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7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Bardwell-Ferrant House occupies a prominent corner location at 2500 Portland Avenue South in a residential community of Minneapolis.

The two storey frame structure is rectangular in plan and sits upon a limestone foundation. Wooden lattice work shields the foundation from view on the north side of the building. Charles S. Bardwell built his simple two storey home at 1800 Park Avenue South about 1883. The home's modest Queen Anne stylistic elements are still observable in the south facing rectangular bay with open balcony above, scroll shaped eave brackets and patterned brick chimney.

In 1890, the house was purchased by Emil Ferrant who engaged prominent Minneapolis architect Carl F. Struck to make alterations to the dwelling. Struck's design fused Moorish adornments onto the original modest building creating an exotic architectural fantasy. Two onion domed towers, sheathed in pressed metal and roofed with sheet copper, were added on the north facade. The western-most dome rises above a curved bay at the first storey level creating a two storey curvilinear shape to the north facade. Arch transom lights filled with stained glass cap each of the four sash windows at the dome's upper level. The dome at the northeast corner of the house rises from the second storey level creating an ogee arch open balcony.

The first storey porch follows the curve of the two domes as it wraps around the north facade. Spiral porch supports (some of which are still intact on the building's facade) were replaced with square posts in 1949. The main entrance is asymmetrically placed on the east facade. Double oak entry doors feature elaborate Moorish design panels with paired arch lights above.

Stained glass windows, in varying shapes and filled with deep rich colors, are prominent on the three major building facades, adding to the exotic Moorish flavor.

In 1898, the house was moved from its original location to its present site to make way for the construction of an apartment building.

Although the building is in a deteriorating condition, its architectural integrity has been preserved since the 1890 alterations.

The Bardwell-Ferrant House is architecturally significant as a locally distinctive example of the national interest in exotic themes in the late nineteenth century. Constructed about 1883 for Charles Bardwell, the house was originally located at 1800 Park Avenue and was moved to its present site in 1898 to make way for the construction of an apartment building. The original simple Queen Anne form of the dwelling was transformed in 1890 into a Moorish fantasy by the addition of onion domed towers, ogee arch shapes and deep toned stained glass lights. Emil Ferrant engaged locally prominent architect Carl F. Struck who created the Moorish design theme for the house. Struck was the only Norwegian native architect in the 19th century to practice his craft in Minneapolis and was responsible for the design of Dania Hall, 1885 (National Register 1974). Few local buildings were constructed in the Moorish mode; rather, the exotic forms were added to otherwise simple structures. The Bardwell-Ferrant House is an unusually picturesque representative of exotic forms applied to traditional architectural styles and, as such, is an important asset to the community.
