DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Mr. Thomas hired the popular architect of that time to design and build his home, a representative of Denver's growth and prosperity during the Victorian 1870's, for \$7,000.00. Mr. Quayle was especially prominent in Denver architecture during the decade of the 1880's. He built many homes, including one of Denver's finest for Bishop Machebuef and one for Henry C. Brown of the Erown Palace Hotel fame, and was one of Denver's favorite architects for elementary and secondary schools. He was also the architect for the Pitkin County Court House in Aspen, Colorado, which is registered as a Landmark. He is generally considered a High Victorian in the massing and the influence of his buildings, yet his detailing was decidedly Eclectic-Renaissance, Classical, some Gothic and Second Empire. Few of his commercial and institutional buildings still stand.

The H.H. Thomas Residence is a two-story red brick structure with a full basement. A rather imposing structure with a large open front and side porch. it's styling is composed of both High Victorian and Second Empire characteristics. The roof line is jerkin-headed together with open gables. Its architedt loved detail and the facade is divided by three sandstone stringcourses with the sandstone being repeated in the lintels over and under the doors and the windows. There is elaborate brick detailing on the fireplace chimneys and under the windows with wood gingerbread detailing on the eaves, brackets and porch columns. The whole appearance is one of general symmetry with tall narrow windows usually paired or in threes. There is a split-level, flat-topredbrick carriage house and in addition, the brick outhouse still remains. Portions of the original bent-rod fence still remains. Exterior alterations over the years include: one large window added to the southern facade but carefully matched in detail with the original trim, and the chimneys have been shortened over the years by taking off layers of decayed bricks. front doors were double wooden doors originally but were replaced with a single oak door surrounded by four magnificent stained glass windows sometime during the late 1880's. The double doors have been preserved these years in the carriage house.

On the interior the cherrywood curved banister, ceiling mouldings, and original woodwork still remain as they were back when the house was built. An original cherrywood and diamond dust mirror still hangs over the main fireplace in the livingroom. The home has been well taken care of and as it stands can easily be restored to its original state.

It is the desire of the present owners to restore the H.H. Thomas home back to it's original grandeur and grace. They seek to preserve and to keep it and in doing so to preserve a part of Denver which could easily be lost to future generations if the rate of current demolition continues.

An H.H. Thomas is listed in the 1884 Denver business directory as a dealer in real estate and loans. The significance of Mr. Thomas as a Denver representative of the self-made upper-middle class businessman relates to the larger American belief that individual economic and social success was possible to all Americans. The 1880's and 1890's reflected this belief in the nature of the growth and the type of business development, in the immigration flow, and the articulated economic and social theories of the period. Mr. Thomas also reflects the trend away from the stories of fantastic riches to a division of the middle-class and a more stabilized economic growth which characterized Denver's economic development after the initial glory of the gold and silver mining discoveries.

The home was occupied from 1883 well into the twentieth century by Louis C. McClure, early Colorado photographer considered to be one of the four prominent photographers of the Colorado landscape.
