The Methodists and the Baptists started worshipping on their respective lots in the late 1820's and are continuing to do so at the present. The congregation of St. Luke United Methodist Church is in its fifth sanctuary (all previous sanctuaries having been built successively on the same site), and the congregation of First Baptist is in its third sanctuary (with its former sanctuaries having been built on the same site, also). The educational wing and chapel, were added in 1924 and in 1948.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: several additions to the church resemble the main sanctuary and are in scale with it, the interior of the church has two aisles, with 3 sections of pews, a balcony runs across the rear of the church; to the west is the U. S. Post Office, to the north is Ralston Towers, to the east is the Church of the Holy Family, and to the south is the remainder of church square and St. Luke Methodist Church (which does not meet the criteria of the National Register); landscaping consists of grass lawns, boxwood shrubbery, granite fountain approximately 10 ft. in diameter, and hardwood shade trees; excellent condition.

AREAS OF SIGNIFICANCE: Architecture: Having been through several renovations, this building is architecturally significant to Columbus as it shows through building evolution, the development of one of the leading congregations in town. The building began as a Gothic style structure in 1859 and by 1910 the congregation had virtually made the building neo-classical in form. Its series of additions show great sympathy to the original structure. The complex is an architectural landmark in downtown Columbus.

"Church Square" is bounded by 2nd Avenue on the west, 11th Street on the south, 3rd Avenue one the east, 12th Street on the north.

Congregations of the First Baptist Church of Columbus and St. Luke United Methodist Church.

First Baptist Church of Columbus, 212 12th Street; St. Luke United Methodist, 1104 2nd Avenue.

The Methodists were granted Lot B, on the south side of "Church Square," in 1828; the Baptists were granted Lot A, on the north side of "Church Square," in 1829.

"Church Square" was set aside by Edward Lloyd Thomas in his original 1828 plan of the city of Columbus.

The present sanctuary of the First Baptist Church of Columbus was built in 1859--the sanctuary of St. Luke United Methodist Church is not a part of this nomination as it is a 1948 structure.

During 1896-1897 remodeling of First Baptist's sanctuary, a Gothic steeple was removed from the structure (along with the bell therein). The bell is presently situated on the "Church Square," to the northeast of the sanctuary. In 1909, the front of the Baptist sanctuary was remodeled, with the addition of six Doric columns and pediment. Outlying structures surrounding the main sanctuary were built between 1924 and 1948.
