Trovinger Mill is located along Trovinger Mill Road, about one mile north of Maryland Route 64 and about three miles east of Hagerstown in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated along the east bank of the Antietam Creek with its east gable

facing the road.

The mill is constructed of roughly coursed local fieldstone. It is five bays in length with the mill race running
underneath it about midway along its broad side. At the peak
of the east gable is a date stone marked 1771 with the initials
J. R. The stone work at the exterior of the building shows a
number of seams in the walls probably indicating several
periods of building. A vertical division line in the stone is
evident just west of the mill race. A horizontal seam in the
masonry is evident about eight feet above ground level,
running along the north, west, and south walls west of the
race. Within this area there is evidence that window openings
in the north and south walls have been raised about one foot.

Most of the windows and doors in the east, north, and west walls of the building are topped with segmental arches. Other openings have no decorative stone work over their lintels.

The openings in the north and south walls for the race are lined with coursed upright stones forming a segmental arch. Many early timbers and milling machinery can be observed in the race.

The windows are framed with wide wooden members which are secured with pegs. The openings are located at random on all sides of the building although few are present in the south wall.

Doors are framed similarly to the windows with entrances located at ground level at the east and west ends of the north wall. At the main story doors are located in the east gable end and in the second and fourth bays of the west wall. A door is located within the east gable at the attic level. Just above this door a large beam protrudes to carry a block and tackle.

The ends of the roof at the gables are finished with a tapered barge board. The roof extends beyond the north wall of the building several feet to cover the remains of an elevated walkway which gives access to the second story openings. The roof covering is sheet metal under which can be seen earlier wooden shingles. Two small gabled dormers are present on the south side of the roof.

The mill race remains intact with concrete side walls near the building. Nearby is the site of a new mill which is said to date later than the grain mill. Also present are the abutments of a bridge which crossed the Antietam at the mill as part of an eighteenth century road leading from Hagerstown to the Old Forge about 1 1/2 miles upstream.

The mill is at present vacant and is in deteriorated condition. It stands on a tract containing 2.23 acres.

The Trovinger Mill, originally Jacob Rohrer's Mill, is significant for its architecture and for its contribution to

early commerce in Washington County. A dated example of Washington County's eighteenth century architecture, the mill has received no significant alterations since 1771. the original woodwork remains as well as a significant part of the milling machinery. Functioning as an early business, the mill represents an important part of the early economy of Western Maryland. A large number of mills were in operation along the Antietam Creek during the eighteenth century (at least ten are shown on a 1794 map), an indication that milling

was a major industry in the area. Unfortunately few of these mills are standing today.

There is considerable evidence to suggest that Jacob Rohrer's establishment was among the earliest of the mills on The seams in the masonry of the building the Antietam. indicate that an earlier one-story structure may have been present before 1771. The physical evidence of an earlier mill is supported by documentary references in patent records The mill stands on land which was part of Frederick County. of a 817-acre tract called "Nancy's Contentment," patented to John Rohrer on May 10, 1768. Apparently Nancy's Contentment included six smaller tracts which were granted to Jacob Rohrer Among these six parcels were a ten-acre tract, "Jacob's Welfare, granted in 1747; "Defiance," for 100 acres dated 1750 and "Addition to the Mill" a 30-acre tract patented in The name "Addition to the Mill" would suggest the presence of a milling operation at the time of that patent. Jacob Rohrer owned property on the banks of the Antietam as early as 1739, and in a patent of 1747 reference is made to Jacob Rohrer's dwelling. This documented information supports the possible existence of a pre-1771 mill. The mill was in the Rohrer family until 1817. The Trovingers who operated the mill from 1875 to 1910 contributed only the present name of the structure to its history. It continued functioning as a grist mill into the twentieth century although The current during the immediate past it has been vacant.

Trovinger Mill

The concrete sidewalls mentioned on the clarification sheet belong to the mill race and were not considered in the worksheet as part of the actual mill building. However, since the Trovinger Mill form was submitted, the owner has made several alterations including the addition of dormers. Thus the "unaltered" designation no longer applies to this property.

According to currect tax maps, the bridge abutments are included in the property.

The areas of significance checked in the original copy of the Trust worksheet were "architecture" and "commerce" Therefore, I really cannot contribute anything concerning the designation of "industrial archaeology," other than to say that there would probably be potential for archaeological research.

to the Hughes forge and mill (both demolished) farther up the Antietam. Much of this road has been obliterated by farming and development, but parts of it are still discernable, and its route can be tracted along much of its length. Other eighteenth and early nineteenth century buildings are present along the road.

In addition to its historical and architectural merit, the Trovinger Mill is significant for its scenic value.
