### 7. Description

This 31.4 mile section of state maintained Route 66, now designated NM 122, serves as a frontage road along Interstate 40 from west of Milan to Continental Divide. The eastern 8.6 miles are a divided four-lane road completed in 1951 when several sections of Route 66 in New Mexico were widened. The remaining 22.6 miles are two lanes, often closely paralleling I-40 and the tracks of the former AT&SF Railroad as they climb toward the Continental Divide. The two-lane alignment was straightened and paved in 1937 and served as a part of Route 66 until it was replaced by I-40 after 1956. Features of the road include large cut banks, cut and fill grades across arroyos, several concrete box culverts, and a concrete slab bridge with steel beams and a bridge plate dated 1935. This historic alignment, cross-section template, and the surrounding landscape remain largely intact, imbuing this road section with a strong feeling of travel along Route 66 from the late 1930s through the mid-1950s. Brown and white signs denoting "Historic Route 66" have recently been erected by the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department along the roadside.

The road's climb out of the Rio San Jose drainage toward Continental Divide takes motorists out of an area known for its irrigated agriculture, especially carrots, in the 1940s. The discovery of uranium and development of nearby mines in the 1950s is evident from the road in distant tailing piles and settling ponds near Bluewater. As the road begins to climb toward the continental divide, the highest point on Route 66 with an elevation of 7,263 ft., pastures give way to a pinyon and juniper landscape with Navajo homesteads, or outfits, trading posts and other businesses periodically lining the roadside. From Prewitt westward, Entrada sandstone cliffs parallel the road to the north, offering a stretch of spectacular unbroken red sandstone extending to the Arizona border. These vistas contribute to the location, setting, and feeling of this section of Route 66.

#### 8. Significance

Designated as State Highway 6 in 1914 and a part of the National Old Trails Highway, a trans-regional road association that preceded the creation of the federal highway system in 1926, the road from Milan to Continental Divide remained a gravel road until the 1930s. Funding under FAP 75 resulted in projects to realign and pave the highway that were completed in 1937. Among these improvements was the elimination of two grade crossings by realigning the highway entirely south of the AT&SF Railroad line. As a result, Thoreau and other villages which had seen roadside businesses appear in the 1920s saw them disappear or relocate in the late 1930s when Route 66 no longer passed along the towns' main streets. The four-lane section west of Milan is also important as a reminder of the stopgap measures taken in the post-World War II years to accommodate increased traffic along Route 66 and other important highways. This section of statemaintained Route 66 is significant for its association with the rise of automobile tourism in New Mexico and thus is eligible under Criterion A.

Verbal Boundary Description

This property is 31.4 miles long and is maintained as a frontage and local road by the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department. The east end lies at the junction of Route 66 (NM 122) and NM 609, and the west end is at the junction of Route 66 NM (122) and the westbound exit ramp of I-40 at Continental Divide. The sides are a corridor extending fifty feet on either side of the centerline, marking a right of way of 100 feet, a minimum width used by the State Highway Department during the 1930s.

Boundary Justification

The boundary includes the entire parcel historically associated with this section of Route 66.
