Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Dudley Block of Biddeford, Maine, built in 1848, is a large and substantial commercial building in the Greek Revival style.

The $3\frac{1}{2}$ -story block is of brick construction with gable roof, 6/6 fenestration, and granite trim and foundation. The three-story facade, which faces east, is twelve bays long and features a series of four shops on the first floor trabeated in granite. Each shop has its own single-door entrance between two store windows. The windows above the first story carry simple granite lintels typical of the period.

The 6-bay-wide south end of the block contains a pair of doorways at the second-floor level. These provided access to residential apartments.

Minor storefront and internal alterations have occurred over the years but not to an extent which affects the basic architectural theme of the structure.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Dudley Block is individually eligible for nomination under three categories: architecture, town planning and commerce. The structure is architecturally significant as an example of mid-19th century brick commercial building with granite pier and lintle construction of the lower story. The upper floors are an interesting example of tenement housing in an important Lowell-type industrial community and are related to corporation housing in earlier New England textile cities. The development of brick buildings at the foot of Sullivan Street near Water Street is part of land development directly associated with Samuel Batchelder, the founder and leading figure in the industrial development of Biddeford. Batchelder's personal investment in the creation of private residential sub-division with commercial use of the Water Street site is an example of mid-19th century speculative development common to many textile cities of this type. The construction of stores by Benjamin Dudley along this section of Water Street continued earlier commercial usage of the site opposite the river wharves. The later ownership of the Block by Abel Jellison, a locally prominent citizen, adds to the significance of commerce in the social and political history of Biddeford.

From the evidence of the Dudley manuscript in the Brick Store Museum in Kennebunk, the brick "Dudley Block" was quickly begun and rented up on May 27, 1848. The four ground-floor stores facing Water Street were rented that day.

Benjamin Dudley continued his ownership of the Dudley Block as a commercial property until 1864, when he sold the building and its outbuildings to Ivory Goodwin and Abel H. Jellison. Abel Jellison was born in Waterborough in 1820, attending high school in Lyman and married Betsey Roberts of Parsonfield. He settled in Biddeford in 1846, working first in the Laconia Cotton Mills and then as a store clerk. In 1848 he entered a partnership with William Berry and established a grocery business. In 1852 his wife died and the next year he married the widow of John H. Staples, Sarah E. Dudley, the daughter of Benjamin Dudley. In 1854 he purchased his partner's interest in the business and by 1856 was located under his own name in the Dudley Block. After purchasing the Block from his father-in-law, the grocery business was established as a partnership with Capt. Ivory Goodwin of Kennebunkport until 1871. In 1873 Goodwin sold his half interest in the Dudley Block to Jellison. He operated in partnership with William Bradford until 1882, when he sold the business and property to Jean B. Pare, Jr. Jellison was an active member of several fraternal organizations and influential in local politics. He was assessor in 1854, represented the second ward as a city Alderman, and in 1863 and 1864 was elected to the Maine legislature. In 1864 and for twelve succeeding years he was elected judge of the Municipal Court of Biddeford. He died in 1895 at age 75.
