7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The building structure is reinforced concrete foundations, columns and slabs. The exterior walls are 12" thick composed of three layers of dark red brick. The building has 10 floors above ground plus a full basement and an open area-way in one side of the building from the 3rd floor to the roof. A two story wing (size 46'x49') is attached to the main building (size 100'x100') on the northwest corner. The windows are double hung wood with tall wood framed areas of glass and windows on the main floor. Terra cotta window sills, surrounds of terra cotta on corner openings and keys above windows, in flat arches of the 3rd to the 9th floors. The red brick exterior is high lighted with white glazed terra cotta of intricate designs, particularly on the main level. The cornice consists of 32 brackets per side supporting the decorative overhang. The top cornice of the building is cf ornate metal about four feet high with an over-hang of three feet. Decorative brick panels occur between all windows, 3rd thru the 9th floors. The main entry canopy on the east side has been remodeled in approximately 1961 and the cast iron pole lights removed.

The main interior lobby has stained oak paneling on the walls and columns. A spiral stair to the second floor made of marble steps, cast iron and bronze handrails. The remainder of the interior is plaster walls with stained oak and birch trim and doors. The ceilings on the main level have decorative moulded plaster trim at intersections with beams.

As stated above there have been minor alterations of the Severs Hotel. The canopy will be rehabilitated in accordance with the Secretary of the Interiors Standards. Pole lights matching the originals as nearly as possible will replace the removed originals. The main lobby retains most of the original features, however the rest of the buildings interior no longer retains any significant historic elements. The hotel retains most of its historic integrity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Severs Hotel is significant for its architectural design. Constructed in 1912, the building has continued as the most impressive structure in the Muskogee skyline.

Captain Severs promoted and financed construction of the Severs Hotel and work began in 1912. However, before construction was completed, Severs died. Considered the finest hotel in the area, the Sever's registration book listed prominent names of the era, including Will Regers, noted entertainer and goodwill embassador.

The real significance of the Severs Hotel, however, is in its architectural design. The structure designed by Mariner and La Beaume of St. Louis, Missouriis of reinforced concrete foundations, columns, beams and slabs. The exterior walls are 12 inches thick and composed of three layers of dark red brick. The ten-story building is elegant with intricate white glazed terra cottafeatures on the main level. The cornice of the building is decorative metal four feet high with an over-hang of three feet. The main interior lobby has several features which contribute to the significance of the structure. It is decorated with stained oak paneling on the walls and columns, and a grand spiral stair to the second floor is made of marble steps, cast iron and bronze handrails. Stained oak and birch compose the trim and doors and remaining surfaces are of plaster. Unique plaster work was used in the lobby and around the stairway. The plaster was molded and finished to appear as marble. This element remains in tact though a section of it was painted black.

The above features make the Severs Hotel the most impressive structure in Muskogee. It is focal point of the downtown commercial district. Other structures of the period and surrounding the Severs Hotel are small commercial types and are overshadowed by the striking design of the hotel.

The Severs Hotel is being rehabilitated in accordance with Secretary of the Interior's Standards.

7. Description

(Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, September 13, 1982)

The Severs Hotel, completed in 1912, is a ten story commercial building plus a full basement. The exterior is finished with red brick and it has a flat roof. It is approximately $100' \times 100'$ with a two-story wing $(46' \times 49')$ attached to the main part on the northwest corner. The structure has reinforced concrete foundations, columns, and slabs.

The two story base has large fixed pane windows with multi-paned transoms flanking the main entrance. The large windows on facade are separated by pilaster-like mullions with decorative capitals. The second floor facade consists of a band of 1/1 double-hung sash windows with white terra cotta surrounds. A terra cotta cornice on three sides delineates the two story base from the remaining eight floors.

Fenestration on three sides includes six vertical bands of 1/1 double-hung sash windows. The corner windows on three sides are highlighted with white terra cotta surrounds and keys above windows. White terra cotta keys also accentuate the vertical bands in the center. Above the ninth floor there is a white terra cotta cornice with dentil-type ornamentation. The tenth floor corners have decorative terra cotta quoining and floors three through nine have a brickwork type of quoining.

Characteristic of Sullivanesque styling is the boldly projecting cornice at the top. The cornice consists of thirty-two brackets per side. Decorative brick panels occur between all windows on floors three through nine.

The main entry canopy on the east side was remodeled in ca. 1961 and the cast iron pole lights were removed. Other than these minor alterations, the building retains its architectural integrity.
