DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Curry Hill Plantation was begun in 1842 by Duncan Curry, the great grandfather of the present owners. The size of the property at that time included several thousand acres and the family lived in a log house next to a two room cabin used as the stage coach stop between Thomasville, Georgia, and Bainbridge, Georgia. In the 1850's the site of the present house was selected. The stage coach house was moved near the site to serve as a dwelling for the family while their log house was torn down so that some of the timbers could be used in the new house.

This plantation-plain style home was constructed of heart yellow pine, two stories with four rooms on each floor and with a long wide (10'x 40') hall running through the center of each floor. On the front and back are small **Greek Revival** style porches with two wooden columns supported by brick piers that extend to the ground in front of the porch on either side of the steps. The side lights and transom form a trabeated entrance way. On the front facade the upper story nine-over-nine light sash windows are placed between and above the two six-over-six light sash windows on the first floor level. This presents an unusual symmetrical window arrangement. It should also be noted that the chimneys occur in the interiors of the house, as opposed to the more usual Southern style of having them placed on the end walls.

-The old cabin located in the back yard became the kitchen house, and food cooked there by slaves was brought up the steps into the dining room 70 of the big house. After the Civil War and the departure of slave help, C a kitchen was added onto the west side of the house adjoining the dining O room. A little later the small back porch was enlarged to join the new kitchen, which extended beyond the back of the house. Years later the east end of that porch was enclosed to make a bathroom. No other structural Ο changes were made until 1970 when deterioration of the porch and kitchen Z area necessitated their removal. At that time a new wing built across the back of the house included two bathrooms upstairs ba glassed-in sun room S and an enlarged kitchen downstairs. These charges to not affect the appearance of the house from the front. No, architectural changes were made in the original structure. Repairs necessary to restore the first porch duplicated the board floor and steps. The wooden railing, with its little entry gates, and the wooden columns supporting the Greek Revival roof detail were left intact. RE

The original site, diminished now by various family heirs to 400 acres owned by the present immediate heirs, had all the usual out buildings of a plantation. Some have been destroyed, but still standing are the old stage coach-kitchen house, a cow barn, ice house, and several barns. It is the hope of the present owners to restore these and add a smoke house, cane mill and a log slave house as remembered from their early childhood.

INTERIOR

All of the original eight rooms of the big house have fireplaces built of light red clay made on the plantation. All fireplace fronts are simple hand carved wooden ones, each a different design. The two front rooms downstairs have three large windows. The two back rooms had two large (continued)

windows each. All four rooms upstairs have two windows each. The rooms are approximately 18' x 18' and the two hallways are 10' x 40' running the full length of the house. Wide (12" to 14") hand hewn boards are used throughout the house. The halls and the two back rooms downstairs were sealed with such carefully finished boards. All the other rooms with rough boards were wallpapered. In restoration this was repeated and where wallpaper was used care was taken to select patterns typical to the 1850 period. All floors are long heart pine boards, cleaned and finished to exhibit their original beauty. A simple straight staircase along one wall in the downstairs hall was situated to make possible young ladies' escape to the bedroom area upstairs without being seen by arriving guests. Large panel doors at both ends of the downstairs hall are flanked by side glasses. Much of the original furniture remains in the house.

Duncan Curry, Jr., builder of the house, was the son of Duncan Curry, Sr. an early pioneer in southwest Georgia and a member of the Georgia General Assembly as representative and senator. Young Duncan continued to carry out the Scottish tradition of careful planning, strict frugal living and high religious values. The house and property called Curry Hill is believed to be the oldest in the county to have remained in the same family for over 130 years.

This house is an unusual type of the Greek Revival period. The temple style porch, especially fine, has recently been refurbished and minor changes which had been made over the years were discarded for more accurate detail.

Besides being historically significant as a stage coach stop, the house from the beginning served as a neighborhood school. Duncan Curry employed a tutor and one of the upstairs rooms served as the classroom. Children from surrounding plantations came by horse and carriage from many miles to gain access to education. School books used during that time still remain in the house.

Also Duncan Curry and his brother, Calvin, fulfilled a lifelong dream of their father's by building the first Presbyterian Church in the area. Erected two miles from Curry Hill it was for many years known as Curry Church. In the <u>Memoirs of Georgia</u>, 1895, Volume 1, page 586, the Curry's are credited with being "the pioneers of Presbyterianism in Decatur County."

During the Civil War, Duncan, an army major, rallied a group of young men, Company F, Fiftieth Georgia Regiment, and led them into war as their commander. Injured in battle in Maryland he returned home. Although released from active duty he took on the responsibility of gathering necessary food, horses and supplies from plantations throughout the area to try to keep the frayed Confederate army going. His eldest son, Perry, lost his life in the war.

Many items of historical interest preserved by his heirs at Curry Hill include Confederate money, the family Bible, a letter written by a nephew while serving the Confederate army, and an autographed photograph of General Robert E. Lee.
