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7' DESCRIPTION

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Corral de Piedra site was identified and recorded in the winter of 1976 during a cultural resource field reconnaissance conducted by Dr. Robert Hoover, Associate Professor of Anthropology at California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo. The reconnaissance was performed to aid in the preparation of a cultural resource assessment of properties within an area suggested by Diamond Plastics as the site of an open-pit mining operation. The reconnaissance involved a complete surface inspection of the proposed project area. As a result of this reconnaissance, a prehistoric/prothistoric archaeological site was identified and recorded in addition to the historic site named above. The prehistoric site has been nominated for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places.

The boundaries of this site are depicted on the accompanying sketch map; they encompass an area of approximately one acre. The boundaries of the site were delimited using surface evidence, i.e. stone features. No evidence was observed to indicate the presence of a subsurface.

The site is composed of a rectangular dry stone wall enclosure and a mortared brick and stone feature, possibly the remains of a fireplace. The enclosure is constructed of small boulders averaging approximately 12 inches in diameter and has an average height of approximately 18 inches. The enclosure is open to the east. A smaller dry stone wall, having an L-shape configuration, is attached to the enclosure at its northeast corner; this wall extends approximately 15 meters northward and has an average height of 12 inches. The mortared brick and stone feature, having a height of 16 inches, is located approximately 45 meters north of the enclosure's northeast corner (see attached sketch map).

The site is located in an area of low sandstone hills covered by vegetation of the oak-woodland type. It is situated on the eastern aspect of one such hill overlooking the upper reaches of Price Canyon. A small intermittent streamcourse is located immediately east of the site and forms its eastern boundary. A large grassy clearing ringed by oak trees is located to the north of the site proper.

The site has retained good integrity and only minor disturbance of the stone features appears to have occurred. Modern intrusions upon the site consist of cattle grazing and the occasional use of the site by campers.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The remains of Corral de Piedra constitute a part of the ever-dwindling observable evidence.concerning land utilization practices during the Mexican period in California's historic past. The site's locale was noted for the large herds of "wild" cattle which were allowed to roam, muhindered by fences, during this period. Corrals of stone, such as the Corral de Piedra represents, were constructed to meet the needs of the owners of these herds. These corrals, or enclosures, were utilized to contain small parts of the herd during the times of branding and slaughtering of cattle to provide the owners with meat for their own use.

The importance of the Corral de Piedra is further enhanced by its association with Jose Maria Villaviciencio, an important Mexican Californian of the period, and its use in the identification of the land grant given to him. Villaviciencio, or Villa as he was sometimes called, played a prominent role in California's military events and politics of the period.

Villaviciencio, holding the rank of captain, served on the side of the rebels in the California Rebellion of 1836; upon the surrender of Monterey by Munoz, Villa was directed to take charge of the arms. He acted as administrator of San Antonio from 1837 to 1838 and San Fernando during the period 1840 to 1843; in addition to the above, he served as acting prefect of Monterey in 1840.

Villa was granted ownership of the Rancho Corral de Piedra in February of 1841. At this time he was given only three square leagues of land. In 1846, the grant was enlarged to include seven square leagues. The grant was named after the stone enclosure located within the area given and was shown on the grant diseno (map).

After acquiring ownership of the Rancho Corral de Piedra, Villa served as juez de paz (justice of the peace) and captain de defensores for San Luis Obispo.

The Rancho de Piedra was also one of the first properties purchased by the famed Steele brothers who are credited with the establishment of the dairy industry within the San Luis Obispo area.

Historically, the extant remains of the Corral de Piedra site is significant for its association with Jose Maria Villaviciencio and the Mexican California period. Predating 1841, the Corral represents a rare historic archaeological resource.
