DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Houston Carnegie Library is a one-story nine-by-twelve-bay brick building constructed on a cruciform plan and topped with a metal hip roof of standing seam construction. Three chimneys and a hip-roofed skylight project from the roof. The central projecting section of the front (north) elevation contains double-leaf doors with long glass panels, a bracketed door hood, and two narrow windows which flank the entrance. Other windows on the front elevation are of similar proportion but are paired and divided horizontally by transoms and vertically by mullions. The projecting section of the rear elevation is lit by a group of narrow ribbon windows. All sash are one-over-one. Lintels and sills are rectangular and concrete. A horizontal band of soldier bricks accents the area above the water table, and the side elevations are enriched with a rectangle of raised bricks. A plaque which reads "Carnegie Library" is set within a rectangle of patterned rowlock bricks above the entrance.

The most outstanding feature of the interior is the sixteen-pane skylight which is recessed in the ceiling of the center hall. Side rooms are divided from the hall by double sliding doors, and simple mantels with Ionic columns decorate each end wall. Oak baseboards and chair and plate rails are used throughout.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Houston Carnegie Library is Mississippi's first Carnegie Library and the second public library in the state. Although its architect is unknown, the building is notable for its design, which effectively combines elements of the Prairie and Western Stick styles.

In 1908, L. B. Reid, superintendent of the Houston Public Schools, wrote to Andrew Carnegie about the possibility of a donation for a town library. For the purpose of establishing such libraries, Carnegie gave during his lifetime an estimated \$350,000,000 and left more to be distributed after his death. Carnegie funds were responsible for the construction of 2500 public libraries, 1700 of them in the United States. Reid's letter began a correspondence which resulted in a Carnegie gift to Houston of \$6,000 for a library building and equipment. It was stipulated that maintenance was to be the responsibility of the town.

A lot was purchased by the town from a local merchant, W. D. Atkinson (Deed Book 92: 438), and the library building was constructed in 1909. A few subscription libraries had been established earlier (the Fisk Memorial Library in Natchez in 1883 and the Clayton Library at Holly Springs in 1886), and one free public library had been established at Biloxi in 1898. Much larger than the Biloxi library, the collection of which numbered only 100 volumes, the Houston Carnegie Library was the first free public library of significant size to be established in the state.

Architecturally, the Houston Carnegie Library exhibits the horizontal emphasis characteristic of the Prairie School. The low hip roof with overhanging eaves, the double horizontal members of the door hood, and the brick enrichment all accent the horizontal. The windows, which individually are more vertical than horizontal, are emphasized horizontally in various ways: sash are one-over-one, and transoms, lintels, and sills are prominent features. The close grouping of windows on the rear elevation is particularly characteristic of the Prairie School. Although the bracketed door hood and exposed rafter tails of the building depart from the Prairie style, their curves provide a relief from the severe geometry of that style. Almost oriental in feeling, these features are typical of the Western Stick style, which was also enjoying popularity in the early twentieth century.


