DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present physical appearance of the Hawkins mansion and the surrounding property are in fine condition and remain unchanged in the 70 years since the house was built. Photographs from 1915, 1920 and 1922 document the unaltered state of this property. Please see photocopies attached.

The 2 1/2 story house was constructed in 1911 on a bluff overlooking the Truckee River in the fashionable Newlands Heights area (so named because the first house in this area along the bluff belonged to Senator Newlands, author of the Reclamation Act of 1902). The property stretching from Court Street to the Truckee River retains much of the original landscaping and fine trees.

The Hawkins House, one of the first to be constructed in Newlands Heights, takes full advantage of the location above the river. The house was designed in the Georgian tradition in red brick with handsome architectural trim in wood painted white. The facade is enhanced by an imposing portico with doric columns. The house is built in a square plan around a central open staircase connecting the main floor receptions rooms with the second floor living area. The third floor attic contained servants' quarters.

Plan - rectangular with long axis running east/west.

Basement - full basement with light well windows.

Structural System - wood on masonry (brick) bearing walls.

Walls - brick laid in Flemish bond with mortar tinted dark gray / a brick water table delineates foundation from walls.

Front Porch - wood composite order columns support roof porch with full entablature / second level of porch features railing and posts which support an arbor frame.

Windows - first level windows are generally two types: (a) single hung, paired windows with 6/1 light arrangement, brick sills, no surrounds and cast, curvalinear lintels with an ornamental "keystone" and (b) round headed windows on the north facade which feature semi-circular fan lights with 5 panes each. Second level windows similar to first level except for the absence of cast lintels and presence of radiating brick voussoirs. Also, the north (rear) wall feature a central two storey bay window.

Main Entry - trabeated with pilasters, entablature and "keystone"/ five lights each side of paneled door / a flattened elliptical fan light surmounts door.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In addition to architectural importance, the Hawkins Mansion is of significance on the basis of its historic ownership, location, and current use. The building was commissioned by Prince A. Hawkins in 1911 from Elmer Grey, a prominent Los Angeles architect whose major projects included Henry Huntington's San Marino estate (now the Huntington Library & Art Gallery), the landmark Beverly Hills Hotel and the Pasadena Community Playhouse. Grey's work was known nationally, and he served on the United States' Art Advisory Board for the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis. The property where the Hawkins home would stand was part of the Newlands Heights district, situated on the bluffs overlooking the Truckee River, adjacent to the home of Senator Francis G. Newlands.

Grey's plans for the Hawkins home evoked traditional forms, with a brick exterior in a Georgian style, and a commodious, centralizing floor plan. The home had the most modern heating and plumbing systems, with a vast kitchen complex, basement storage, and third floor servants' area. The plan was a felicitous combination of features suitable both to the Reno climate and the dramatic site overlooking the river.

The Hawkins family owned the home until it was purchased by the Museum in 1978, and preserved in the family papers were Grey's original plans, along with the original designs for landscaping. It is of extraordinary historical value that these plans are extant. The plans permit us to document that virtually no major alterations have been performed on the original structure, save updates of plumbing, wiring systems and the like. Moreover, the drawings document a major re-landscaping project in the 1930's by a San Francisco firm which was never executed, as the existing plantings and garden conform to Grey's plans.

The Newlands Heights district was developed in an era of rapid growth in Reno, fueled by the wealth of the Tonopah and Goldfield mining areas. It was the most fashionable district of Reno, and many prominent families built new homes there. The Hawkins family is one of the first families of Nevada, prominent in Nevada's business and banking circles for over a century. Following the death of Prince Hawkins, his son Robert lived in the Court Street mansion. Robert Ziemer Hawkins was married to Katherine Mackay, grand-daughter of Clarence Mackay, owner of the famous Virginia City mines bearing his name, founder of International Telephone & Telegraph Corporation, and

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East Door - door features upper half glazed with 6 lights/bottom half is paneled / a three light transom above door.

Roof - of low pitch with three dormers / eaves feature modillions and a wide frieze/gable roof / two brick chimneys at ridge which differ in size.

Interior Features - central hall with stairway on east side of entry foyer/paneled wainscoting in foyer, hall and along stair run/hardwood floor with 2" width boards/ sliding pocket doors on first level/fireplaces with classical motif ornamentation/ attic level is fully open to form one room.

Present use as an art museum takes advantage of the spacious, elegant nature of the house without requiring major internal changes. Any conversion which has been accomplished is of a reversible nature. Architectural details and the integrity of this handsome property have been preserved.

All of the original architectural and landscaping plans and drawings are in the possession of the current owners. CONTINUATION SHEET

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local philanthropist. Katherine Mackay Hawkins made her own unique contribution to the history of the home, bringing from Paris the contents of her grandfather's apartments with included, in addition to the period furniture, the hand screened 19th century wallpaper, sections of which remain on the second floor of the home.

For its new usage as the headquarters of the Sierra Nevada Museum of Art, the City of Reno accorded the Hawkins property the city's first historical landmark status. This recognized not only the significance of this major architectural commission in Reno, but also the fact that the Museum would preserve the building, providing a stabilizing element in an important architectural district imminently threatened by careless commercial usage. Located only four blocks from central Reno, the fine home and extensive grounds are an asset to the City. The preservation of this architecturally unique section of Reno cannot help but have economic as well as aesthetic benefits for the community, and also provide the initiative for further preservation and recycling of other architecturally interesting and important buildings in Reno.
