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7	DESCRIPTION							,	
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Overton Farm consists of eight acres located in a horseshoe bend of Bear Creek. Originally, the complex consisted of a main house, and the following outbuildings: a corn crib, a blacksmith and tool shed, a seed and feed shed, a horse-and-mule barn, two cattle barns, a fruit-and-potato house, and a smoke house.

At present the main house and portions of the corn crib, smoke house, potato house and a three-stall, animal barn are standing. The main house at one time consisted of five rooms added one after another in typical pioneer fashion. Today it consists of two rooms connected by a breezeway of dog-trot, with faint traces of the other three rooms.

Constructed of logs, the building measures 43' by 17'. The roof is gabled and at present is covered with metal. Portions of the building have weather-boarding covering the log walls. The room on the left, (West side) is thought to be the original one-room cabin, onto which the rest of the structure was added. It measures 18'3" by 17' and the logs are secured with a saddle notch. A stone chimney, no longer standing, was located on the west wall and measured 7'2" across at the base. Two windows, thought to have been added later, are located on either side of the chimney. There are two entrances to this room, one on the front or south side of the room, and one on the north side.

To the right or east of this room is a similar room connected by a nine-foot wide breeze way. This room measures 16' by 17' and the logs are secured with a dove tail notch. It has three windows two on the east side, and one on the front or south side. There are two doors, a rear door and a door leading onto the breezeway.

soil on Bear Creek. Since, at that time, Alabama was still a part of the Mississippi Territory, he registered the land in Pontitoc, Mississippi sold his wagon and built a shed.

Shortly after his marriage to Judy May in 1819 he began construction of a one-room log cabin. The core of the extant dwelling was built prior to 1838 and some sources contend the 1819 structure became the nucleus of a five-room log home, two rooms of which survive. (Records which would conclusively substantiate the 1819 date have not survived).

In 1876 Judy Overton died and Abner lived on for only a year. house passed to the children and was occupied by members of the Overton family until 1946.

In 1969 the Tennessee Valley Authority acquired the farm as a part of the Bear Creek Water Control Project, and for the last several years it has served as a valuable teaching tool in the field of social studies, agriculture and ecology for the 13 surrounding school districts.
