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Location: Property fronts on an arterial linking the University of California Campus to residential neighborhoods in Berkeley and Oakland. Neighborhood is primarily residential use, containing many excellent examples of San Francisco Bay Region Shingle Style residences. Many of the homes have been converted to multi-family use; others have been demolished for construction of low-rise apartment buildings.

<u>Property:</u> Three residential lots, with a number of additional portions of adjacent residential properties, totaling approximately 25,000 square feet, or 0.57 acre. Land slopes gently downhill from street. Residence located south of church at 2642 College Avenue is under same ownership.

Construction: Redwood and Douglas Fir framing exposed to the interior, with horizontal wood sheathing, board siding or shingles on exterior. Wood casement sash. Concrete foundations.

Fellowship Hall: Constructed 1908, north side of property. Single story, with partial basement, and caretaker's apartment on mezzanine level. 4,000 square feet main floor area.

Sanctuary: Constructed 1910, south side of property. Single story, with partial basement. 7,000 square feet main floor area.

Education wing: Constructed after 1910, west of sanctuary at rear of property. Two stories, 2,500 square feet per floor, with partial basement.

Alterations: Alter area was enlarged in 1954 to provide a larger choir area, new pulpit, and to accommodate installation of new organ. Organ pipes are now concealed. New roof over alter area was built at level of sanctuary roof, eliminating clerestory windows above pulpit. New pulpit, choir rail, etc. are not in character with original construction.

Condition: Structural condition is excellent. There is minor termite and dry-rot damage in a number of areas. Wood sash are in poor repair. Exterior siding and trim requires maintenance, particularly on south and west facades. Interior finishes are original, and in excellent condition. Alterations, including an automatic fire sprinkler system and widening of exits, will probably be required to satisfy local code requirements if building is used for public assembly under a new ownership.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

St. John's Presbyterian Church is an outstanding and irreplacable asset to Berkeley's cultural and architectural heritage. It has long been cited as an exemplary work of one of the region's foremost designers. Julia Morgan. While it is one of the earliest major non-residential commissions of this pioneering woman architect, it was not typical of her work, and herein lies one of its most interesting aspects. demands of the architectural program were such that a viable solution was extremely difficult to attain: essentially, the church wanted a sanctuary of more than 6,000 square feet but had a budget of less than \$10,000. Even at the time, this was an extraordinarily low sum. result was a wood frame building of the least expensive sound construction possible, with virtually no extraneous parts or applied ornament. roof trusses, and other framing was left exposed; however, these and the other extremely simple elements of the church were given extremely careful and thorough study so that their form and proportion would produce a desirable visual effect.

There were very few occasions when Julia Morgan faced economic restrictions of this extreme sort. The significant point is that she regarded such a problem as a challenge, that small and inexpensive work deserved as much attention and could be made to be as interesting as could major commissions. This attitude she shared with several other contemporaries in the Bay Region, most notably Bernard Maybeck. However, this attribute was held by few of her distinguished colleagues elsewhere in the country at the time. Once established in the profession. most were primarily concerned with large and prestigious commissions; when small ones were accepted, it was often simply to tie the office over during a slack period, and few such designs received very much study. Maybeck's and Morgan's interest in a wide variety of architectural expressions for an equally diverse set of problems is one of the most important elements in the contribution of Bay Region architecture in the early decades of the 20th century. Each job was designed for its own inherent potential, not attempting to be what it could not St. John's can be compared with hundreds of churches throughout the country which are aesthetic failures due to the fact that they have emulated elaborate ecclesiastical structures without having the budget to do so.

While a large number of houses in the Bay Region follow a solution not unlike St. John's, very few buildings of this nature which can be readily seen by the public were ever built, and an even smaller number exist today. Berkeley has one of the richest architectural heritages of any suburban town in the country; the loss of St. John's would not only be a major one for the community, but would be a significant one for the country as a whole.
