Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance attach photo

The Van Trojen House sits on 160 acres of cleared and wooded land several miles west of Chimacum. Van Trojen established a homestead on this land in the 1870's and built a small cabin. The present house was constructed after Van Trojen was married in 1879. The dwelling is one and one-half stories with a gabled roof and shed roof dormers on either side. On the front side of the house, the slope of the gabled roof extends out over the veranda which runs the length of the house. Peeled posts support the roof here. The exterior walls are clad in milled rustic siding and the roof has wood shingles. Van Trojen's house remains remarkably unchanged. Electricity was brought to the site only three years ago. The house and original homestead land continue to be owned by Van Trojen's heirs.

8. SIGNIFICANCE

Specific dates c. 1879 Builder/Architect John Van Trojen	
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a. History

John Van Trojen, a native of the Netherlands, was sailing for the British Navy when in 1869, he jumped ship at Port Ludlow. After working at Port Ludlow, Van Trojen filed a homestead claim west of Chimacum. Van Trojen was married to Elizabeth Bishop, a daughter of a pioneer Chimacum settler, on August 8, 1879. To this union were born thirteen children.

b. Evaluation of Significance

The Van Trojen House is significant because of its representation of early homestead architecture. In Jefferson County, most early homestead structures are no longer existing or have been so altered that they no longer represent this type of architectural development. Even though the homestead was remote in relation to other developing homesteads, Van Trojen successfully farmed his land. He grew garden truck, had a dairy herd and creamery, was a stock breeder and poultry rancher.
