


## DESCRIRE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If knOWI) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Mill Creek Meeting House built in 1840 and 1841 is a low one-story structure of grey-black native field stone with a pitched roof. The rectangular building, $39^{\prime} \times 30^{\prime}$, has a small wooden shed attached to the stuccoed east end and a roofed concrete porch deck, 25' $\times 7^{\prime}$; along the fuont The front south facade has two six-panel wooden doors, and four windows with six-over-nine, double-hung wooden sash. The doors and windows on the front are symmetrically disposed and visually reinforced by a brick chimney at each end of the building. The roof has a wooden cormice decorated with a cyma recta, bead, cyma reversa and box. A date stone is found beneath the west peak, but the inscription is not legible. A cemetery surrounded by a wrought iron fence lies to the east of the meeting house while a driveway circles the building.. ,



In 1838, thirty-three Friends from Mill Creek Hundred petitioned the New Garden Monthly Meeting for permission to hold their own worship service. For a time, the group gathered in the home of one of their number, James Thompson. Three years after their formation, the Mill Creek Meeting constructed a stone meeting house. The one-story house, measuring thirty by forty feet, cost the group eight hundred dollars.

From the time of earliest settlements, most members of the New Garden Monthly Meeting were citizens of Pennsylvania, although some were Delawareans. New Garden and West Grove, the principal component groups in the monthly meeting, both split into an Orthodox faction, and a more liberal Hicksite contingent, at the separation of 1827. The schism remained until the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting united in 1955.

Mill Creek Friends Meeting continued as a Preparative Meeting under the Hicksite Branch of the New Garden Meeting. A period of inactivity ended in 1954 when it was re-opened as a Monthly Meeting of the Western Quarterly Meeting.
