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7. Description

The Carson Roller Mill is a three story wood frame building with gabled, shed, and hipped roofs. The main rectangular structure was extended in the original construction in a long shed-roofed grain receiving area on the south side, and in a basement engine room to the west end. Hip-roofed storage additions were constructed on the east end of the building in 1922. Exterior walls are sheathed in stamped sheet metal siding, and roofs are covered with composite asphalt shingles over the original wood shingles. Fenestration is simple one-over-one double-hung windows placed to light the main interior work areas. A structure suspended from the second story level of the north side of the building once housed equipment for loading of grain into railroad cars on a special spur line serving the mill.

The interior of the mill apparently contains all original equipment installed between 1913 and 1919, and also disc grain cleaners installed in 1924. A single-cylinder 32-horsepower Fairbanks and Morse kerosene engine provides power to pulleys and drive belts that extend in series to the third floor of the mill. Roller mills and grain cleaning equipment are on the ground and second floors, and are served by a labyrinth of wooden chutes. Heating in the building is provided by a single stove in the south shed area, where originally the office work and bookkeeping were done. Interior spaces have not been altered from original construction, with the exception of entryways cut to accomodate access to the storage additions of 1922.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Carson Roller Mill was built in 1913 by a group of pioneer Carson residents led by businessman and prominent regional promoter Richard Mott. The business opened in 1913 under the direction of head miller A.W. Berkner, who also lived with his family in the south wing of the mill. In 1914 a railroad spur was constructed to the mill, which was by that time turning out 45 barrels of "Wild Rose Flour" each day by operating around the clock. The market for the flour was primarily local, but by 1918 the mill was also shipping its products to firms in Boston and Minneapolis. The early history of the mill included frequent changes in management and millers, until the business was purchased by the Muggli Brothers of Glen Ullin, North Dakota, in 1919. Vincent Muggli became general manager and miller, and continued to operate the mill until 1960. The mill has been maintained in operating condition since 1960 for purposes of grain cleaning and treatment.

The Carson Roller Mill is the only known roller flour mill in North Dakota to remain essentially unaltered and to contain its original equipment. Roller mills were a common fleature of trade-center towns of the initial settlement period in the State, but the mill buildings and equipment have generally been lost through demolition, fire, or incorporation into grain elevator complexes. The Carson Roller Mill is therefore a rare and valuable example of industrial technology related to the commerce and industry of North Dakota's early settlement period.
