Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Woodbridge Street Historic District begins at a small triangular park at the intersection of Woodbridge and Silver Streets and stretches north for approximately one-half mile along both sides of Woodbridge Street. This thoroughfare (Route 116) has been the primary highway between South Hadley and Amherst since colonial times. Within this residential district, there are twenty-eight structures; eight are 18th century, twelve are 19th century, four are early 20th century and four are inconspicuous intrusions. In spite of the differences in age and style of the houses, there is a strong feeling of unity on the street resulting from the repeated use of common materials and stylistic elements, as well as maintenance of similar scale and set-back. The houses are generously set back from the gently rising road and are nestled among large shade trees on well-maintained lawns. The New England predilection for white clapboard is evident.

Four of the 23 contributing structures in the district have been moved to Woodbridge Street in order to prevent their demolition. Two of the houses were moved from sites in South Hadley: one from College Street to 25 Woodbridge Street (map #2, photo #2) in 1871, and one from 11 Woodbridge Street to 7 Silver Street (map #1, Photo #1) in 1902. Both houses were moved to allow for the expansion of Mount Holyoke College. The two other relocated buildings now house the Skinner Museum and are refugees from Prescott, one of the towns which was dismantled in order to create the Quabbin Reservoir. They were originally the Prescott Church and the Prescott Schoolhouse and were moved to their present site as part of preservation efforts made by Joseph Skinner in the 1920s.

Among the 18th century houses, five are especially notable for their architectural distinction as well as their venerable age. The Second Parsonage, ca. 1742 (map #1, photo #1), the Deacon Josiah White House, 1787 (map #9, Photo #4), and the Sycamores, 1788 (map #3, photo #3) are solidly Georgian while the Stebbins Condit House (map #2, photo #2), built less than ten years after these two in 1795 is an interesting example of the Federal style. The Israel Clark House, ca. 1720 (map #10, photo #5) is a fine prototype of the simple, substantial, center, chimney, New England farmhouse. In these five cases, much of the interior, as well as the exterior, has been preserved.

The following descriptions proceed northward on Woodbridge Street and discuss in greater detail the distinctive structures in the district.

The Second Parsonage, 7 Silver Street, 1742 (map #1, photo #1). Originally occupied by the Reverend John Woodbridge, this Georgian period wood frame house was moved to this site from 11 Woodbridge Street in 1903. The symmetrical five-bay facade is highlighted by a Palladian window on the second level above a pedimented entry flanked by pilasters with a small wooden fan in a lunette. Additional features of note are framed overhangs on the second story of the gable ends and windows on the ground and attic level that bear wide, flat topped cornices and triglyphs.

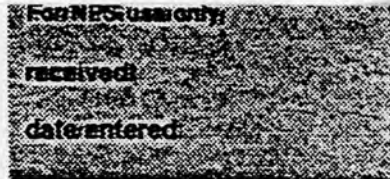

Stebbins/Condit House, 3 Silver Street, 25 Woodbridge Street, ca.1795
(map #2, photo #2). This hip-roofed Federal period corner house is distinguished by its architectural features that include two prominent chimneys, two-story fluted pilasters at all four corners, and a wide architrave under a modillioned cornice. The structure bears two distinct facades, one which is five bays and the other which is three. Although both major elevations share common elements such as classically ornamented entrances with columned entry porches, first floor windows with flat-topped modillioned cornices and fine dentil molding below, each employs different details. The west and more prominent facade is noted by its second story Palladian window, bowed entry porch supported by Doric columns, and a fanlight and sidelights surrounding the doorway. The east facade, simpler in its detail, includes a smaller entry porch and transom over the doorway.

The only alteration made to the building is a two-story hip-roofed addition of 1925 located on the west side of the main structure. This construction is in keeping with the original building, but lacks a modillioned cornice.

The well-balanced facades and lavish and carefully executed architectural details, both on the exterior and interior, make the Condit House a most distinguished dwelling in the historic district.

Sycamores, 28 Woodbridge Street, 1788, (map #3, photo #3). Sycamores is a central-hall gambrel-roofed 2½-story clapboard house with quoins that rise at each corner and terminate at a modillioned cornice. The facade is symmetrical with a pair of closely-spaced double-hung windows on each side of the entrance. These four windows are again reflected in the second story with a central window above the door. Three arched dormers are placed above windows 2,3, and 4 of the second story.

The main feature of the building which dominates the facade is the barrel roofed entry porch that is 12 feet wide and extends seven feet from the face of the building. This element is highly ornamented with moldings, dentils in the corona, and fronds etched in the tympanum. The porch is supported by two columns resting on a monolithic red sandstone base which in turn is laid on two courses of similar sandstone blocks that form the three stairs leading to the porch. Two fluted pilasters, which frame the door, terminate at a flared molding, above which is the stylized tobacco leaf so common on Connecticut Valley doorways of this period.

In addition to retaining its original exterior features, many interior elements also remain. They include panelled fireplace walls and doors with brass rim locks and HL hinges.

Prescott Church and Schoolhouse, 33 Woodbridge Street (map #6). This white clapboard, slate roofed church, set back 100 feet from the street, is clearly Greek Revival in style with features such as a prominent gable end, a wide frieze, deep moldings and pilasters which in particular strongly articulate the facade. Additional elements which highlight the building include a single 5'x11' double-hung window in the main elevation, paired pedimented entries and an octagonal steeple which rises from a square belfry.

Lying to the south of the church is a white clapboard schoolhouse also moved from the former town of Prescott. It too is starkly Greek Revival in style and features a facade with a pedimented center entry flanked by two large double-hung windows. Similar fenestration is displayed on the side elevations.

Joseph White, III House, 35 Woodbridge Street, early 19th century (map #7). Set with its gable end to the street, this simple, five-bay center entry, 1½-story dwelling faces the schoolhouse which lies across the green from it. Its entrance is framed by sidelights and plain pilasters which support a flat frieze and cornice. A later addition extends east 42 feet toward the church.

Deacon Josiah White House, 40 Woodbridge Street, 1787 (map #9, photo #4). The Deacon Josiah White House is a five-bay 2½-story gambrel roofed dwelling replete with its original external architectural details. These include a wide panelled entry flanked by pilasters that are topped by a six-leaf flower, quoins, and a richly molded modillioned cornice. 1½-story gambrel roofed additions were placed on the north and south ends of the house in 1912.

Israel Clark House, 43 Woodbridge Street, ca.1770 (map #10, photo #5). This straightforward vernacular Georgian farmhouse, with its five-bay configuration and use of a center entry and center chimney, is similar to many rural New England dwellings of the period. Alterations made to the structure include a broken scroll pediment recently placed over the doorway and small extensions added to the south and east sides of the building.

Skinner Estate, 48 Woodbridge Street, early 20th century (map #1, photo #6). The Skinner Estate is a substantial two-story residence featuring three fieldstone chimneys, a gambrel roof, and shake siding. This dwelling used by a wealthy local industrialist as a summer cottage exhibits a rich variety of architectural detail. The entry is a particularly distinctive element and is dominated by a gambrel roofed projecting pavilion which contains a large Palladian window and a porte cochere.

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Timothy Montague House, 63 Woodbridge Street, ca.1800 (map #15, photo #7). This five-bay, two chimney, white clapboard farmhouse is an excellent example of late 18th century vernacular architecture. Spare in ornament, it features a doorway framed with sidelights and pilasters.

John Marshall House, 68 Woodbridge Street, ca.1762 (map #17). A simple, three-bay, 1½-story clapboard dwelling with two interior chimneys, this structure is one of six remaining in the district from the 18th century.

Arthur Smith House, 77 Woodbridge Street, 1886 (map #21). This red-shingled, two-story house brings a Victorian flavor to the largely colonial neighborhood. "L"-shaped in plan, it faces Woodbridge Street and displays a squared bay window and long, one-story ell on its western facade.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Woodbridge Street Historic District extends for a half mile along Woodbridge Street which has served as the primary highway between South Hadley and Amherst since the early Colonial period. The district was the focal point for early development in the South Hadley community and as a result, a number of prominent early citizens of the town are associated with the houses which line this main street. Architecturally, the area is distinguished by its number of well preserved high style residences that generally date from the mid to late 18th century. In addition, the area is notable as a representation of preservation efforts that were made early in the 20th century by a concerned citizen of the community. Acting as a link to the agricultural origins of the town as well as to the individuals who shaped the community in the 18th and early 20th century, the Woodbridge Street Historic District retains integrity of location, design, material, setting and workmanship and meets criteria A, B and C of the National Register of Historic Places.

Settlement in South Hadley (and in particular along Woodbridge Street) grew out of a need for more land, and a desire to expand, which was felt by residents of nearby Hadley early in the 18th century. The land in this southern area was originally held in common by the taxpayers of Hadley. In 1720, this land was divided among these proprietors in proportion to their tax payments. Home lots were laid out, mostly along already existing roads, as illustrated by present-day Woodbridge Street. Many of the lots were narrow strips, but since most of the proprietors did not move to South Hadley, those who did were able to combine several lots and farm good sized parcels. This occupation remained the primary one for the area through the 19th century.

A number of families made significant contributions to the early development of the community and many of the homes they built in the 18th century continue to be prominent ones which contribute to the district's integrity.

The White family, which dominated the district in the early years, typifies the settlement and growth of the area. Joseph White, the patriarch, considered himself a weaver, but also was a captain, deacon, selectman and assessor. He obtained four adjacent home lots along the "road to Hadley over Bachelor's Falls" and built his house there about 1727. Standing as the oldest building in the district, the structure remains today as the back ell of 82 Woodbridge Street (map #23).

Like their father, three of his sons acquired large pieces of land and built houses along Woodbridge Street. In particular, the youngest was

most successful. He not only amassed a substantial amount of property, but also was a major in the Revolution and served on three of the town committees in 1774-1778. By 1771, due to his financial achievements in real estate and farming, he was one of the eight highest taxpayers in the community. He built the house at 78 Woodbridge Street (map #22), added the front part of 82 Woodbridge (map #23), and in 1787 built the dwelling at 40 Woodbridge Street (map #9, photo #4) for his son. All three houses still stand and remain as monuments to this important local family.

The second family important to community development in the 18th century, and for whom the district and street is named, is the Woodbridges. As early as 1742, Reverend John Woodbridge bought the house at present-day 7 Silver Street (map #1, photo #1). The most distinguished member of this South Hadley family, however, was the Reverend's second son, Benjamin. He not only served as commander of a local regiment in the Revolution, but was also most successful in his business affairs which included ownership of a mill and partnership in two others, as well as a potash works. As a result of his financial achievement, he was able to purchase land which had belonged to the White family, and in 1788 built a substantial Georgian style house (map #3, photo #3). Within the community he was known too for his generosity, and is remembered for having donated a bell and communion silver to the church.

In the early 20th century, preservation activity played an important part in maintaining the unity of Woodbridge Street as well as in conserving the existing 18th and early 19th century houses in a healthy state. Joseph A. Skinner, known for his silk mills in Holyoke, was largely responsible for this work. During the 1920s he acquired all the property along the east side of the street up to the Amherst Road and on the west side to Meadow Lane. Thanks to his wealth and an excellent architect, Allen H. Cox, he was able to carry out the labor of love of restoring #25, 28, 32, 35, 40, 43, 63 and 64 Woodbridge Street. Except for the back ell of the Josiah White House (map #9, photo #4), which was completely rebuilt, the restorations were done with little structural change to the main houses and careful preservation of interior woodwork.

In addition, by moving to Woodbridge Street the Prescott Church and Schoolhouse (map #6) - slated for submersion in the Quabbin Reservoir - he created what is essentially his own little village green. The Skinner House (map #11) itself is a beautifully maintained example of the summer cottage of a wealthy man, and stands appropriately in the center of the historic mile. Cottage, village green, and restorations together give the mile a unique historic integrity.

As an agricultural village located on a main thoroughfare and occupied since the early 18th century, the Woodbridge Street Historic District

should be considered to contain subsurface structural remains and material culture deposits relating to past activities and land use in the area. Location of these resources followed by research utilizing archaeological methods has a strong potential to yield information important to our understanding of the past.

10. GEOGRAPHICAL DATA: VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION

Starting at the north-east corner of Woodbridge Street and Silver Street, the district runs east on the south property lines of 3 Silver Street and 7 Silver Street to its south-east corner, then north along the eastern lines of 7 Silver Street, 33, 35, 41, 43, 49, and 51 Woodbridge Street. It crosses Silverwood Terrace and continues along the eastern boundaries of 53, 61 and 63 Woodbridge Street to Woodbridge Terrace. From there, it runs west on the north line of 77 and 82, crossing Woodbridge Street. The boundary then turns south along the west lines of 82, 78, 72, 70, 68 and crossing Meadow Lane continues on west line of #64, 48, 46 and 28 to its south-west corner. It closes west on south line of #28, north on its east line on Woodbridge Street to north-east of Woodbridge and Silver Streets' intersection.

This is a linear district with strong local historical associations whose boundaries were drawn to include the largest number of 18th and 19th century houses with the fewest intrusions.

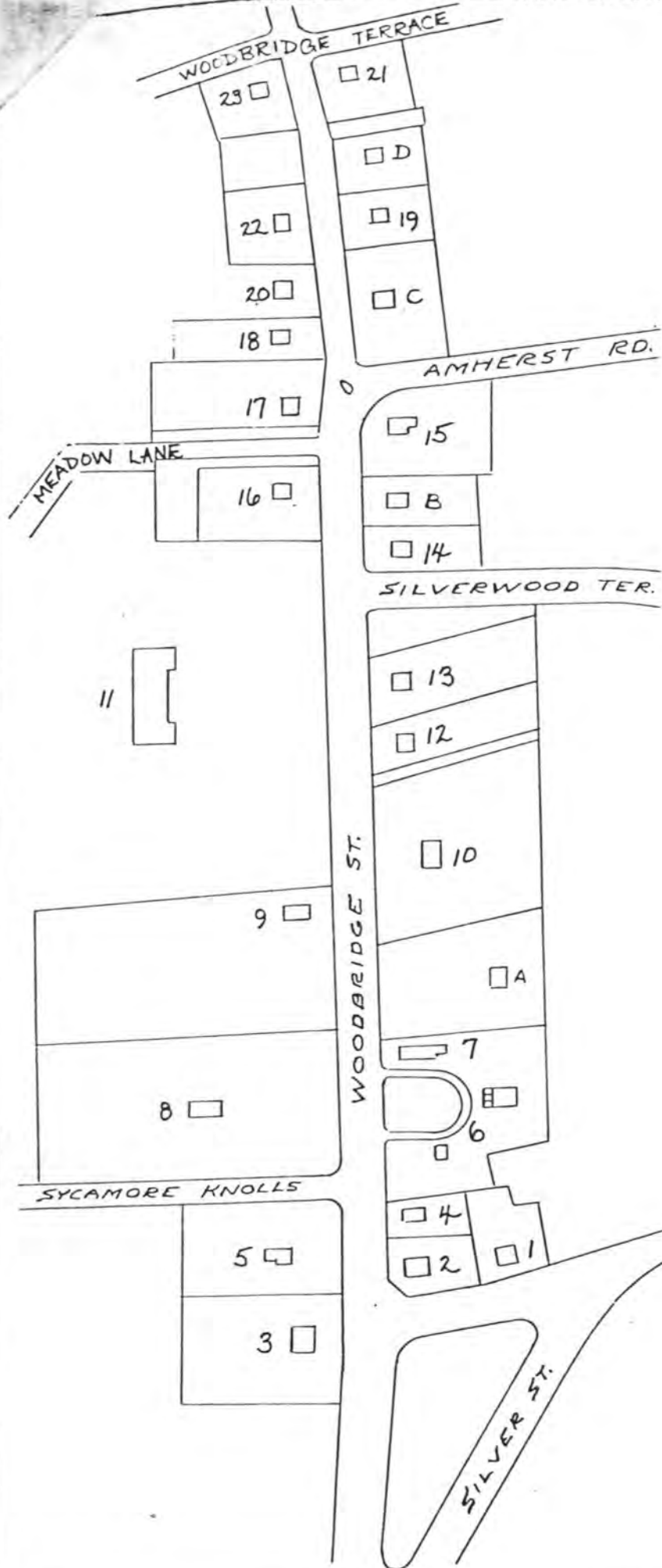

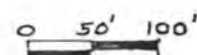

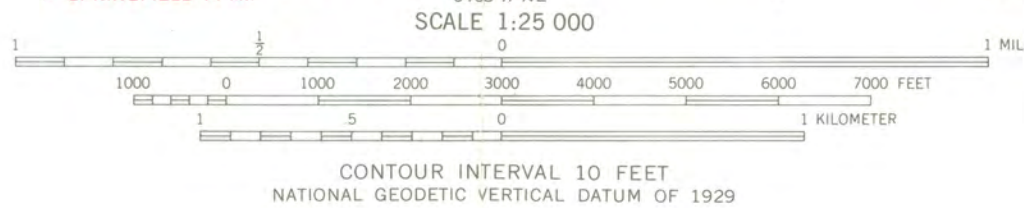
