Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Eureka United States Post Office (c. 1936) is located at 301 North Oak Street in Eureka, Greenwood County, Kansas (pop. 3,425). The one story, flat roofed, red brick and limestone building has an eastern facade orientation. The building measures approximately sixty-four feet from north to south and sixty-two feet from east to west with a twenty-two foot by twenty-eight foot rear projection. A double door surmounted by a transom pierces the center of the building's facade. Steps lead up to the doorway. Two sets of large, multi-paned windows flank the doorway. Limestone panels surround the windows and the door on the facade, supporting a limestone architrave and concluding in the limestone foundation. Six windows of similar design pierce the north and south elevations of the building. This post office appears to be an example of a class B post office, rather than the more common class C or D type that was constructed in Kansas during the 1930s and 1940s.

The mural "Cattle Roundup" was installed on the north wall of the Eureka Post Office lobby above the postmaster's door and the two bulletin boards that flank it. This is the traditional location for Section artwork in the smaller class post offices. "Cattle Roundup" is an oil on canvas mural that depicts cowboys rounding up cattle in the Flint Hills near Eureka, in southeast Kansas. Kirkland places a bull, a cow, and a calf in the foreground of the canvas, the herd thunders behind them. A lead cowboy encircles the herd. Kirkland uses warm tones of browns and greens to portray a scene that was very common and close to the heart of the Eureka area.

"Cattle Roundup" was installed on August 5, 1938, and was attached to the wall with white lead and linseed oil. It measured 12' 6" by 5' 5" before installation and is framed with a small moulding. The surface was glazed slightly. In 1973 the mural's condition was assessed as good.

In 1983, Anton Rajer, Associate Conservator of Art with the Nelson Atkins Museum in Kansas City, Missouri cleaned, touched up, and varnished the mural. Rajer gently rolled over the mural with cotton swabs dipped in a weak solution of trisodium phosphate, aerosal, and water to clean the mural. He varnished the clean mural with Acryloid B-72, a reversible varnish. He then inpainted the deteriorating parts of the picture with

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Eureka United States Post Office (c. 1936) is being nominated to the National Register as part of the Kansas Post Office Artwork (1936-1942) Thematic Resources nomination at the local and state levels of significance under criteria A and C for its historical association with the Treasury Department's Section program and for the artistic significance of the mural that it contains. The mural, "Cattle Roundup", was painted by Denver artist Vance Kirkland (1904-?) in 1938.

"Cattle Roundup" is an oil on canvas mural that depicts cowboys rounding up cattle in the Flint Hills near Eureka, in southeast Kansas. Cattle were the driving force of the Eureka economy in the 1930s when the mural was painted. Kirkland places a bull, a cow, and a calf in the foreground of the canvas, the herd thunders over the hills behind them. A lead cowboy encircles the herd, Kirkland uses warm tones of browns and greens to portray a scene that was very common and close to the heart of the Eureka area. "Cattle Roundup" is representative of the illustrative realism that was funded under the Section program.

Kirkland studiously incorporated community comments into the subject material and presentation of the mural. Of his visit to Eureka in 1938 Kirkland wrote the Section's Edward Rowan:

I made a trip to Eureka and spent considerable time with the postmaster. He helped me get ideas from the businessmen, the newspaper editors, and the people in general concerning the subject matter for the mural in the post office. Eureka is the center of the cattle industry in Kansas. Considerable oil is obtained in this region, but the boom is over and cattle is the most important and vital industry. In fact, I believe it is the only industry. Every man I talked to was either a cattleman who lived on a ranch

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a polyvinyl acetate palette. This paint is designed to retain its shade longer than the oils originally employed and provides a way of variating between the original paint and the restoration paint. A finish coat of Acryloid F-10 varnish was then applied. Rajer received numerous contracts from the United States Post Office in the early 1980s to restore Section artwork in the midwest and the plains states. He was responsible for the restoration of the mural at the Neodesha, Kansas post office in 1983. The Eureka mural is in good condition.

A varnished, wooden vestibule projects in to the lobby, cutting off some view of the mural. This is a tradition design feature found in most of the post offices included in this nomination. The floors and the wainscotting retain their original tiles. The postmaster's door and bulletin boards retain their original surrounds. The original hanging light fixtures have been replaced with almost flush mounted fluorescent lights.

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outside of the town or a retired cattleman living in town. The businessmen all seemed to own cattle somewhere near and could talk about cattle much easier than their own business. In fact, everybody talked about cattle and their vote was unanimous in wanting their post office to have a mural dealing with some phase of cattle raising. I choose the roundup. I'm sure you will understand the reason without me saying.

Of the completed mural, the Eureka <u>Herald</u> wrote that "the result shows that the time and effort was not wasted." Kirkland remembered that some people complained that the cows were too fat until one man said that the fat cows should remind everyone to improve their herd.

Kirkland received the commission for the Eureka Post Office on the basis of designs submitted for another competition, in which he was awarded an honorable mention. The commission was received on February 14, 1938 and the mural was installed on August 5, 1938. "Cattle Roundup" was installed on the north wall of the Eureka Post Office lobby above the postmaster's door and the two bulletin boards that flank it. The mural was attached to the wall with white lead and linseed oil. It measured 12'6" by 5'5" before installation and is framed by a small moulding. Kirkland received \$590 for the commission. The Eureka Post Office appears to be an example of one of the smaller class B type post offices that received Section artwork in Kansas.

Kirkland studied at the Cleveland School for Art, and organized the Kirkland School for Art in Denver in 1932. In 1972 he was a Professor of Art Emeritus at the University of Denver School of Art. Kirkland also was responsible for the mural that hangs in the Sayre Oklahoma Post Office.
