The Lower Garden District is a varied urban area still containing important elements of 19th century architecture, city planning and land-scape design. It is undergoing the first stages of a revival, most importantly in restoration by private individuals for their own residential occupancy. It is bounded by the Mississippi River, the Central Business District, lower St. Charles Avenue and the Garden District.

The Lower Garden District is a change of pace from the areas above In contrast to the typical 19th century gridiron plan areas of the Central Business District downriver, and the Garden District upriver the street layout of this area compensates for the cresent in the river with the streets intersecting at angles and with resulting irregular plots, a plan often taken advantage of to create a variety of neighborhoods, of urban spaces and city-scapes. Just as the neighboring areas contain almost completely either commercial or residential areas in their rectalinear blocks, so the Lower Garden District contains various close contrasts in land use and varying types of neighborhoods and neighborhood Its most important significant areas are the residential landmarks. area of Coliseum Square and the shopping area of Magazine Street, both mostly of mid 19th century. Coliseum Square is a large irregularly shaped park surrounded by important residences of the mid century and related by various landscaped streets to some of the adjacent blocks. The main elements of an early 19th century scheme of canals and fountains still exist. Just up from the Square is a shopping area on Magazine Street, again with small park areas and 19th century commercial buildings, many designed as units of quarter or half

On the Lake Pontchartrain side of Coliseum Square is a nineteenth century residential area recently increasingly used for commerical purposes the closer one gets to St. Charles Avenue. The existence here of an old institution in a fine building, St. Anna's Asylum, is noted as are the presence of many good buildings. On the river side of the Square is a residential area generally less affluent than that of the Square, but containing not only interesting mid-century Colonnaded row-houses. but occasionally an unusual and early private dwelling. Farther toward the river, the historic area nearest the central business district has been seriously decimated. However, there are many clusters of old cottages several large important 19th century brick cotton warehouses and Annunciation Square, the focal point of its neighborhood, an open space and play area. On Annunciation Square is the boyhood home of Henry Stariley, the newspaperman and explorer of Africa. On the uptown edge of this area is Kingsley Monse, one of the pioneering social work centers of the country, which also pioneered in adaptative historical preservation; it occupies a former cotton warehouse.


Neving from the Magazine street commercial area toward the Lake is a control of plan residential area similar to the Garden District, but with cottages and double houses mixed in with the typical New Orleans midningsteenth affluent house.

The architecture of the Lower Garden District is mostly of the affluent 1850's and 1860's of late Greek Revival and experimental and eclectic mid-Victorian. Its irregular streets, parks and open spaces provide it with a variety and occasional sophistication. Its proximity to the Business District and Garden District place it favorably for improved uses and development.

This part of New Orleans is the most varied in building type, plan and use of the city's several historic areas, and is, one might say, a microcosmic expression in planning, building and growth of the important local traditions of cultural and ethnic heterogeneity, close contrasts of neighbors and the taste for urban life that has always existed in the city.

7. DESCRIPTION

On the river side of the Magazine Street center is the Redemptorist Community with schools, various administrative buildings, and two churches, St. Apphonsus, a fine brick church in a sober baroque style, and the famous St. Mary's Assumption Church, again brick, with the most florid, bold and inventive of mid-Victorian interiors. Past this area is the St. Thomas project, a low income housing project of low brick buildings in a 1930's residential style, with grassed areas and many trees. The upper boundary of the Lower Garden District is Jackson Avenue. Many fine Victorian houses still stand here, but mixed with a predominantly commercial usage of small shops, some new labor union halls and a new hospital. It is along this street that many of the older Carnival parades "Form", or organize during Carnival.

and Constance Streets, longitude 29°-55'-51", latitude 90°-4'-30". Then proceed south west in the middle of the blocks between Magazine and Constance to a point between Magazine and Philip Streets, at longitude 29°-55'-46" and latitude 90°-4'-38". From here proceed south east down the center of the blocks between Magazine and Philip Streets to the original starting point of longitude 29°-55'-20", latitude 90°-4'-16".

The boundaries of the Lower Garden District coincide with those of the Garden District along the following line:

From the point at longitude $29^{\circ}-56'-4"$, latitude $90^{\circ}-4'-38"$, to the point at longitude $29^{\circ}-55'-51"$, latitude $90^{\circ}-4'$, 30", to the point at longitude $29^{\circ}-55'-46"$, latitude $90^{\circ}-4'-38"$.

BOUNDARIES OF THE LOWER GARDEN DISTRICT

The Lower Garden District is the area enclosed within the following boundaries: Starting, at longitude 290-55'-20" and latitude 900-4'-16", on the riverbank just uptown from Jackson Avenue, proceed along the riverbank in a northeasterly direction to longitude 29°-55'-54", latitude 90°-30'-38" where Race Street would touch the River. From here proceed westnorth west along Race Street to Annunciation Street, a point at longitude 290-56'-1" latitude 900-4'-13.5", and then proceed north north east along Annunciation Street to Gaienne Street, a point at longitude 29° -56'-23" and latitude 90° -4'-7.5". From here go west north west along Gaienne Street which runs into Calliope Street, to a point on Calliope Street between Prytania Street and St. Charles Avenue, longitude 29° -56'-28" and latitude 90° -4'-23.5". From this point proceed south southwest down the middle of the blocks between Prytania and St. Charles to a point on Felicity Street at longitude $29^{\circ}-56!-7"$, latitude $90^{\circ}-4!-30"$, then, still in the middle of the blocks, south west to a point in the middle of the block between Josephine and St. Andrew Streets, at longitude 29°-56'-4", latitude 90°-4'-38". From here south east down the middle of the blocks between Josephine and St. Andrew to a point in the middle of the block between Magazine
