Narrative Description

The Edgerton Post Office is located on a street off of the main thoroughfare in the downtown commercial district of Edgerton, Wisconsin. The one-story, brick building with a limestone and granite base was built in 1939. It is Georgian Revival in style.

The cornerstone reads: "James A. Farley, Postmaster General, John M. Carmody, Federal Works Administrator, W. Englebert Reynolds, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Louis A. Simon, Supervising Architect, Neal A. Melick, Supervising Engineer, 1939."

The plan of the building is T-shaped, with the public entrance/lobby located on North Swift Street. The front portion of the building has a standing seam, side gable roof. A wood cupola is centered on this roof, aligned with the door, and is topped with a weathervane. Behind this portion of the building is a flat-roofed, rectangular section. A third section at the back gives the building a T configuration.

The main façade is symmetrical about the entrance. The front doors are reached by granite stairs. A painted metal railing and a pole lamp are on either side. The entrance is located within a slightly recessed arched. Within the arch, a pair of wood, fluted columns and pilaster-ice piers support a section of entablature with dentils below the cornice. In the area below the arch is an eagle in relief. Between the columns and below the entablature is the door with a transom panel above. The transom contains wood tracery and appears to be original. The door and its sidelights are modern replacements.

On each side of the door are two windows. These have 12 over 12, double-hung lights. They appear to be original; however, aluminum storm windows have been added. Each window has a limestone lintel and sill. Framing the outer windows are brick, pilaster-like projections. The use of these pilasters gives the façade a three-part composition. The stepping out of the frieze between and including these projections reinforces the separation of the outer pavilions. The frieze wraps around the entire building, unifying its various parts. A line of dentils below the cornice adds visual interest. The gabled ends of the front section also have the denticulated molding, forming a full pediment with a half round window in each of the gable ends. An original loading dock at the rear of the building consists of a flat roof extending overt the loading area. Metal tie rods from the main building support it.

The interior has the original terrazzo floor and marble wainscot, as well as the original stained wood vestibule. The walls and ceiling are of plaster and appear to be original, although new lighting has been added. The stained wood trim around the post office boxes, windows, and doors remain.

Above the door to the postmaster's office is a 1941 mural by Vladimir Rousseff. Titled "Tobacco Harvest," it depicts a family coming to a hearty meal during the tobacco harvest, an important crop in this

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part of the state through the early twentieth century. The mural has less of the stark realism prevalent in other federally commissioned works of the period. Evident are traces of Cubism and abstraction, especially in the treatment of the barn in the background. The shadows on the figures and their clothing give them a facet-like appearance. The perspective is somewhat unusual in that the viewer is not looking at a scene depicted infront of him, but down at the table where the family is gathered to eat. Rousseff painted the mural in 1941 during the Depression relief era under the public works programs.

Both the building and the mural are in good condition.

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Edgerton Post Office, Rock County, Wisconsin

Statement of Significance

The Edgerton Post Office is an example of a Federal post office in the context of the "United States Post Office Construction from 1913-1943, State of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District" Multiple Property Nomination. It is eligible for listing under Criterion C in the areas of art and architecture. The building is a good intact example of the Colonial Revival style post office from the 1930s and is also significant for the mural of high artistic merit found in its lobby.

Historic Context

This building is the first federally owned post office in Edgerton. Prior to its construction in 1939, postal functions were located in a series of buildings owned or leased by each postmaster. The first post office in Edgerton was founded in 1853 and the first postmaster was William Hall.² The Edgerton Post Office is on of several built in the State from 1933 to 1939 under the auspices of the Public Works Administration. The history of post office construction in Wisconsin in this period and under this program is detailed in the above-referenced multiple property nomination. Included in this building is a mural by Vladimir Rousseff, undertaken as part of the WPA artists' program. The historic context of public art in post offices of this era is also included in the multiple property nomination.

This is one of two similarly designed post offices in the survey: DePere and Edgerton. Edgerton's post office features a transom over the door and is executed in brick, whereas the smaller version at DePere is built of Lannon stone.

Significance

The Edgerton Post Office is a good, local example of the Georgian Revival style applied to a small public building. Elements of the style present on this building include: the semi-circular fanlight in the gable ends, straight window heads, the wrap-around denticulated cornice, the cupola, and the elaborate treatment of the door surround. The use of projecting bands of brick gives the impression of massive pilasters delineating the tripartite composition popular in many eighteenth century buildings and in the later revivals of these styles. The building has had few exterior or interior lobby alterations and retains a high degree of architectural integrity. The Wisconsin architectural inventory does not include any similar buildings in the City of Edgerton.

The Edgerton Post Office is further eligible for the mural contained in its lobby. This 1941 mural is by artist Vladimir Rousseff and is a good example of government funded art found in post offices throughout the country in the 1930s and early 1940s. The history of this art program is found in the multiple property

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nomination. Vladimir Rousseff was born in 1890 in Bulgaria. His father intended the 16 year old Vladimir to study business in Constantinople. Instead, the young man bought a ticket to America. After supporting himself with a variety of work, Rousseff enrolled in night classes at the Art Institute of Chicago. In addition to the mural at the Edgerton Post Office, Rousseff is known to have received commissions for murals for the post offices in Salem, Illinois, and in Iron Mountain, Michigan. The Iron Mountain project consisted of five panels depicting mail transportation in the West.³ Rousseff also painted the mural "A. Grignon Trading With the Indians" at the post office in Kaukauna, Wisconsin, in 1938.

The theme of the Edgerton mural depicts a locally important scene – the tobacco harvest. In general, many post office murals depict a local industry, local scenery, or an event of local significance. The area around Edgerton was one of the first in the state to grow tobacco. With the waning of the wheat crop in Wisconsin, tobacco became an important cash crop in the southern counties of the state. Because most of the tobacco crop grown in Wisconsin was and is used for cigars, the harvesting is by hand so as not to damage the leaves. Edgerton and nearby Stoughton became important centers for tobacco buying and manufacture by the late nineteenth century with competing warehouses and agencies from Chicago, New York and other eastern cities playing an important role in the commerce and the agricultural production of the area.

In conclusion, the Edgerton Post Office is eligible for listing under Criterion C for Art and Architecture as an example of a small Colonial Revival style post office with an intact interior mural. Both the building and the mural retain high degrees of integrity and display the variations in style found in public works projects.
