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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Jaffa Opera House is a two-story brick and sandstone building constructed on a rectangular plan. It most closely follows the High Victorian Italianate style of architecture. The side and rear facades are faced with brick and are plain, while the front (northwest) facade is faced with cut sandstone. (The Opera House was one of the first buildings in the area to make use of the high quality sandstone from the nearby quarries of D.A. Chappell.)

The ground floor was constructed to house four separate business establishments. Originally, the four units were similar in design. The large entranceway and stairway that, at one time, led to the second floor opera house, is centered and dissimilar from the other units. Single, twostory engaged columns mark the divisions between the units and flank the central recessed stairway.

There is a bracketed crowning cornice rising to carved pediments, four of them, one centered in each of the four units. The pediments are unrelated to facade below. Segmental arches are used in the central unit. The words "Trinidad Opera House" are centered in the crowning pediment, with the date "1882" below. The central arched entrance has radiating voussoirs.

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There are 13 double hung windows with plain molding on the second floor, three to each unit and one above the central entrance. Between and above the windows is a symetrical repetition of carved, linear design motifs that work with the ornamental cornice and pediments to display a rather busy front.

The ground floor has seen many alterations over the years. Today the Hausman "Rexall" Drug Store occupies both units left of the center entranceway as you face it. There is one large centered entryway to the drug store, recessed and with pillars. It has a two-leaf door with transom and full story fixed windows with trabeated window openings.

The unit immediately to the right of the center staircase is the only unit that is still similar to the original, with central, recessed, twoleaf door and full story fixed windows. The windows have been removed in the other unit and it has been arcaded as an entrance to a movie house, now abandoned.

The second floor opera house, when it existed, had a seating capacity of 710. The stage was 45 feet wide and 20 feet from the footlights to the back wall. The proscenium opening was 22 feet wide and 16 feet high. There were two traps near the center of the stage and the depth under the stage was three and one-half feet. The Opera House had eight sets of scener for the stage of the stage and the depth sets of

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Sol and Henry Jaffa came to the rapidly growing town of Trinidad, Colorado, around 1870. They were joined in 1872 by another brother, Samuel. The brothers, as partners, did well in the mercantile business. (They were also instrumental in establishing the first Jewish congregation in Trinidad.)

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In 1881, they purchased an entire block near the heart of the community. Two years later construction was completed on the major building of the block, the Jaffa Opera House. The street floor was a commercial center and the entire second floor was the opera house.

For the next twenty years this would be the cultural heart of Trinidad. The top stage, opera and vaudeville troupes touring the West performed here. Most of the bookings were made by Pete McCall who booked touring companies for theaters in Denver, so most of the acts he booked for Denver performed in Trinidad as well. A program found in recent years told of famed Margaret Mather playing Juliet here in 1887. Activity at the Opera House hit its peak in the 1890s.

The Jaffa brothers sold their interest in the Opera House in 1895.

In 1908, when the more modern West Theater opened nearby, the Jaffa Opera House closed its doors. The building has seen many uses since that time, and has been altered considerably internally, particularly the second floor "opera House."

Much of the ground fyoor has been the Hausman Drug Store over the years. roperated by the same family. There was a liquor store in the center of the 141 building. A movie theater was located at the opposite corner from Hausman Building for many years. It was called the Maze Theater from 1910-1913, WECHTER Rex from 1915 to 1918, the Palace from 1926-7, and finally the Isis,  $^{4}$  %  $\approx 5$  which closed in the 1960s. Since that time this section of the building has been abandoned, the seats have been torn out, and the area has deteriorated. NATION

The second floor has been used primarily for offices (doctors, dentists, lawyers, a loan office, and apartments). Since the late 1940s, the entire 1770 second floor is composed entirely of apartments and furnished rooms.

Today it is a key building in a local Model Cities program. The plan calls for restoring the opera house, much like the original, to make it once again a cultural center for Trinidad and a key to the city's historic past.
