DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Lane residence consists of several connected structures dating from the mid- to late-nineteenth century. The original structure was built during the Greek Revival period, 1830-1850, and has become the ell to the larger Queen Anne addition, built during the late-nineteenth century.

The Queen Anne addition faces Cottage Street and is a two and one-half story hipped roof building with two chimneys, built on a masonry foundation. A porch surrounds the first story south and west elevations with pedimented entries with fishscale tympanums on the west side and southwest corner and an unpedimented entry at the southeast corner. Simplified capitols support the porch roof, unpainted beaded matchboarding covers the ceiling and a turned balustrade decorates the outer borders.

The facade is distinguished by two bay windows flanking a projecting central tower that originates directly above the porch roof as an enclosed porch with small-pane windows and extends beyond the height of the roof in the form of a bracketed hipped-roof tower with windows on three sides. The front entrance consists of two doors with upper portions glazed with etched frosted glass and Queen Anne's sash, and recessed panels with applied moulding on the lower half. A simple bracketed cornice is visible beneath the porch roof. Exterior hinges and doorknobs are brass with low-relief geometric patterning.

Windows on the second story, except those in the tower, are glazed with Queen Anne's sash over two and on the first story with two over two sash. Blinds flank all of the windows. A bracketed cornice with decorative friezeband is integrated on the mainstructure and again on the tower. A dormer projects from the south pitch of the roof.

The interior of the first story consists of three principal rooms. Elaborate Queen Anne mantelpieces are located in the southwest and southeast rooms. The southeast room is further enhanced by a pressed tin ceiling. Tall baseboards with ornate caps surround the hardwood flooring.

Intersecting the east elevation of the Queen Anne elevation is an earlier Cape Cod house, characteristically one and one-half stories high and one story deep. A simplified Doric pilaster delineates the southeast corner of this building. The raking cornice returns to suggest a pediment and is comprised of cyma recta moulding. In the south gable, two wood mullions divide a large window into three, four over one sash windows. On the first story of the south eleveation, six over six sash windows with Greek Revival muntin profiles are utilized. On the first story of the north elevation, the east window is infilled with clapboards and the west window is enlarged to include a plate-glass "picture" window; the second story contains two, two over two sash windows divided by a wood mullion. A shed dormer projects from the east pitch of the roof. A chimney is located in the center of the ridge.

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Connected to the east elevation of the Greek Revival structure is a one story gabled wing built on a field stone foundation that is faced with large granite slabs. Windows with six aver six sash and Greek Revival muntin profiles, and a four paneled door with flat casings are located on the south elevation.

A medium-sized gabled barn with a pinnacled cupola is the easternmost attached structure. The exterior is clapboarded and sliding doors provide access on the west and east elevations. Windows with six over six sash are located on the gabled end and to the north of the sliding door on the west elevation. A door is located on the east elevation. Flat casings surround the windows and door. Cornice profiles are similar to those on the Cape Cod house and wing.

Directly south of the barn is a one and one-half story three stall gabled garage with sheds attached to the east elevation and a one story hipped roof wing connected to the west elevation. The roof on the shed furthest east is charred as a result of a recent fire.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Edward Lane residence visually traces the architectural evolution and period of growth of its owners and Littleton. During the mid-nineteenth century, the community was largely dependent on its agricultural resources. The Greek Revival structure at 16 Cottage Street represents a dignified, yet modest building based on a domestic interpretation of classical models that typifies a primarily agrarian community during this period.

During the last quarter of the nineteenth century, Littleton prospered greatly due to the rapid growth of local manufactories, including the Saranac Glove Company, Littleton Shoe Factory and Kilburn Stereoscopic View Works, and the influx of White Mountain tourists. Main Street and the surrounding residential areas in Littleton evolved from a primarily modest built environment to a thriving community. The addition at 16 Cottage Street amply reflects the wealth and prosperity of the time. optimistic and romantic Queen Anne structure includes a steeply hipped roof, an imposing central tower, bay windows and elaborate cornice and window detailing., e de la proposición de la companyación de

The Lane residence exhibits the monumentality of the Queen Anne period and the reserved dignity of the Greek Revival period. The distinct characters of the two intersecting structures significantly portray the architectural and social development of an expanding community.

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
