Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Irvin General Merchandise Store is a two-story brick commercial building located in downtown Cornelia, Habersham County, Georgia. Extending the full width of a city block with an older facade facing Irvin Street and a new facade fronting on Hodges Street, it is flanked by other commercial structures.

Both store facades are constructed of brick laid in common bond and are divided into three bays by brick piers. The earlier, probably ca. 1904, Irvin Street facade has, on the first floor, a recessed central entrance flanked by large plateglass windows. The present appearance of this storefront area results from a recent certified rehabilitation of the building and closely resembles the historic appearance of the first floor. On the second floor, this facade has pairs of segmental arched windows with a brick string course and corbeled cornice above. The Hodges Street facade, which dates from sometime between 1922 and 1932, when the building was extended to the rear, is similar but more modern in design. It has the same arrangement of bays with a brick string course and corbeled cornice in low relief. In 1940, when the Belk Company bought this building, a facelift was performed on both facades and the interior. At this time, the windows on the second floor of the Hodges Street facade were bricked in, and glass double doors, plateglass windows, black tile trim, and a rectangular panel of black and white tile (which originally advertised "Belk Gallant Co." in large letters) were added to both facades. The Hodges Street facade remains intact from that date. More recently, an aluminum false facade was added to and then removed from the Irvin Street facade.

Prior to the recent certified rehabilitation of the building, the interior contained two open floors and a mezzanine with display cases and closets along the walls on all floors. Twelve columns in two rows, rounded on the first floor and square on the second, rose through both floors. The mezzanine is still supported by eight of these. Presently, the Irvin Street half of the first floor is subdivided into offices. Original columns in this area are still visible, and a skylight, covered over in a 1940s Belk remodeling, has been reinstalled in its original location. The rear (Hodges Street area) of the first floor and the second floor remain open areas with ceilings and lighting fixtures dating from the 1940s. A new stair has been constructed along the east wall in the rear area. On the second floor, an original atrium area has been boxed in to provide finished walls connecting the first-floor library and the skylight.

The building, located in the central business district of downtown Cornelia, has no landscaping. It is part of a block of historic buildings which faces the railroad track that bisects the community. The buildings appear to date from the early 1900s, although some facades have been recently altered.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Irvin General Merchandise Store is historically significant in the areas of architecture and commerce. <u>Architecturally</u>, the building is significant as a landmark historic building in downtown Cornelia. It is one of the oldest and the largest historic commercial structures with an intact facade in Cornelia. The contrast between the largely Victorian turn-of-the-century front facade and the more modern 1920s rear facade reflects both the evolution of this building and changing architectural tastes in the early twentieth century. In terms of <u>commerce</u>, the building is significant for its association with the Irvin General Merchandise Store, a large general store that serviced Cornelia and the surrounding mountain counties for many years. The above areas of significance support property eligibility under National Register criteria A and C.

Architecturally, this turn-of-the-century building is a good example of a late-Victorian general store in small-town Georgia. Its load-bearing brick construction and the segmental arched windows, string course, and corbeled cornice of the earlier (Irvin Street) facade are typical of this style and period. The slightly later 1920s rear (Hodges Street) facade provides an interesting contrast and provides evidence of changing architectural tastes in the early twentieth century. Built of the same material and retaining the same architectural elements--piers, string course and cornice--it nevertheless presents a more streamlined appearance, with simpler and less three-dimensional detailing than the earlier facade. The exterior of the building remains largely intact despite some cosmetic changes made by the Belk-Gallant Company in 1940. Significant interior features include the rows of wooden columns.

In terms of <u>commerce</u>, the building is important as the home of a large general store which evolved over the years into a modern deparmtent store. The city of Cornelia was chartered in 1887. It developed at the junction of two rail lines which were built in 1872 and 1882, bringing immediate commercial development to the area. One of the earliest businesses to begin operating was a general store, apparently housed in a wooden structure and located on the present side of the Irvin General Merchandise Store. In 1884, this business was sold to Peter King and I.T. Sellers, who, in turn, in 1904, sold it to G.B. Irvin. The existing brick structure was probably built by Irvin at this time. Under Irvin's ownership, the general store evolved into one of the largest department stores in this rural section of the state. Its location, across from the railroad tracks near Cornelia's transportation hub, facilitated the delivery of merchandise. Typically, the store provided a wide range of goods and services that included furniture, dry goods, clothing, and even funeral arrangements.


6. Representation in Existing Surveys

The Irvin General Merchandise Store received a Preliminary Certification of Significance from the Preservation Services Branch, National Register Program Division, National Park Service, Southeast Regional Office, on February 11, 1982.

8. Significance

The Irvin family managed the store until 1940, when the Belk-Gallant Company leased the structure, modernized it, and continued to operate it as a department store. The store closed finally in 1979, a victim of an out-of-town shopping center which drew Belk's and shoppers away from downtown Cornelia. The Irvin General Merchandise Store and later the Belk-Gallant Company serviced a market for a wide variety of retail goods that extended into several mountain counties.




IRVIN GERERAL MERCHANDISE STORE Cornelia, Habersham County, Georgia
