 - 7b. Briefly describe the site or structure and describe any major alterations from its original condition:

Standing seven stories high, this brick and limestone building occupies a narrow corner lot. The principal facade (fronting Lisbon Street) is only three bays wide, while the Ash Street elevation is eight bays long. Constructed of yellow brick, the building has square headed windows with double hung sash except for three large round arched windows on the Ash Street elevation. Only the first two floors retain the original metal windows. The upper floors have aluminum combination sash. Limestone trim includes Doric pilasters supporting an entablature and the window sills. The roof cornice is terra cotta. Marble sheathing is employed in the lobby, the only surviving original interior space.

SIGNIFICANCE

The building is architecturally significant as the last major large commercial structure constructed in Lewiston prior to World WarI. As such, this former bank symbolizes the high water mark of the city's fortunes as an industrial center. It is also the tallest office building in Lewiston erected before 1950, and the only one to exhibit the thenfashionable neo-classical design using yellow brick and limestone trim.

20. Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings:

The locally unique design and large scale of this structure are well suited to its prominent corner location at the busy downtown intersection at Lisbon and Ash Streets. The Professional Building contributes to the diversity of structures depicting the evolving commercial character of Lisbon Street. A strong and interesting contrast is drawn with the McGillicuddy Building across Ash Street.

The steep grade between Lisbon and Lincoln Streets reveals a lower level of the building on the Ash Street facade.

DESCRIPTION

21. Other Notable Features of Building and Site, include Interior Features if known:

This tall, narrow, flat roofed, Commercial Style structure features a Neoclassical facade at the first two stories, repetitive stacking of office levels and a deep crowning cornice.

The first two stories are clad with smooth, ashlar, coursed limestone and includes four, two story Doric pilasters on a deep plinth that rests on a granite basecourse. A full entablature above the second story, includes a frieze embellished with plain rondels and a projecting cornice. The interior of the entry is richly clad with marble sheathing. The main entrance includes an architrave surround, surmounted by a full entablature.

The five upper stories are brick with string courses of vertically laid brick spanning the facade between dressed limestone sills. A corbeled, brick belt course projects above the fifth story and a limestone beltcourse above the sixth. The structure terminates with a wide limestone cornice.

The lower level, revealed at the Ash Street facade, has large "Chicago style windows and one street level shop entrance. Above this level, five, large, round arch openings rise a one and a half story height with projecting brick surrounds, and limestone, triple key stones. 25. Historical and Architectural Importance:

This structure is Lisbon Streets pre-eminent example of Commercial Style architecture as developed in New York and Chicago around the turn of the century. Early modern influence is indicated by the steel frame - curtain wall structural system, the visual balance between pier and spandrel components and the Neo-classical ornamentation on the first story.

The Manufacturer's National Bank was chartured in 1875 by Governor Nelson Dinglay and was originally located in the Pilsbury Block.
