DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Sylvania, built ca. 1825, is a one and one-half story white clapboard structure set on a low brick foundation. Built in a rectangular plan with a central hall, it has double exterior chimneys with corbeled caps on each end of the house. The gable roof of medium pitch is covered by cypress shingles and has a boxed cornice with returns. A large gabled dormer projects from the center of both front and rear facades. On the front facade the dormer is embellished with a Palladian window located above an arcaded veranda which has six columns and simple balusters. On the rear facade the dormer is incorporated into a double portico with a double door opening onto both levels: The front and rear doorways have semicircular fanlights and double paneled doors. The majority of the windows are 9/9. A one-story wing is attached to the left side facade. The wing is said to have originally contained the kitchen connected by a breezeway. It has recently been modernized and slightly enlarged.

Sylvania features a typical floor plan of a central hall with two rooms on each side, the front two rooms being larger and more sophisticated in detail. On the second story a central hall originally separated one room on each side, but the right side has been partitioned to accommodate a bath and dressing area. Attached to the left side of the house is the kitchen area which has been slightly enlarged for modern bath and kitchen facilities.

The interior contains numerous outstanding details. The wide central hall has heart pine paneling and a single-flight open string stairway with brackets. A unique grapevine design is stencilled below the cornice and above the wainscoting in the central hall and up the staircase. (This design is unusual and has not been noted in any other area structures.) The colors in the stencilling have retained their brilliant hues and are completely intact.) Equally outstanding is the craftsmanship manifested in the woodgrained doors and wainscoting, as well as in the marbleized baseboards in the hall and both front rooms.

The main doorways feature fluted trim with corner blocks. The wooden mantels in the dining room and parlor are carved in the Regency style with pilasters, sunburst designs, and gougework. A molded chair-rail is also noted in the two front rooms. Throughout the structure the floors are heart pine, and most walls are plaster.

Surroundings: The area is well landscaped: an old formal boxwood garden in the front yard is enclosed by a picket fence which repeats the arcades (in reverse) of the front piazza. There are several outbuildings located near the house. The smokehouse is brick while the remaining structures are clapboard. They include a well-house, office (or perhaps slave cabin), carriage house, barn, and "play-house." The construction dates vary, but most of these structures appear to date from the 19th Century. A recent addition to the Sylvania property is a swimming pool, located to the left of the main house.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of Sylvania lies in its detailed craftsmanship and atypical architecture, both of which set it apart from other structures in the McCormick County area. The Hearst and Wideman families who have lived at Sylvania have also made important contributions to the region's development.

In 1767 John Hearse was granted land "near the Long Cane," which is in the vicinity of present-day Sylvania. The 1790 Census records Hearse as residing in the area. Deeds for this area were destroyed in the mid-19th Century; however, numerous Hearst and Wideman family papers remain and are maintained at Sylvania. According to tradition and family papers, Joseph Hearst, a descendant, acquired much property which later became that of his son, John. This John Hearst (ca. 1792-ca. 1847) is thought to have built Sylvania in 1825. (The date "1825" is inscribed on the left rear chimney approximately 25 feet above ground.) Dr. John Wardlaw Hearst, his son, was a member of the South Carolina House of Representatives between 1850-55 and 1865-66.

John Hearst died ca. 1847. According to tradition, after his death the property was acquired by James H. Wideman, whose family has owned Sylvania since that time. Frank Wideman, Sr., owner of the property during the 20th Century, was appointed by Franklin D. Roosevelt as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department Tax Division. Frank Wideman, Jr., his son and the present owner, restored the structure between 1969 and 1971 and resides there today.

Architecture: Built ca. 1825, Sylvania contains several unusual architectural details. The carving of the Regency mantels and doorways is delicate and sophisticated while the grained and marbleized woodwork is exceedingly well-executed, achieving a "trompe l'oeil" effect. Most notable of all, however, is the stencilled grapevine design located in the central hall.
