Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The Hagerstown Day Nursery is a two story, three bay painted brick structure dating from the second quarter of the 19th century. It is situated at the northeast corner of the intersection of East Washington and North Locust Streets in Hagerstown, Washington County, Maryland. The front of the building faces south onto East Washington Street.

The masonry walls display flemish bonding at the front elevation. Flat arches of brick are located above the openings. An unusual feature of the front of the house is the central bay which projects from the main facade the width of one brick. Brick parapets finish the gable walls. A three bay ell, apparently built at two times, extends to the rear.

Windows at the first story are smaller than those at the second story level. Those at the lower level have twelve over eight pane sashes while upper sashes have twelve over twelve panes. This is an unusually late use of this type of window. The central front second story window is flanked by narrow sidelights with three lights per sash. At the rear portion of the building nine over six and nine over nine light sashes are used at the first and second floors respectively.

The main entrance is located in the central bay of the front elevation. The door has had its upper panels replaced with a large glass pane. The entrance is topped with a five light transom. A second entrance to the rear wing opens off Locust Street. Three other doors are located on the east and north elevations.

Chimneys are located inside the end walls and at the interior of the ell. Asphalt shingles are the present roof covering.

The interior of the Day Nursery is divided into five rooms at the first floor with a central entrance hall. A 20th century partition now closes off part of the hallway. Most of the original interior woodwork and hardware remains. Woodwork is quite simple but typical of the 1840s period. It consists of plain architraves with undecorated corner blocks.

The main fireplace located in the east room is original with a plastered firebox and a mantelpiece with simplified Greek Revival stylistic influences. Also in the east room is a staircase rising from the northeast corner of the house. It has been enclosed and is now entered directly from outside from a door in the north wall.

Most doors throughout the first story retain original carpenter or carpenter-type locks dating from the second quarter of the 19th century. Doors have six low relief panels.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Applicable Criteria: A and C SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of the Hagerstown Day Nursery Building, erected in the 1840s as the Hagerstown Charity School, derives from three sources. First, as a structure executed in a simplified Neoclassical manner, the building embodies characteristics of the type of architecture constructed in Hagerstown in the mid-19th century. Notable among these features are Federal proportions in scale, the use of symmetrical and corner block decoration on the interior, Flemish bond facade, and flat arches over the windows. The building also contains design elements not commonly found in contemporary Hagerstown buildings. These elements are the three bay symmetrical facade, use of the tripartite winow and parapetted end walls, and a projecting center bay on the facade. Second, the building acquires significance as having been erected as a school for underprivileged Third, additional children and was used for such purpose until about 1907. significance is achieved from association with the social and humanitarian concerns of the group for which the building was erected and those of the The Hagerstown Charity School was founded by the Hagerstown present owners. Female Society which in addition to being concerned with schooling underprivileged children was also concerned with feeding and clothing them. The building continues as a child care facility as a nursery which was founded in and has occupied the structure since 1907.

HISTORY AND SUPPORT

The Hagerstown Day Nursery grew out of the Hagerstown Female Society for the Instruction of Poor Children which was established in 1818 when it began a charity school. Originally the school was located on Antietam Street in Hagerstown, but in 1841 according to the Society's minutes, the County Commissioners set aside money for construction of a school to be begun within the next three years. Thus the building represents a facility and organization dedicated to educational pursuits for underprivileged children. It has seen continuous use as a child care facility since it was built.

Additionally the building reflects social and humanitarian concerns for its association with the Hagerstown Female Society. This organization consisted of a group of dedicated ladies who gave time, and collected funds for support and maintenance of an educational facility for poor children. In addition to providing schooling, they also saw that the children were properly clothed and fed.

The room in the far north end of the extension was a kitchen. It retains its large service fireplace, built in cupboard and a back stairway to the second floor.

The house appears to be in generally good condition. The house and its accompanying lot are included in this nomination, fronting 41 feet on East Washington Street and 130 feet on North Locust Street.

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

The Hagerstown Day Nursery, the present owner of the building was established in 1907, after the public school system was developed to allow for education of poor children. The Hagerstown Charity School was modified at that time to the day nursery. It continues to be a viable community institution.
