Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Appleby School is a two story building with a basement. The auditorium has a brick foundation with a two foot crawl space. It is vented by a 3 foot x 4 foot grilled opening centered under auditorium windows. East, north, and west wings have concrete slab on grade foundation. Interior framing is stud walls with rough plaster finish. Exterior walls are of solid masonry construction of burnt brick with scratched surface, stretcher bond with white limestone trim. Flush with exterior wall are three Italiante arches flanked by pilasters, the whole capped by limestone entablatures. There is a recessed and arcaded central front porch. There are three bays on the east and west elevations; each bay contains six pairs of double hung 24 lite windows. The auditorium roof is gabled with slate covering; boxed cornice with returns on gable and entrance, with mutules and dentils. There is composition roofing over east, north, and west wings. Main entrance doors face south and include three double leaf wooden doors under a recessed porch. A second side entrance also faces south on the rear most tier of the structure. This entrance is a double leaf wooden door with a fanlight. The south wall includes three mullion-type windows above the central porch, each with a limestone lintel, keystone, and shoulders. South wall also has a long 1/1 window on each side of the porch with the same lintels, keystones, and shoulders as above. There are various double and triple segmented windows on the east, north, and west walls with lintels, keystones, and shoulders matching those on Interior doors are heavy wooden, four paneled doors with a glass the south wall. Interior window treatment is indistinctive. Stairways, located at transome over each. the rear of the east and west wings, are poured concrete treads and landings supported by a prefabricated steel structural system. Walls and ceilings are finished with 3/4 inch lath and rough plaster over wood frame construction. Floors are of wood frame construction with 3/4 inch subfloor and 3/4 inch hardwood finish floor. Door knobs are ceramic enameled pressed metal. The blackboards are genuine slate originally used in Patton School which opened in 1891. Distinctive ceiling fans cool the auditorium. The building is heated by steam radiators. The original coal fed boiler has been converted to gas.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The F. T. Appleby Junior High School (originally Coffee High School) is significant as the first secondary education building in Florence and as a reflection of the growing movement toward providing higher education in Alabama during the first two decades of the 20th century. Prior to the construction of the High School, the Florence school system included four elementary schools. The construction of the school aslo corresponds with the enormous growth in population experienced in Florence from 1917-1920.

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Construction of the school began in 1916 on land donated to the city by Mrs. Camilla M. Coffee and was completed in 1917. The building cost \$95,000 and the mayor was severely criticized for spending so much money and building such a large building. The school was used as Coffee High until 1951 when a new building was constructed. At that time, the building was converted into a Junior High School and renamed Appleby School in honor of F. T. Appleby, Superintendent of the Florence school system from 1917-1932.
