The South River Club is on the south side of South River Club Road, one mile east of Route Maryland 2; four-tenths mile west of Route Maryland 468.

The design and dimensions of this present second building are original. Fire in 1740 destroyed an earlier clubhouse and its preceeding records. The frame, white weatherboard, one-and-a-half story, one-room clubhouse is covered with a low pitched "A" roof. The exterior chimney stands at the east end. A brick-floored porch covers the front entrance door (N) and a shuttered north window; on the west are two windows, of similar design to those on the north side. The south elevation has a door and a window, each corresponding to those on the north side. Any changes or additions since the 1742 rebuilding were in order to preserve the building for the comfort and convenience of its members who have been using it continuously for 225 years.

In 1793, when the second clubhouse was in years old, it underwent extensive repairs at which time much of the outside weatherboard was mended or replaced as were the sills and some of the floor board. New doors replaced original ones; interior walls were replastered. In 1806 the windows in the west end were installed. In 1909 an awning was extended between the back (S) door of the clubhouse and the detached kitchen building for convenience in bad weather. This innovation is no longer used but the sockets for its supporting pipes can still be seen. In 1910 a well was dug and 1914 saw the front (N) porch added.

The interior wall covering is plaster. The crane and iron cooking utensils used in the early days of the club stand in the east-end open fireplace which still suffices to heat the building even in cold weather.

A loft above the room is accessible only by ladder. The rafters are dovetailed together. There is no ridge pole.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

The South River Club, reputedly the first to have been established by English settlers in the colonies, survives to the mid-twentieth century as the oldest continuously used social club in the Americas.

John Gassaway, in the original deed, stated he was deeding the land to The South River Club because his father, Colonel Nicholas Gassaway, had sold it for club use for "...eight pounds." John C. Nicholas & Thomas Gassaway were among the charter members when the club was founded in 1690.

The South River Club originally took its precedent from the English club which commanded a prominent, important place in British social and intellectual life. The early members of this colonial club included prominent landowners, the local doctor of medicine, the clergyman from All Hallow's Church and one of two distinguished merchants. The members lived within a ten-mile radius known as the South River neighborhood, an expression of the earlier "South River Hundred." These men, with their Anglo-Saxon heritage, living in near-wilderness isolation, had the precedent and the need for such a club. During the pre-Revolutionary years the Club met for all day on Thursday of each week and served as a haven of companionship and an exchange of information. After the Civil War the meetings were less frequent. Conversation was purposely directed to farming, commerce, boating, horseracing; religion and politics were taboo subjects as were the pastimes of gambling and cards. Perhaps these rules account for the Club's survival and today congeniality still transcends difference of opinion.

The Rector of All Hallow's Church, 1738-1760, the Reverend William Brogdan; Turnor Wootton, a Delegate from Prince George's County born in England in 1695, "...was a member of that club..." (<u>Maryland in Law & History</u>, Judge Edward S. Delaplaine, Vantage, 1964, pp.183); our internationally famous Captain Philip Van Horn Weems, USN, developer of the Weems Navigation System for Sea and Air, are among our illustrious members. #8. SIGNIFICANCE

The minutes of the club have been kept faithfully since 1740, the year the earlier house and the records, to that date, were totally destroyed by fire. There is, however, evidence of a club existing in 1723 and strong evidence that it goes back to 1700. By 1746 it was referred to as "...the ancient South River Club."

The tiny South River Club continues to flourish. The twenty-five members today can count dozens of ancestors from the Club's two-and-a-quarter century annual lists. When it meets, as it still does, four times a year, the menu features the same Southern Maryland delicacies and the exact same potent recipe for the secretly concocted punch that has warmed ancestors and descendants alike for two hundred and twentyfive years.

At the southeast corner of the intersection of Route Maryland 2 (Solomons Island Road) and S. River Clubhouse Road, a State Roads Commission marker reads:

> "THE OLD SOUTH RIVER CLUB (1 MILE <----) ORGANIZED CIRCA 1700 HOUSE BUILT 1742 THE OLDEST SOCIAL CLUB IN AMERICA (FIRST ROAD TO THE LEFT)"
