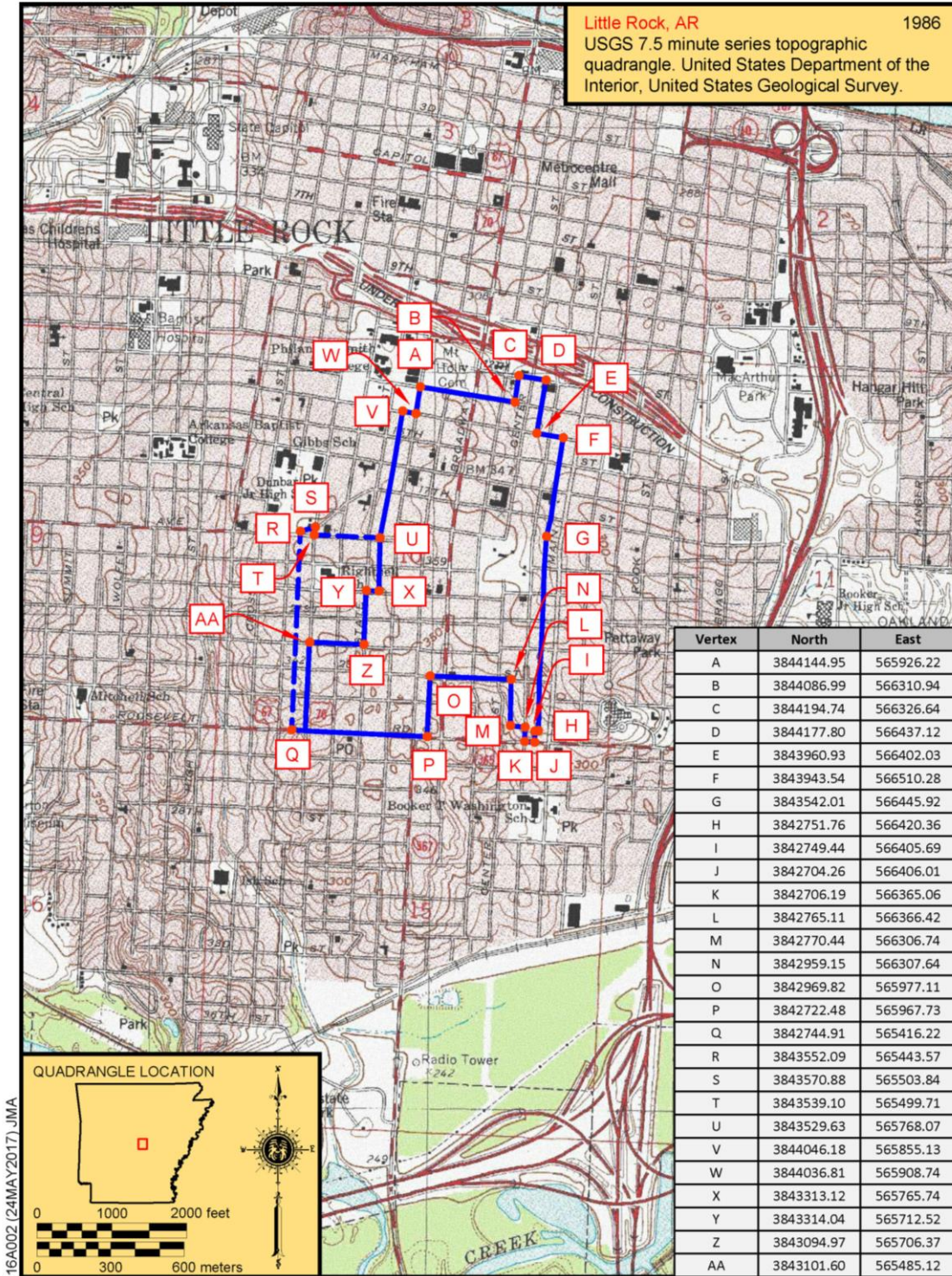

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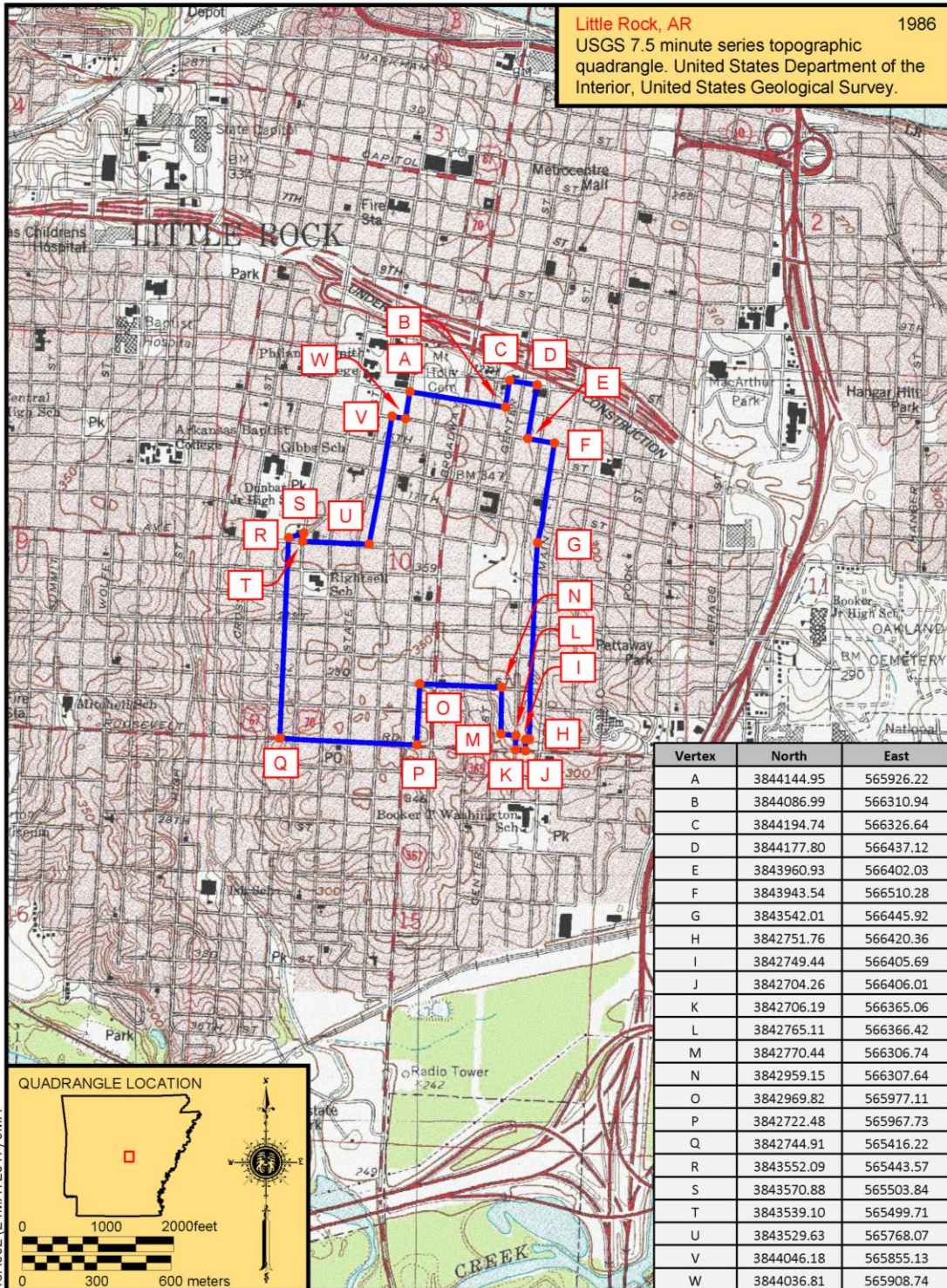
USGS topographic quadrangle showing the original boundary and expansion area.

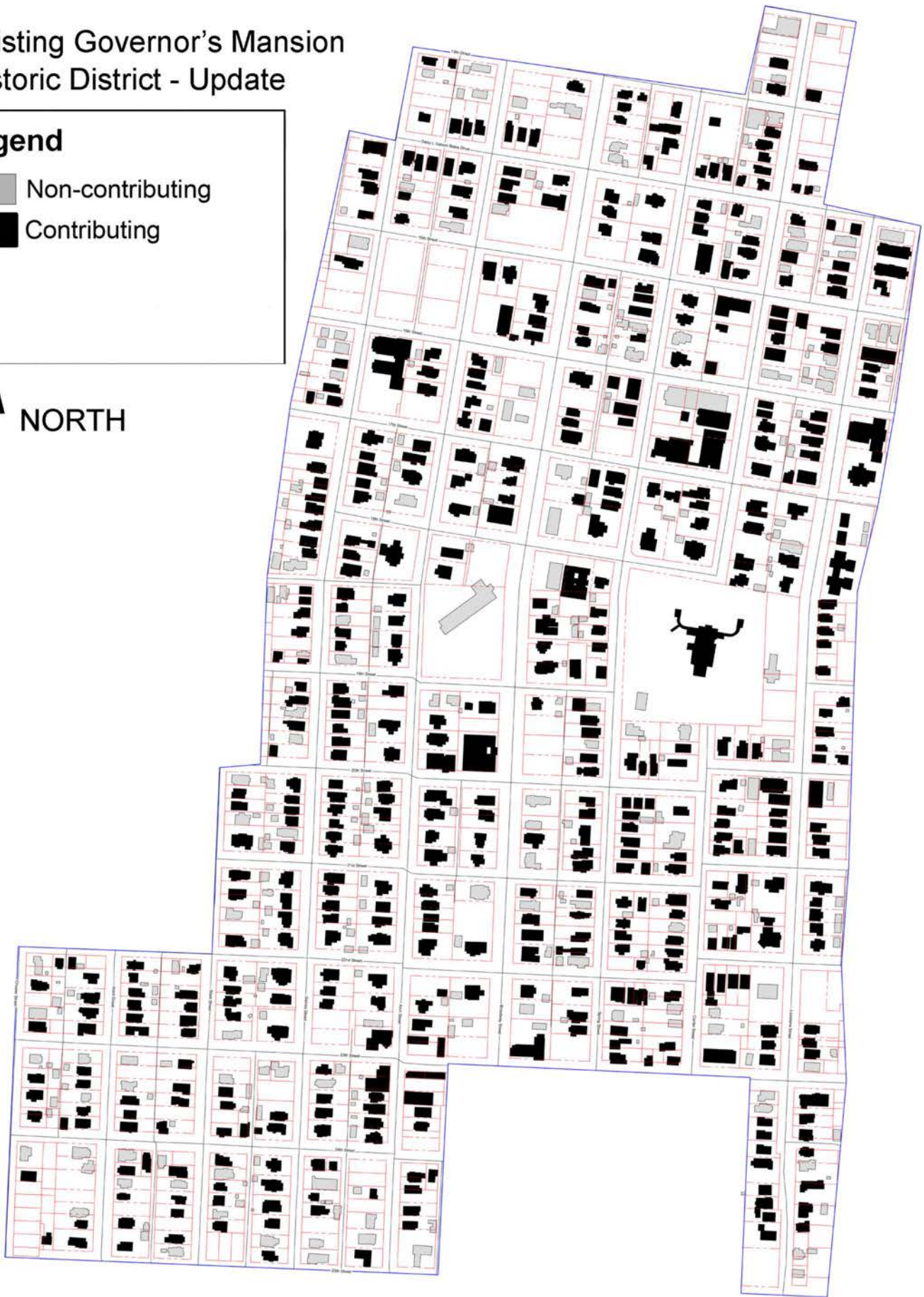

Summary Paragraph

This amendment seeks to add 87 contributing buildings to the Governor's Mansion Historic District and increase the number of contributing buildings within the district to 626. It also contains a re-evaluation of the buildings in the existing district based on a resurvey that was undertaken during 2016. The boundary for the Governor's Mansion Historic District will be expanded to the west side of South Chester Street between Wright Avenue and Roosevelt Road. The amendment will also increase the district's period of significance from ca. 1880-1952 to ca. 1880-1967.

Almost all of the development within the expanded boundary occurred post World War I, with 53 (61%) of the 87 contributing structures constructed between ca. 1918-1967. Twenty-nine of these structures were constructed in the interwar period and 24 were constructed post World War II. Seven historic structures were constructed prior to the twentieth century. The remaining 26 (30%) historic structures within the expanded boundary were constructed in the twentieth century prior to World War I.

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Narrative Description

The majority of the area within the expanded boundary is residential in nature, with two contributing commercial properties, and one educational property, Rightsell School. The expanded area is bounded to the north by Wright Avenue and to the south by Roosevelt Road, major thoroughfares south of downtown Little Rock, Arkansas. It is bounded to the east by South State Street from Wright Avenue to West 22nd Street and to the west by South Cross Street from Wright Avenue to Roosevelt Road. The current Governor's Mansion Historic District surrounds the expanded boundary on the east side and the Paul Laurence Dunbar School Historic District meets the expanded boundary to the west. The buildings located within the expanded boundary reflect the varied architectural styles prevalent in the area from ca. 1895-1967.

This nomination expands the boundary of the Governor's Mansion Historic District, which was listed in the National Register in 1978 and amended in 1988 and 2002, to include contiguous historic development on the west side of the present district, thereby expanding the boundary to the west side of South Chester Street between Roosevelt Road and Wright Avenue. It also re-evaluates the resources in the existing district through a re-survey that was conducted in 2016. By way of this boundary increase, the district will be expanded to include an additional 87 contributing resources and 47 non-contributing resources, which added to the previous contributing resources and non-contributing resources listed through the original nomination and subsequent amendments, brings the total to 629 contributing resources and 246 non-contributing resources. In addition, the amendment will also increase the district's period of significance from ca. 1880-1952 to ca. 1880-1967.

The Governor's Mansion Historic District as amended encompasses the historic commercial, institutional and residential buildings of this predominately upper class community that blended interracially into a predominately African American community along the fringes to the west, and illustrates the evolution of housing practices and styles within the district. The physical characteristics of the buildings included in the boundary increase do not deviate substantially from those in the existing National Register district, but rather complement the numbers of those already listed within the district. The composition of the contributing and non-contributing resources are presented in the tables below and are described, according to general patterns and characteristics, following.

Italianate (1 contributing):

One house within the expanded boundary reflects the Italianate architectural style. Constructed ca. 1890 (PU1879), the house exhibits a transition from Italianate to Queen Anne with its long, narrow windows and hip roof with wide eaves. Queen Anne elements were originally exhibited in the porch posts.

Queen Anne (7 contributing; 3 non-contributing):

Three houses within the expanded boundary reflect the Queen Anne architectural style. Constructed between ca. 1890 and ca. 1920, each displays Queen Anne elements such as spindled porches, fish scale shingles, verge board, projecting pavilions and projecting bays. The William Stanton House (PU1978) exhibits almost all of these elements. The Connor House (PU1981) exhibits a turret, another common Queen Anne element. The Dalhoff Rental Cottage #3 (PU1860) also exhibits elements of Colonial Revival and the Shelton-Williams House (PU1993) exhibits Craftsman elements. These additional architectural styles reflect construction during the transitory period from 19th century Victorian architectural styles to the popular architectural styles of the early twentieth century.

Three Queen Anne houses are non-contributing structures because of substantial alterations to each.

Folk Victorian (4 contributing):

Four houses within the expanded boundary exhibit elements of the Folk Victorian architectural style. A style that mimics the much more elaborate Queen Anne and other Victorian styles, Folk Victorian examples are usually identified by their porch spindlework or gables clad with novelty siding.¹ The examples within the expanded boundary date from the late 1890s to ca. 1920. All exhibit minimal Folk Victorian detailing, such as the House at 1011 West 24th Street (PU6650)

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which only exhibits sawtooth siding beneath the gable, as does Ogden House (PU1999), which exhibits fishscale shingles.

Colonial Revival (5 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Five houses within the expanded boundary reflect the Colonial Revival architectural style. Constructed primarily after World War I, these houses reflect one of the most popular architectural styles during this period. They are located throughout the expanded boundary. The William Stanton House #2 (PU1979), constructed ca. 1906 is probably the most ornamented example within the expanded boundary. It exhibits a dentiled cornice, Tuscan porch columns and turned balusters. The ca. 1922 Vinsonhaler-Conner House (PU1753) is a much simpler example, exhibiting only a Colonial Revival door surround.

One Colonial Revival structure (PU1878) is non-contributing due to the addition of replacement siding, windows and doors.

Dutch Colonial Revival (6 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Seven houses within the expanded boundary reflect the Dutch Colonial Revival architectural style. Constructed ca. 1900 to ca. 1920, the majority of the houses are clustered together. They all exhibit the defining characteristic of the Dutch Colonial Revival style – the gambrel roof. However, they exhibit various degrees of ornamentation, with the Shaheed House (PU1869) being one of the more ostentatious of the style. The Samuel Jones House (PU1835) is unique amongst the type within the expanded boundary in that it is a combination of the Dutch Colonial Revival and Craftsman styles with its gambrel roof, dormer and rafter tails.

One house (PU1761) is non-contributing because of the addition of replacement siding and windows, as well as numerous additions.

American Foursquare (2 contributing):

Two structures within the expanded boundary are of an American Foursquare plan. The American Foursquare is characterized by two-story, two-bay square or rectangular plans, low-pitched hipped roofs, front dormers and one-story, full-width front porches. One house within the expanded boundary displays Colonial Revival style detailing, whilst the other displays Craftsman ornamentation.

The Theodore Dalhoff House (PU1756), exhibits elements of the Colonial Revival style, with its dentiled cornice and Tuscan column porch supports. The House at 905 West Charles Bussey Ave (PU1865) exhibits elements of the Craftsman style such as multi-light windows, brackets and rafter tails.

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Craftsman (17 contributing; 7 non-contributing):

The Craftsman architectural style is the most prevalent within the expanded boundary, with 24 examples of this style present. The style is characterized by low-pitched, gabled roofs with wide eaves, rafter tails, wood shingles, knee braces, battered porch piers and tapered porch posts. The majority of the buildings exhibiting the Craftsman style were constructed during the interwar period, from 1918 to 1940. They are often found throughout the expanded boundary.

The Patillo House (PU1850) is a modest example of a Craftsman house that exhibits only wide eaves with rafter tails multi-light windows and brick porch piers. The Alex M. Keith Jr. House (PU1752) is another modest example that exhibits a clipped gable roof, wide eaves with rafter tails and multi-light windows.

Of the 23 Craftsman-style dwellings in the expanded boundary, nine are Craftsman Bungalows. The Craftsman Bungalow was an extremely popular house style during the early twentieth century. It was easily adaptable, with numerous variations across the country. This housing type was an affordable option for the growing Governor's Mansion Neighborhood during the interwar years.

The Southern Bungalow is the most common form of the Craftsman Bungalow found within the expanded boundary, with four examples. The Southern Bungalow was a variation of the typical Bungalow. They are almost always front-gabled with space for an attic and deeper than they are wide with a prominent front porch.² Southern Bungalows are almost always of frame construction. All of the Southern Bungalows within the expanded boundary exhibit these characteristics with some variation. The Brickhouse Rental House (PU1854) exhibits stone porch piers with brackets and half-timbering beneath the gables, whereas the McNutt-Romich House (PU1846) is nearly identical to the Brickhouse Rental House, except that it is clad with a brick veneer and exhibits tapered stone piers.

The other Bungalow type within the expanded boundary is the California Bungalow. Made popular by the California architects Greene and Greene, the California Bungalow is the typical Bungalow, using rusticated materials, and exhibiting elements such as a shed dormer, wood shingle siding, wide eaves, rafter tails, knee braces, battered porch piers and tapered porch posts. The Perry Allen House (PU1876) is a simple example that features a half-width porch with rafter tails.

One Craftsman apartment building (PU1864) is found within the expanded boundary. It is a large, two-story hip roof stucco building that exhibits wide eaves with brackets and multi-light windows.

Seven Craftsman dwellings are non-contributing because of the addition of replacement siding, windows and doors, and/or additions.

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Tudor/English Revival (4 contributing):

Tudor or English Revival houses are characterized by half-timbering, arched windows and doors, steeply gabled roofs and large façade fireplaces. The four examples within the expanded boundary date to the interwar period, from ca. 1925 to ca. 1929. The Goodrich House (PU2015) is the most elaborate example and exhibits a steeply pitched roof, arched entry, Gothic arched window and a large stone façade fireplace. The Oberste House (PU1845) exhibits both Tudor Revival and Craftsman elements, with its arched windows and façade dormer.

Plain/Traditional (15 contributing; 11 non-contributing):

Twenty-six buildings with no particular stylistic influence are found within the expanded district boundary. These buildings were constructed from ca. 1890-1950. The majority of these structures exhibit very little stylistic ornament. However, several buildings exhibit isolated elements of architectural styles, such as the House at 1922 South Chester Street (PU1966), which exhibits elements of both the Folk Victorian and Colonial Revival architectural styles and the Henry Weideman House (PU1838), which exhibits elements of the Colonial Revival style.

Eleven buildings are non-contributing because of the addition of replacement siding, windows and doors, and/or additions or they were constructed after the period of significance.

Minimal Traditional/American Small House (9 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Ten structures within the expanded boundary are categorized as being an American Small House. Constructed from ca. 1930 – 1950, the American Small House was an affordable, well-built single family house that was a response to the Great Depression and the housing shortage that ensued post World War II. It is characterized by a square or rectangular plan, one or one-and-one-half-stories and a side-gabled roof, possibly with a front-gabled extension. The façade entry is almost always centered.³ American Small Houses can be ornamented with various styling, although any stylistic details are always rather simple in nature. The examples located within the expanded boundary date from ca. 1939 to ca. 1948 and exhibit Colonial Revival or Tudor Revival details.

Several American Small Houses within the expanded boundary are clustered together along West 19th Street. The remaining structures are isolated throughout. They are nearly identical to one another, exhibiting a one-story, side-gabled form with a brick veneer exterior or clad with aluminum siding. The Humphrey House (PU1721), Davis House (PU1722), Benham House (PU1723) and Dyer House (PU1724) all exhibit large front-gabled porches, although the porches at the Humphrey House and Dyer House have been enclosed. The Dickson House (PU1738) is

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an aluminum clad example that is oriented with the shorter elevation toward the road. The Thomas P. Terry Duplex (PU1873) is a multi-family example.

One house (PU1843) is non-contributing due to the addition of replacement siding and windows.

Ranch (14 contributing; 5 non-contributing):

The Ranch House is one of the more prevalent structures found throughout the expanded boundary, with 18 buildings. The Ranch House is the most common house form from the mid-twentieth century and beyond throughout the nation. It quickly surpassed all other residential forms within the expanded boundary post World War II, as vacant parcels were subjected to infill development and as older homes were replaced with the more modern form. The majority of Ranch Houses are scattered throughout the expanded boundary.

There are various sub-types of the Ranch House, but all exhibit a one-story form with a long, low roofline. Ranch houses are almost always of frame construction and can have a brick or stone veneer. All but one example within the expanded boundary are clad with a brick veneer; one is clad with composite siding. The majority of the Ranch Houses within the expanded boundary are of the Linear Ranch variety. The Linear Ranch is a long form that is twice as long as it is wide, usually with either an integrated carport or attached garage. The Taylor House (PU1730) is a Linear Ranch example with an attached garage and Colonial Revival details.

Other Ranch House sub-types found within the expanded boundary include the Carrie Johnson Duplex (PU1833), which can be categorized as a Courtyard Ranch. It exhibits two wings that create a courtyard on its façade. The Barlow House (PU1744) is a Compact Ranch house, the earliest form of Ranch House. It exhibits a short, rectangular form. Four properties are Ranch duplexes.

Five Ranch Houses are non-contributing. All but one date to after the period of significance for the expanded district; the remaining non-contributing house exhibits major alterations.

Commercial (2 contributing; 1 non-contributing):

Three commercial buildings are located within the expanded boundary, although only two are contributing. The Price Mobil Service Station (PU1951), located at the intersection of Wright Avenue and S. Gaines Street, is relatively unaltered and features a flat roof. Even though the Mitchell Brothers Building (PU1733) has been altered by the enclosure of all windows, it retains its basic, ca. 1890 form and parapet roof.

The remaining non-contributing commercial building dates to after the period of significance.

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Educational (1 contributing):

Constructed ca. 1906, Rightsell School, located at 911 West 19th Street, is a two-story, brick, hip roof H-plan structure with Colonial Revival details such as a concrete water table and inset brick panels. Additions were completed in 1930 and 1954. The school is named after Jacob R. Rightsell, the second superintendent of the Little Rock School District.⁴

Vacant Parcels (17 non-contributing):

Seventeen of the 46 non-contributing resources are vacant lots. The majority of these lots once contained buildings that have since been demolished, many in recent years.

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Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The period of significance begins with the date of the initial construction of the first residence within the district ca. 1880 and extends through ca. 1967, the date of the newest contributing buildings within the boundary expansion. The expanded boundary of the Governor's Mansion Historic District adds a contiguous area of the early to mid-twentieth century middle-class, interracial neighborhood to the district's western boundary. It is moreover representative of the evolution of a middle-class, interracial, mixed-use neighborhood throughout the early to mid-twentieth century, complementing existing patterns of development and residential settlement already conveyed by the National Register district. The expanded boundary area's architecture, filled primarily with Plain/Traditional, Craftsman, Minimal Traditional and Ranch resources, is reflective of the district's primary housing booms, during the early twentieth century, interwar period and post-World War II.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

In 1978, the Governor's Mansion Historic District, composed of 164 contributing resources was successfully nominated to the National Register of Historic Places. At that time, the boundaries and period of significance for the district were defined so as to exclude a number of mid-twentieth century dwellings that did not appear to be fifty years of age or older, as well as those early twentieth century resources within this sector, and were not thought to sufficiently contribute to the significance of the neighborhood, despite the fact that they continue the evolutionary development patterns exhibited by earlier portions of the neighborhood, as its residents established an identity. The historic district was expanded in 1988 and 2002 to include the remaining contributing resources. The expanded boundary of the Governor's Mansion Historic District supports the district's eligibility under Criterion A in the area of community planning and development as it is consistently representative of the district's evolution as an early to mid-twentieth century mixed class, mixed race and mixed-use neighborhood favored by employees of the newly developed railroad.⁵

Originally part of "Rosewood," the country estate that belonged to the last governor of the Arkansas Territory and one of the first two U.S. senators from the newly formed State of Arkansas, William Savin Fulton, the area was purchased by the state in 1869, although the

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majority remained underdeveloped until the 1880s.⁶ Development spread from north to south into what was then known as Wright's Addition, bordered by Wright Avenue to the north, West 21st Street to the south, and South Cross and Ringo Streets on the west and east, respectively. From West 21st Street south to Roosevelt Road, development moved into Wat Worthen's Addition. The area within the expanded boundary was the last of the Governor's Mansion neighborhood and neighboring Dunbar neighborhood, known collectively as Central City, to develop and contains a mixture of houses dating from the early twentieth century through the interwar years, although the majority (61%) was developed post World War I.⁷

While the neighborhood within the expanded boundary was primarily white in the early twentieth century, it was a transitory neighborhood in that it contained African American residents as well, due to its proximity to the predominantly African American Dunbar neighborhood. In fact, Chester Street, on the western edge of the expanded boundary served as the "dividing line" between white and African American residents.⁸ Many of its African-American residents were employed by white families within the neighborhood or were clergymen, barbers, chauffeurs, mail carriers and clerks, cooks and maids. Employees of the railroads were also predominant residents. Some white residents were similarly employed, while others were lawyers, doctors, teachers and businessmen.

During the mid-twentieth century, the Governor's Mansion neighborhood, as well as surrounding neighborhoods began to decline. This was largely due to "white flight" to the suburbs because of school integration and the demolition of large swaths of houses to clear blight and for highway construction.⁹ While the neighborhood as a whole, including the expanded boundary, experienced some of this decline, two events saved the overall neighborhood this fate. The construction of the current Governor's Mansion in 1950 and the creation of the Quapaw Quarter Association in 1961, which largely protected what was left of the area by encouraging the rehabilitation and restoration of historic properties.¹⁰

The expanded boundary of the Governor's Mansion Historic District also supports eligibility of the existing National Register district under Criterion C in the area of architecture as a local example of an early twentieth century neighborhood that evolved to accommodate the housing booms of the interwar period and the post-World War II era, as the neighborhood continued to evolve and form its identity. The expanded boundary contains examples of various architectural styles and plans from the late nineteenth century to the mid-twentieth century; including Queen

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Anne, Colonial Revival, Craftsman, Tudor (English) Revival, American Foursquare, American Small House (Minimal Traditional), and Ranch Houses.

The original nomination states that while “The Governor’s Mansion Historic District is not the oldest and was not the most affluent of Little Rock’s 19th century neighborhoods, it does retain an unusual degree of visual, architectural cohesiveness with structures representing every major architectural style used during Little Rock’s dynamic growth period in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.”¹¹ Even though they were constructed on a somewhat smaller scale, the houses in the expanded boundary complement those in the original nomination as well as the neighboring Paul Laurence Dunbar Historic District as part of the “Central City” area, not varying significantly in character or composition. Those that exhibit traditional stylistic elements are predominant, such as elements of Queen Anne, Craftsman, Colonial Revival, Dutch Colonial Revival and Tudor Revival styles.

Added to this are a number of mid-twentieth century residences characterized by the American Small House or Ranch form, which became common, affordable, and efficient constructions in the post-World War II era as new residents built upon previously vacant parcels or as existing residents replaced older dwellings as a result of improved means during the period. While a number of these originally fell outside of the district’s period of significance, they are now included as a reflection of the continued community development of the area during the mid-twentieth century. Much like their predecessors, these later forms also reflect the “varied popular tastes in architecture” for the period and bear witness to the evolution of architectural character within the district as it sought to retain stability and hold fast to its identity in the post-war period.

Conclusion

The expanded district offers a more complete representation of the Governor’s Mansion neighborhood as it continued to evolve in the early to mid-twentieth century as development patterns shifted to accommodate African-American residents to the west, and to some extent, white residents, and to allow existing residents to build new housing. Expansion of the district in the western quadrant anchors the neighborhood to the established district, as well as surrounding neighborhoods of the same period and composition, and creates a more cohesive district, which is reflected in the evolution of its building stock and composition.

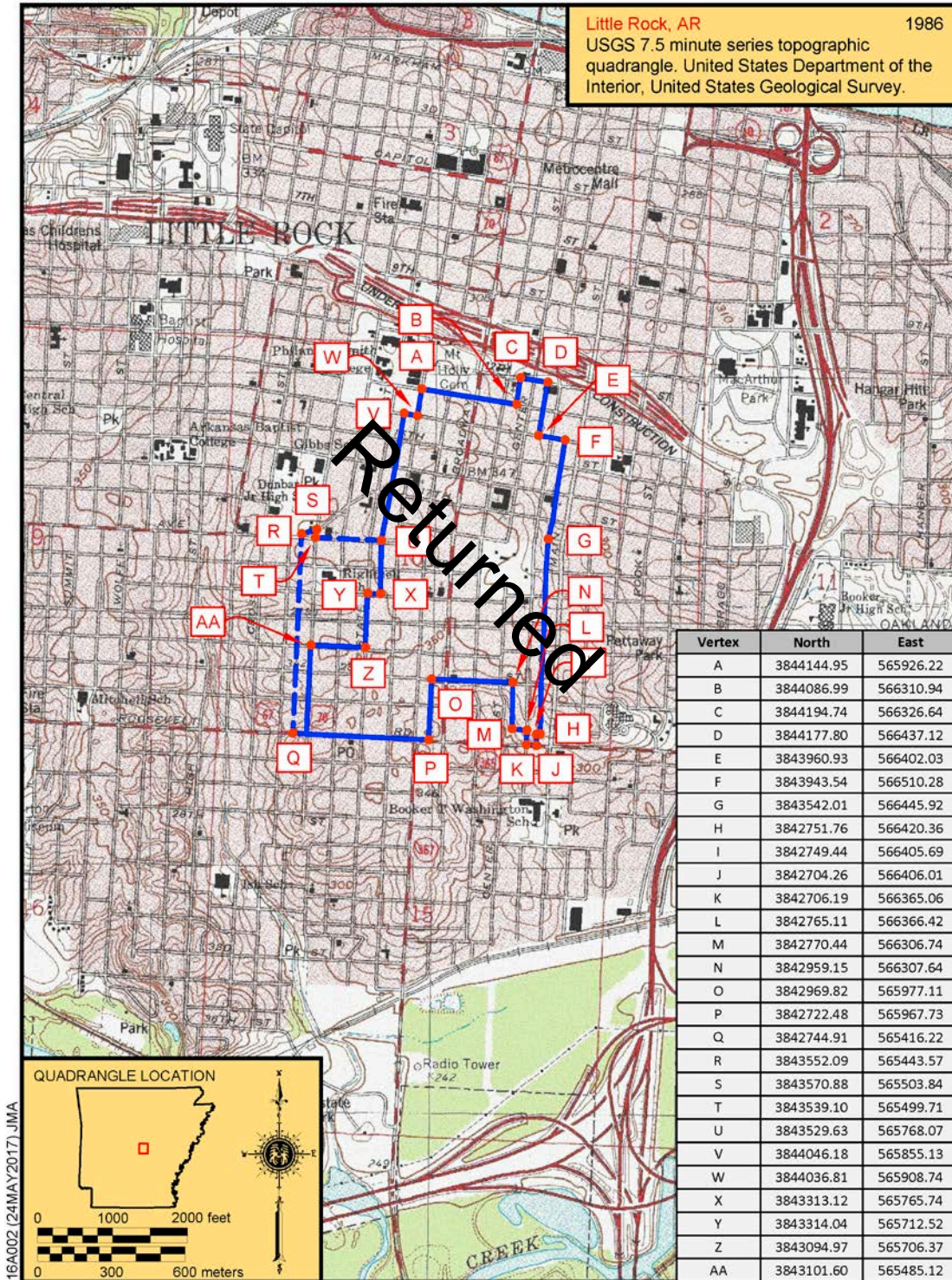

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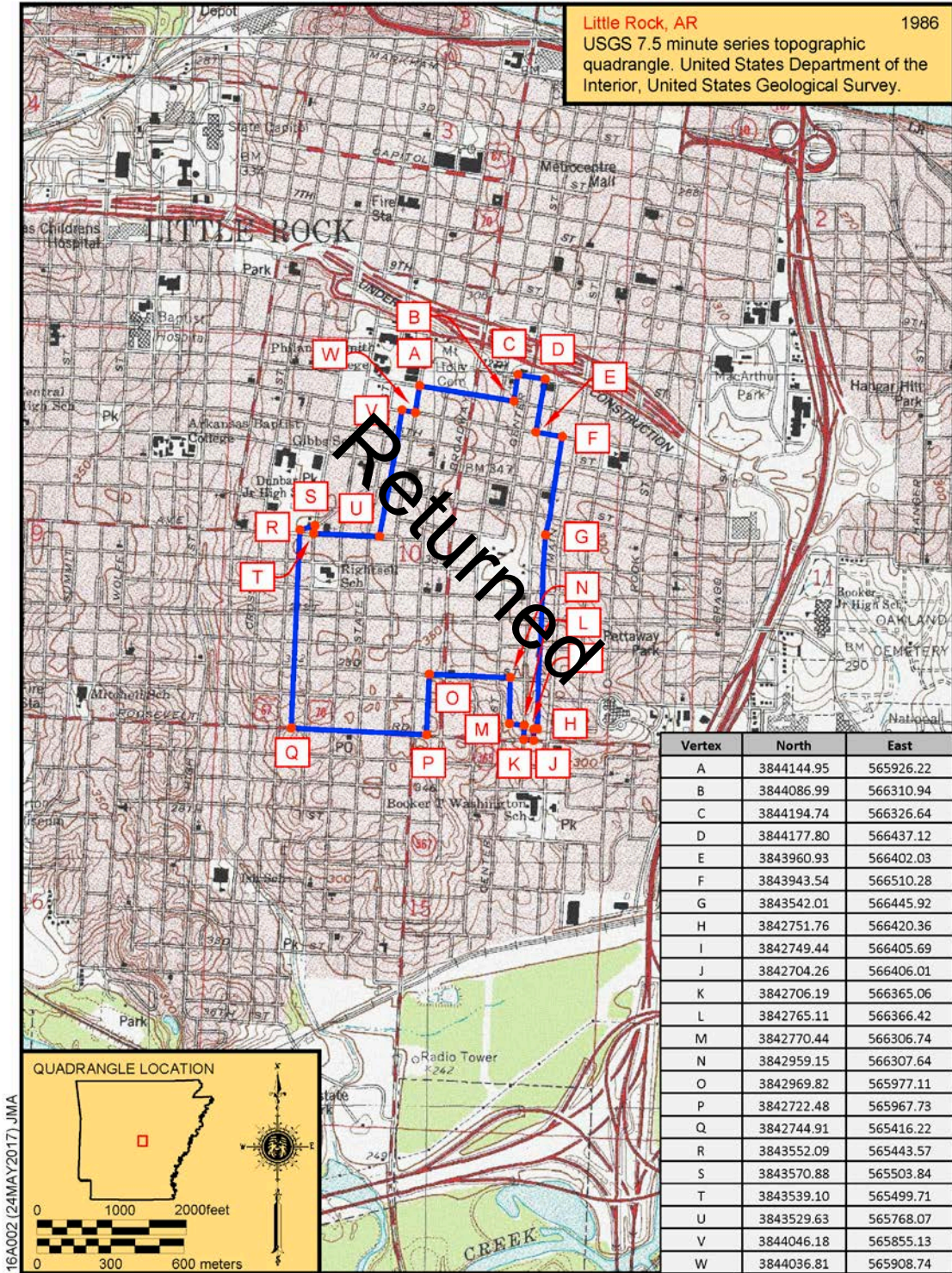
USGS topographic quadrangle showing the original boundary and expansion area.

Reason for Return

The Governor's Mansion Historic District (Boundary Increase and Additional Documentation) nomination is being returned for technical and substantive revision. This document's issues illustrate why we often recommend that boundary increases and additional documentation be done as separate actions.

Substantive issues

The areas of significance indicated in Section 8 are Community Planning and Development, Architecture, Religion, and Education. The original nomination, and the two subsequent boundary increases, cited only Criterion C, with Architecture as the area of significance. This boundary increase (or the additional documentation) do not address or support significance in Community Planning and Development, Religion, or Education. The architectural context (and subsequent identification of a period of significance) is lacking a comparative context.

The original nomination, and especially the 1988 Boundary Increase, were careful in describing the character of the district and delineating the period of significance to exclude the post WWII years. Using statistics to demonstrate that even Depression-era construction tapered off, the period of significance ended c. 1939. (The second boundary increase, from 2002, has a period of significance that extends to 1952, but that applies only to that nomination.) The 1988 nomination notes that the eastern, southern, and western boundaries were chosen because they are easily distinguishable. To the west, blocks of similar resources were "excluded because of the extent of alteration and demolition its buildings have suffered" and that "only where resources are sufficiently intact merit inclusion;" the nomination further notes that "few resources on the west side (of Chester) could be considered contributing."

Any attempt to expand further the boundary of the district needs to counter explicitly these previous justifications. There needs to be a more detailed reasoning behind extending the period of significance to include the post WWII resources, an explanation of their relative architectural importance and why they support a sense of time and place, and a definitive discussion and justification of the extent of boundaries. The "50 year cutoff" is not meant to be mechanically applied to properties. There needs to be justification for both including the newly-nominated area AND for adding 30 years to the larger Governor's Mansion HD's period of significance. Using language like "representative examples of domestic architecture" needs to be supported by a comparative analysis within the broader context of Little Rock. If Community Planning and Development, Religion, and Education are claimed for the newly nominated area, each of these areas of significance needs to be explained and justified within the broader context of Little Rock. Issues brought up in the conclusion found on page 51 might be explored more in-depth, especially related to African American residences. Is this boundary increase really related in history and development to the 1988 boundaries of the Governor's mansion HD, or is it better related to the Paul Laurence Dunbar School Historic District?

If you answer these substantive issues and resubmit the nomination, please address the following technical issues as well.

Technical issues

This is the third boundary increase to the district; the name should reflect that: "Governor's Mansion Historic District (Boundary Increase III and Additional Documentation)."

The address given for property PU1951, the Price Mobile Service Station, is 2708 S. Gaines, which would be outside of the district boundaries. The building in question is at the corner of Wright Avenue and Chester Street.

Why are properties in the Boundary Increase noted as buildings when they no longer exist? For example, 2016-2018 S. State is identified as "Savoy Duplex" and counted as NC (demolished); for all intents and purposes, this is a vacant lot. Please delete references to properties that no longer exist.

There is no site map included. Please provide a map that depicts the area nominated and the status of resources within. A photo key map should also be included. The map should also indicate the previously-listed district boundaries (all three).

The acreage provided in Section 10 seems to be for the original district and the three boundary increases. The acreage should reflect the newly nominated portion, which appears to be less than 50 acres.

The Verbal Boundary Description has at least one typographical error: the distance following Roosevelt Road is noted as "0.3" miles, where it most likely should be "0.03." Please make sure that the VBD is accurate.

In Section 9, "previously listed in National Register" is checked. I did not notice any individually listed properties in the boundary increase area. This should only be checked for the newly nominated area.
