Description:

The nominated segment is the portion of Route 14 in Windham, known locally as Scotland Road, that lies between its intersection with Back Road at the east end and the driveway to 80 Scotland Road, which is approximately 300 feet east of the intersection with Ballamahack Road, at the west end, yielding a total length of about 1,700 feet. The road is a well-paved state highway, with two 12-foot-wide travel lanes, and an additional center turn lane as it intersects with Back Road (Photograph 1). Along the north edge of the road is a broad grassy verge, about 27 feet wide, with tall deciduous trees and low shrubs, and then a fieldstone wall in good repair about three feet high (Photograph 2). The width of the verge suggests that the center line of the roadway has been shifted southward within the right of way, a circumstance that probably accounts for the lack of a stone wall on the south side of the road. There are no buildings along the north side of the road within the boundary of the nominated portion. The houses along the south side of the road are mostly of modern construction.

Traveling in either direction one encounters an outstanding view to the north of hundreds of acres of open land just beyond the stone wall (Photographs 3 and 4). Currently used for hay production, the fields are demarcated by low stone walls overgrown with vegetation and tree lines. The western portion of the gently rolling land is fairly level, with a slight downslope in the eastern portion. The fields at the western end were the site of the French Army's forty-seventh camp in November 1782, on the return march from the victory at Yorktown. The camp site's location and information potential has been confirmed through archaeological testing.

Although similar in size and function, the stone walls in the western and eastern portions of the nominated segments are of somewhat different construction. The wall in the western part has more flat stones that appear to have been split to size, and there are rough-shaped cut capstones along the top of the wall (Photograph 5). The wall along the eastern portion is built of more rounded, as-found fieldstones (Photograph 6).

Significance:

This portion of Scotland Road is significant because of its visual qualities, which recall the appearance of the Connecticut landscape at the time of an important event in Connecticut's Revolutionary War-period history, the march of the French forces under the command of Count Rochambeau to and from the Battle of Yorktown (Criterion A). Although the road itself is decidedly modern in appearance, and only the north side retains its historic character, nevertheless the view of such a large expanse of open fields beyond well-maintained stone walls makes this segment stand out. Driving or walking in either direction along this section of Scotland Road, one can easily imagine the "pasture lands [and] farms sown with rye and wheat . . . with maize . . . with potatoes" that characterized the eastern Connecticut landscape experienced by the French (Blanchard 1969: 108-109).

The French army first passed along Scotland Road in June 1781, marching in divisions from the third camp in Plainfield to the fourth camp beyond Windham Center, along the banks of the Shetucket River. In November 1782 the now-victorious troops again came through Windham, this time camping in the fields on the level ridge top bisected by present-day Scotland Road, included within the western half of the nominated segment.

Although the French found the roads of Connecticut generally in poor condition and woefully inadequate to the task of moving thousands of infantry troops attended by artillery units and supply wagons, this particular segment seems to have been one of the least onerous. Chastellux had earlier noted that "six or seven miles [fromCanterbury], the country begins to open," and von Closen noted during this portion of the march that "the roads improved, and the troops began to march in better fashion" (Chastellux 1968 (I): 22-23; von Closen 1958:85).

No doubts can be raised regarding the attribution of the nominated portion as a part of the French march route. The French map of the forty-seventh camp (Figure 2) clearly shows Scotland Road between Ballamahack Road on the west and Back Road on the east, with topographical features such as the small brook at the east end still identifiable today. Since the location and extent of the camp have been confirmed archaeologically and shown to agree with the divisional symbols as plotted by Berthier, the location of the adjacent road shown on the French map becomes fixed as well.

Section number 10

The nominated property extends from the east side of the driveway of 80 Scotland Road, located approximately 300 feet east of the intersection of Scotland and Ballamahack Roads, to the intersection with Back Road, a distance of approximately 1,700 feet. In width the nominated property includes the entire public road right-of-way.

Boundary Justification:

The view of fields off to the north which give this segment its character extend only as far as the Back Road intersection on the east end. On the west end, the stone wall on the north side is interrupted by the driveway for 80 Scotland Road, at which point it continues in an entirely different form, a regularly laid c.1900 granite wall with gate posts, long capstones, and remnants of a stuccoed surface. Also, at this point the appearance of the land changes from fields to modern residential construction.
