Built in 1751 in a Flemish bond brick pattern.

The roof line was raised and quasi-Victorian gables, both front and rear have been added. These have since been removed and a hand-split cedar shake roof restored. The front door was replaced with an exact duplicate and panelling in some of the rooms has been taken out, otherwise the original woodwork remains.

Before the house was moved in 1913, it had two frame wings, a kitchen on the west side with a Dutch oven and a wing in the rear built in the early part of the nineteenth century. Originally there was a smoke house in the attic.

The house was moved approximately 200 yards in 1913 due to its endangerment by a railroad line.

The interior consits of three rooms on the first floor (two drawing rooms and a pantry), four rooms on the second floor, one large one originally used as the study of classroom for the theological students.

The attic contains two rooms and a smokehouse.

The floors are wide-board random width, the walls and ceilings are plaster.

The east and west brick elevations have no windows except for the clapboard gable ends.

None of the interior colors is correct and the house needs restoration.

Within the walls of this building developed the nucleus of the establishment of Rutgers University and the New Brunswick Theological Seminary.

Rev. John Frelinghuysen brought his bride Dinah Van Bergh to live here in 1751 when he returned from Holland where he studied for the ministry. A son, General Frelinghuysen who who served under Gen. Washington, was born here. Students resided at the Old Dutch Parsonage in order to study under Rev. Frelinghuysen, one being Jacobus Hardenbergh who married Mrs. Frelinghuysen after the death of her husband. Rev. Hardenbergh was very active in the Revolutionary war, being a close friend of General and Mrs. Washington who stayed at the nearby Wallace House during the winter of 1778-79.

Rev. Hardenbergh was instrumental in the establishment of Queen's College, now Rutgers University and served as its first President.

The house is an excellent example of mid-18th century Flemish Bond brick structure. The smoke house in the attic, vented through the chimney, is an unusual feature and was used to foil marauding troops.
