19. History Hendery Allison was an early land owner in the Harrods Creek (Transylvania) area, and purchased this land around 1830. When he died in 1835, his sons inherited his property but did not make a division of it until 1863. James Allison took that part north of the road. and corner lights. Exterior end chimneys rear; interior chimneys front. The site also contains a board-and-batten smokehouse.

Center halls runs length of house, straight stairs at rear. Tall baseboards, ceilings 13', tall windows. Acanthus leaf plaster ceiling medallions. Mantles in front rooms have ogee cut-outs; other mantles, more Greek in feeling.

in 1877. In 1878, Dehaven sold half of the land to William Barrickman who was born in 1824 in Oldham County. He lived in Jefferson County for a few years as a young man, moved away, and returned in 1877 to Harrods Creek where he bought his farm and became a successful farmer.

Mary Barrickman Ewing inherited a share of the farm and purchased the interests of her brothers and sisters. The children of Mary B. and J.H. Ewing still own the house and farm.

The present owner remembers the date "1844" scratched in the plaster near one of the fireplaces.
