Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hines round barn is approximately 200 feet in circumference. In reality it has 20 sides with walls of poured concrete in approximate 10 foot sections. The floor is dirt and the interior walls are lined with stalls. Openings are on the east, west and south and have double sliding doors. The central scaffolding has been enclosed on the ground floor and used for a tack room. A stairway against the east wall leads to the second floor. Ten 2½ feet square windows are placed in the alternating sections of the low walls. The roof rises in 2 vertical ribbed sections to the peak. The roof is supported only in the center by a circular scaffolding. Planks cover the vertical ribs horizontally on the exterior and corrugated metal covers these planks.

The concrete walls were painted white in the 1940s. The metal roofing is painted silver.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hines round barn is significant because of its architectural uniqueness as one of three round barns in Oklahoma and because of its association with W. R. Hines well-known eastern Oklahoma financier.

Hines was born in 1865 in Cowan, Tennessee, to Scotch-Irish parents. In the late 1800s he moved with his wife to Milsap, Texas. In 1898 he moved with is wife and four children to Sallisaw where he opened the Palace Drug Store. Later as business prospered he opened one of the first banks in Sallisaw and a number of other banks in other eastern Oklahoma towns. At the same time he began purchasing farms (some through cancelled bank loans) that he rented to share croppers. In 1912 he began building the barn directly west of his large 2 story home on Adams Street. He wanted a large barn to use as central hay and grain storage for all his farms and to house cattle and other livestock. Why he decided to build the barn in a circular plan is not known.

The concrete walls were built up in 10 foot sections making the barn appear round though it is actually multi-sided. The roof has two sections of vertical ribbing with support only at the peak from a center scaffolding from the ground floor.

The circular opening in the center of the barn was used for pulling grain up to the second floor. A winching system was used to bring bales of hay through second story window openings.

Hines died in 1916 at age 51. However the property remained in the Hines family until it was sold to R. C. Williams about 1947. Williams used the barn for his quarter-horses.

The barn, once in a rural setting has been surrounded on the west, north and south by single family housing. The housing to the west is recent, 1970s-1980s. That to the north and east from the 1930s and 1940s. To the south is open pasture (some 100 acres) still owned by the Williams family.
