Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This building conforms to the general description under property type "Resources Associated with Plantation Community Life" and property subtype "Plantation Houses."

Exterior physical evidence (brick changes in the foundation, corner board ghost marks) and interior details (mantel and door treatments) clearly indicate that the front half of the main body of this house was constructed first and that the rear half was a later addition. The front portion dates from c. 1750; the rear half was added c. 1800. Further rear additions from the main block are probably early twentieth century additions. All of the main block of the house has integrity from the period of significance for the Georgetown County Rice Culture multiple property submission. Because the twentieth century alterations are at the rear of the house, they do not impair its registration.

This house has a more formal entrance than most of the other plantation houses included in the Georgetown County Rice Culture multiple property submission. The main entrance is centrally located and sheltered by a one-story portico which extends across the center two-thirds of the facade. The portico roof, with a central gablet, is supported by columns resting on brick bases. Curved steps lead up to the portico from each side.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This plantation house is significant as one of the earliest extant main houses of the Georgetown County rice plantations and for its association with Christopher Gadsden. Beneventum was one of the earliest successful rice plantations in the area, and was owned by Gadsden, who built its main house c. 1750. Gadsden was a prominent statesman and soldier of the American Revolution, the originator of the "Don't Tread On Me" flag, and Federalist leader in the early national period. After his death in 1805, Beneventum was sold to John Julius Pringle, Attorney General of South Carolina from 1792 to 1808 and member of the South Carolina House of Representatives. At one time or another Pringle also owned White House and Greenfield, also on the Black River, and Arundel, on the Pee Dee River. The records of ownership after Pringle are incomplete. It is believed, however, that Beneventum was the plantation on the Black River at which Robert Pringle, a son of John Julius Pringle, produced 420,000 pounds of rice with 142 slaves in 1850. One of the significant later owners of the plantation was William M. Hazzard, who owned it from 1867 to 1883. In 1870 he produced 250,000 pounds of rice at Beneventum, an impressive amount so soon after emancipation. Hazzard's success in planting rice here led to his part in establishing the Georgetown Rice Milling Company in 1879 and his service as a director of the company. (1)
