DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Malaguerra Winery complex is composed of four sections. Of these, two are of historical interest: the original rubblestone winery building (1869) and an attached rubblestone barn (1904). The other two sections are modern intrusions which will be removed by the proposed restoration.

The two-story winery building is located in the northwest quadrant of the complex. It is nearly square, 22' x 24', and is constructed of basalt rubblestone. The exterior walls have been stuccoed and painted white. The gable roof of this building is nearly covered by the larger roof of the barn. There is no chimney, but there are gas fired space heaters in the kitchen.

The Malaguerra Winery is sited at the eastern edge of the Santa Clara Valley and the foothills of the Diablo Range rise immediately behind it. The original winery building has no interior stairway connecting the first and second floors. Because of the sloping site both the basement and main floor can be entered at grade level. On the west facade there is a double wooden door entering the basement. The main floor of the winery building is accessible on the south side through a modern stuccoed frame addition.

The basement has a large single room broken up by four wooden posts which support the floor above. The main floor has been used as a residence and is divided into three rooms by wooden partitions. These partitions do not appear to be original to the building. The four interior walls have been plastered and the floor is constructed of 2" wide soft wooden boards.

There are two one-over-one sash windows located on the west facade at the main floor level. A star-shaped unglazed opening in the gable of this facade presumably was used to ventilate the attic space. On the north there is a single large a aluminum frame casement window which opens into the kitchen. All windows have deeply splayed interior reveals.

A trapezoidal frame addition, approximately 14' x 26', has been attached to the original stone building. This addition has a gable roof and provides the only access to the main floor. The exterior of the addition has been stuccoed and painted white. It has two one-over-one aluminum frame casement windows on the west elevation. On the south elevation there is a pair of one-over-one aluminum frame windows at the southwest corner and a row of three one-over-one aluminum frame windows at the southeast corner. The doorway is between these window groups and may be reached from the poured concrete steps and porch. This addition was made after 1943, and will be removed when the complex is restored to its 1904 appearance.

The rectangular barn, 31' x 80' has basalt stone foundations and basalt rubblestone walls which have been painted white up a height of 8'. Above this is a 4' high wooden frame wall of ship-lapped siding. The barn has a single large interior space. Its roof is supported by an exposed crude truss system with a tie beam, queen posts, collar beam, two diagonal strutts above the collar beam, and, at irregular intervals, diagonal braces supporting the lower portion of the system. The barn roof extends over and covers almost completely the roof of the original stone winery building. Because the barn is built on a slope the basement and main floors may be entered at grade level. There is a large double door near the center

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The original 1869 portion of the Malaguerra Winery complex is one of the oldest remaining winery buildings in Santa Clara County. Although other vintners contemporaneous with Malaguerra have continued to produce nationally famous wines, most of their original winery buildings have been replaced. Plans for renovating the structure as a wine museum are being undertaken by the Friends of the Wine Makers; it will be brought back to its 1904 appearance

The original northwest portion of the Malaguerra Winery complex was built in 1869 for Jose Maria Malaguerra. Constructed of stones hauled from nearby Coyote Creek, it is completely stuccoed. A cartouche found on the west elevation bears the initials "C-M" and the date, 1869. Malaguerra's wife was Alvina Collins, hence the initials "C-M" may represent their monogram. The barn was built at the turn of the century. A living and sitting room addition was made to the 1869 structure sometime between 1930 and 1950.

Cultivation of grapes in the area on a commercially significant scale began in the early 1850's when William Wolfskill first sold northern California Napa grapes on the San Francisco Market. In 1861 an Hungarian immigrant Agoston Haraszthy of Sonoma County, traveled to Europe and returned to northern California with 20,000 cuttings, representing 1,400 varieties, of the finest vines in all Europe. During the early 1870's news of the destruction of French vineyards by the vine-attaching aphids Phylloxera gave rise to increased Californian viticulture. By the 1880's the disease appeared in the State and remained a threat into the 1890's. Gradually with the discovery that aphid-resistent American vines accepted grafted viniferas, the Phylloxera problem subsided.

The Malaguerra Wine operation may be considered typical of Santa Clara County's viticulsural development. During the mid-1890's there was a national depression; this coupled with the "Wine War", a period of gross overplanting after the <a href="Phylloxera">Phylloxera</a> problem subsided, undoubtedly contributed to the failure of the Malaguerra enterprise in 1898. The Malaguerra operation was expanded and continued at the turn of the century by Augustino A. Guglieri. The participation of Italians in California wine production became typical in Santa Clara County as can be seen at the Malaguerra Winery. The Guglieri family sold the property in 1920 to John Traverso who owned and managed the property until 1950. For nearly fifteen years the old Malaguerra Wine operation was operated as a chicken farm until it was purchased by the State.

At least one vintner was well established in San Jose by the 1850's (Carosso. The California Wine Industry 1830-1895. p. 46). Santa Clara County listed twenty-six vintner's in the 1860 census. At the time Malaguerra built his winery in 1869, Santa Clara County was gaining on Sonoma, Napa, and Los Angeles Counties as one of the State's leading wine producers.



of the west facade. The upper level is reached by a doorway set in a dormer opening on the east roof slope.

The modern frame shed-roof addition to the barn is located on the west elevation. It measured  $12' \times 13'$  and has a single window on the south elevation. It is built on a grade level concrete slab. This addition will be removed during restoration.

A large chicken barn of post-1950 construction stands on the property to the south of the winery. Because of its siting, it does not intrude significantly upon the historic setting of the Malaguerra Winery.
