DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This large two-and-one-half story clapboard structure was constructed ca. 1857. The original high brick pillars in Flemish bond are now enclosed (brick laid in American bond) for the creation of ground floor rooms. A wide one-story veranda extends across the front of the house and is supported by eight free-standing columns and two engaged columns with an inter-columnar balustrade. A balustrade also runs along the wide wooden front steps and on the porch roof. The medium-gable main roof with returns has two massive hooded chimneys which allow for fireplaces in every room.

A central entrance has unusual octagonal glass insets that may have replaced the original side and transom lights. There are two 6/6 windows to either side of the doors on both floors; the second-floor double door is sheltered by a small pent roof. The area beneath the veranda is screened as a porch.

The left side elevation has three small windows at basement level, four windows on the first and second floors, and a single window with sidelights in the gable. A slight variation is found on the right side of the structure: the main floor has only three windows.

A much smaller veranda is attached to the rear of the structure and, since there is no second-floor exterior door, the porch roof lacks a balustrade. The rear door has sidelights and is flanked by four windows. Centered above that door is a roof-level window with sidelights and four windows which match those below. This veranda may be a later addition, for the columns are much smaller than those at the front.

INTERIOR

Wide central halls traverse both floors and are connected by a broad staircase with the original bannister; there are two rooms to either side of the hall on each floor; the fireplaces have simple mantels and each room has wainscoting.

Under the wallpaper in the hall are carved the names of Union soldiers who were in the house during the period when the house was abandoned (during and just after the War Between the States).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Windsor, a spacious house amid moss-hung trees on Russell Creek, was constructed ca. 1857 as a wedding gift to one of the sons of Edward Whaley. This plantation was a major producer of sea island cotton.

Agriculture

The southern coastal islands were famous for the production of sea island cotton, known for its long, strong, and silky fiber that brought handsome profits to its owners. Although this variety (which had come from Bermuda) took almost twice as long to pick as inland cotton, its superior quality made it much in demand and brought larger profits.

Architecture

The large clapboard structure is a good example of a sea island interpretation of Georgian architecture. Large verandas, wide halls, spacious rooms with high ceilings, and a large number of windows were the general requirements for an area of generally mild winters and hot, humid summers. The high brick foundations, which elevated the structure to catch the river breezes, also helped safeguard it against high tides. The overly large rooms also indicated wealth; their massive fireplaces required the work of many servants to keep the house heated during the winter.

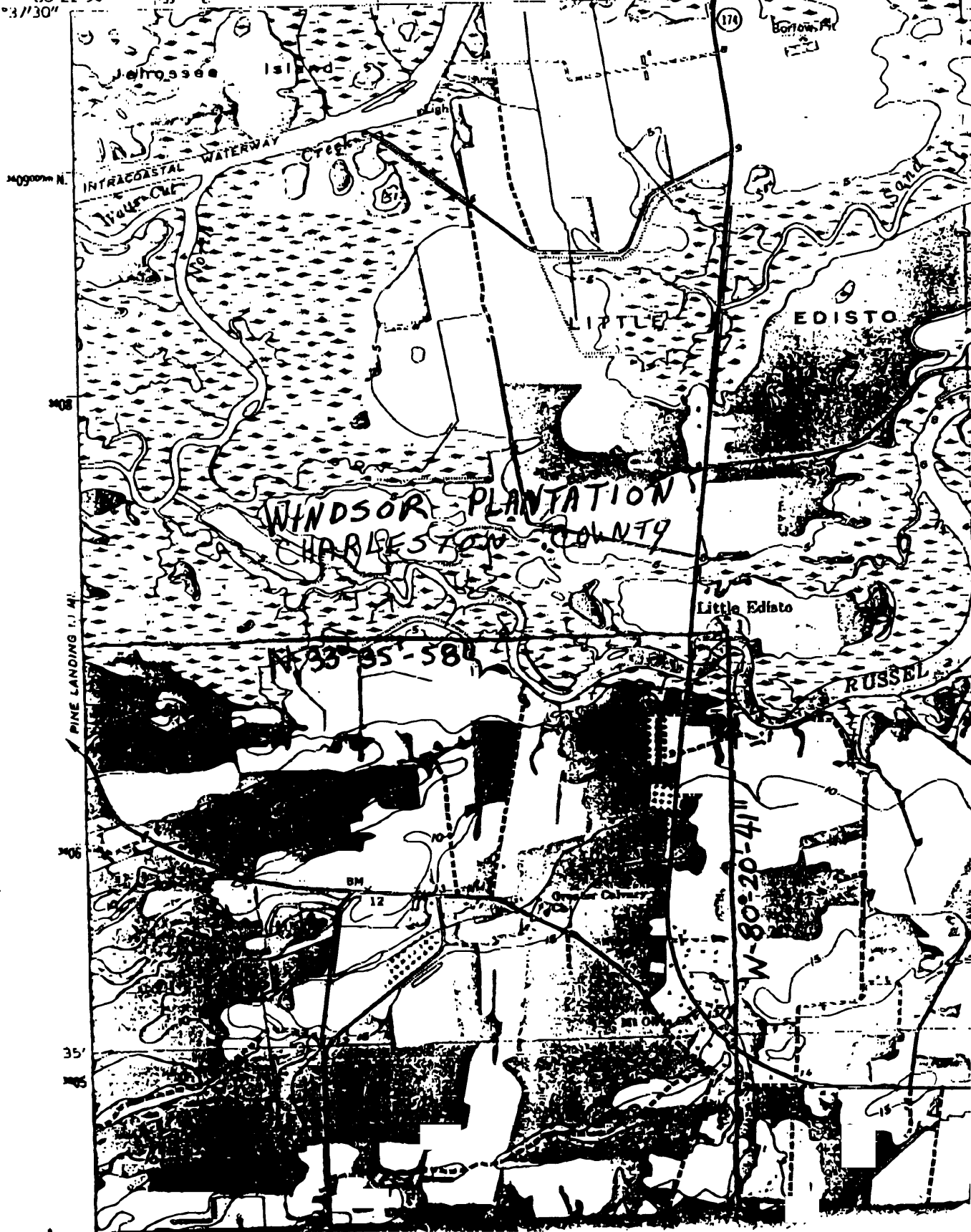
