

AMERICAN NATIONAL BANK BUILDING

DESCRIPTION

Constructed in 1909, the American National Bank Building is located on the southeast corner of State Avenue and Main Street; the central intersection of commercial downtown Alamosa. It faces west onto State Avenue and occupies the entire north 25 feet of lots 1, 2, and 3 of Block 51 of the original Town of Alamosa. A one-story brick commercial building abuts the south wall, and a narrow alley is on the north. The American National Bank Building, an example of the Arcaded Block building type, is in excellent condition. Although the building is a full two stories in height, the second floor spaces only extend 40 feet into the 75 foot long rectangular structure. In the rest of the building, the main first floor banking area is open above to the full two story height. The building retains a high degree of integrity in terms of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.

The flat roof is supported by 2x10 lumber and is covered with rubberized roofing material. The building sits on a brick faced foundation, consisting of wood joists reinforced with concrete blocks, that is topped with a sandstone watertable. Walls are of pressed white brick on the west and north facades and red brick on the south and east. Walls extend to form a stepped parapet, topped with a metal cornice. On the upper portion of the south wall there is a ghost sign advertising the bank as having \$130,000 in capital assets.

The building's defining and most distinctive architectural features are the tall, evenly spaced, rounded arches on the west and north facades. The arches frame recessed, wood framed fixed windows or doors with transoms. Above are several courses of brick, topped with sandstone serving as sills, for the transom windows that fill the arch tops. The original hardware for opening the transom windows is still operational. The arch tops are formed with three rows of brick voussoirs with keystones that extend into a basket weave brick belt course above. Above the belt course are decorative brick roundels, approximately two feet in diameter, filled with what resembles stained glass set in circular pattern muntins. Above the brick roundels are long horizontal panels, defined by brick work, where metal letters used to hang identifying the building as "The American National Bank". On the west, there are three arches, the middle wider than the side two. The northern arch frames the State Avenue entrance door. The seven arches on the north, along Main Street, include five with windows centered and ribboned together, and one near each end framing doorways.


The building ceased to function as a bank in 1951, but very few changes have been made to the interior except removal of bank furnishings and replacement of linoleum. Remaining in the building are the original hot water heating unit (patent date 1904, no patent number); four original radiators; the original pressed metal ceiling in the second floor; and the original two-story concrete vault, with two vault doors downstairs and one upstairs. The building has housed a retail floral shop since 1979. The upper floor office space is used for storage, as are the vaults. The east end night watchman's room, accessible by a narrow half-turned staircase, is not in use.

SIGNIFICANCE

Criterion A - Commerce

The American National Bank Building is significant under Criterion A in the area of Commerce. In 1905, the bank, initially incorporated as the Bank of San Juan, opened for business in an earlier building. At that time, a new bank in town, especially one started by investors from around the state, was seen as proof positive that Alamosa and the San Luis Valley were soon to become a major commercial center.

The new American National Bank Building was constructed in 1909 as Alamosa and the San Luis Valley experienced population and economic growth. Several nearby communities, such as Moffat and Blanca, were formed around 1910 through land drawings by the Oklahoma Land and Colonization Company. Such land developments, as well as the expanded Homestead Act of 1909, brought additional potential farmers to the area. Local newspapers willingly touted the wide variety of crops and livestock that could thrive in the valley.

The bank described itself in newspaper advertisements as a "conservative and safe repository for people's money, with continually growing capital assets." The imposing new building, at the intersection of State Avenue and Main Street was intended to show faith in the future of Alamosa. No other bank building survives in Alamosa from this period of growth and optimism, as The First National Bank and the Alamosa National Bank buildings have been replaced with modern edifices. The virtually intact American National Bank building reflects an important phase of downtown Alamosa's commercial development.

Criterion C - Architecture

The American National Bank Building is significant under Criteria C for Architecture as a rare local example of an Arcaded Block, a building type associated with the growth of early 20th century downtown business districts. Its construction, in 1909, reflected the general perception of prosperity then existing in Alamosa and Colorado.

Most arcaded blocks were built in the early decades of the 20th century, and "were designed primarily for banks and large retail stores" (Longstreth 118). Although there is no architect of record, the building's exterior exhibits "a series of tall, evenly spaced, round-arched openings extending across a wide facade" (Longstreth 118), defining characteristics of the type. The open, two-story height of its primary interior space further reflects the efforts of banking establishments to project an image of dignity and stability. The building retains a high degree of integrity and is downtown Alamosa's only example of the type.

Historical Background

In May 1909, the Alamosa Courier reported that the American National Bank would be erecting a modern bank building at State and Main. On June 16, 1909, the Alamosa Town Council granted permission to the bank to drill an artesian well, and on July 21 granted permission to the bank to erect a two-story brick building. By October, both Alamosa newspapers carried front page ads explaining that during the erection of the new building the bank offices would be located in the Emperius Building. On Monday, February 7, 1910, the new bank building opened for business. The building was sold to Gilbert and Ruth Griffith in 1951. It was converted to retail space and has been operated as a flower shop since 1979.

With investors from Denver, Colorado Springs, and Grand Junction, the bank had opened for business in 1905, under the name of the Bank of San Juan, reportedly to take advantage of a time of prosperity: "The San Luis Valley lands today are the only first-class lands in this state with good water...that is partly why we decided to invest money here and open the American National Bank. Then the geographical location of this town will make it a railroad center of still greater importance, while the sheep, cattle and general agricultural interests of this section will take on unprecedented growth." (Alamosa Independent Journal, Sept. 15, 1905)

Alamosa's two weekly newspapers advertised large real estate developments in town, with one on the Rio Grande River including 400 lots. The Alamosa rail yards were switching both narrow gauge and standard gauge trains that shipped passengers, agricultural produce, and mine products in all directions. This major rail hub employed over 600 people by 1920 and provided the major support for Alamosa's economy.
