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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Davidson Home is near the Steilacoom waterfront on a hill overlooking Puget Sound. Standing two stories high, the medium-gabled house is a mid-nineteenth century American farmhouse built on a basic T pattern. In the back of the building, a one-story portion extends directly to the rear, forming the base of the T. The two-story section has two singlestack chimneys arranged one behind the other in straddle ridge fashion. Each of these chimneys has two interior fireplaces. The one-story rear extension of the house has only a single chimney and fireplace. All three chimneys are common red brick.

The outside walls are composed of 16' long fir planks. The interior ceilings are 9'8" high, and the doors stand 7'2". A foot of space separates the first-story ceiling from the second-story floor. The original foundation was composed of cedar blocks and hewn fir timbers, but these were replaced with cement in 1955.

A two-story porch extends nearly the full width of the front of the house. The balustrades, or railings, are later work. The main porch has two French doors and a main entrance opening onto it, whereas the second-floor porch balcony has three French doors. A flush, light mullion transom is situated above the main entrance door. All the sash windows are double hung and have lintels. The French doors and all the windows on the front and two sides of the house have shutters.

In the 1880's, the slate roof was replaced by cedar shingles which, in turn, were replaced by a composition roof. The roof trimming of the house is plain boxed cornices with returns. At present, the house is painted white with green shutters.

Generally, the exterior of the house has been altered little. On the inside, bathrooms have been added and some walls removed.



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of course, a complete set of plans were printed up. Being an attractive and well preserved example of a mid-nineteenth century American farmhouse, the home is particularly noted for its full length porch and plain boxed cornices with returns. The building's double chimneys and five French doors are also noteworthy.
