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18. Description

A 2 1/2-story, gambrel-roofed house with first story and end-chimneys of massive, random boulder construction, shingle-covered upper stories, and full porch across the front. 8/8 windows on ground floor with 6/6 above (original to building) plus three Richardsonian-like "eyebrow" dormers on the rear. Gambrel-roofed rear wing was cut off (1953) and moved nearer the road (see Frank McKenna house). Above the front porch are two shingled shed dormers flanking a center dormer from which a door leads to a railed balcony; above is a low triple shed dormer. (See continuation sheet.)

20. Significance

Excellent example of late 19th-century "rustic" shingle style summer cottage with Colonial Revival overtones (gambrel roof, columned porch, multi-paned windows). Rare example of stone construction in Dublin, associated with the large farm-estates of the early summer colony, and with well-known writer Levelyn Everett and prominent educator Martin Kilson.

19. <u>History</u>

One of the earliest summer "cottages" on the east side of Dublin, Stonehenge was built c.1889 by Miss Martha Parsons of Milton, Mass., daughter of a wealthy Boston merchant. His death in 1885 left her the beneficiary of a trust and she bought the old "Fenner Farm" that year (Farmhouse torn down c.1965). Stonehenge (probably designed by a Boston architect, as yet unidentified) was the first of a complex of large summer cottages and farm buildings the Parsons family (Martha's mother, sister and brother) built on their extensive land holdings in this area over the next 20 years.

After Martha Parsons' death in 1899, this house was settled upon her young niece and ward Georgianna Hopkins (b. 1880) who later moved to England as the wife of Herbert Musgrave, but retained ownership until 1934. During this period Stonehenge was also used by other members of the family and leased to summer tenants. In 1913 it was part of the British "summer embassy" and occupied by aides to ambassador Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, who had leased the neighboring Parsons mansion "Ty-ny-maes" for himself.

In 1934 a family estate settlement (Martha Parsons' original will had been ambiguous) gave title to Georgianna Hopkins' cousin Jeffrey Parsons. Four years later he sold it to Mr. and Mrs. Timothy M. Spellman, along with the neighboring mansion Ty-ny-maes, which the Spellmans renamed "Five Chimneys." (Ty-ny-maes, locally known as "Tiny May" was torn down c.1965.) Timothy Spellman, a composer, and his wife, a novelist writing under the name Levlyn Everett, used Stonehenge, which they called "High House" as a studio and library. Here they entertained many literary and musical guests before moving to Italy c.1948 leaving their properties in the hands of creditors. Two years later it was bought from a local bank by Frank McKenna, former estate manager for the Spellmans, who in 1953 moved the frame wing downhill nearer the road and converted it to a separate cottage (now his home). Since 1967 Stonehenge has been the summer residence of Martin Kilson, Professor of Political Science and Sociology at Harvard.


18. Description (continued)

Set in secluded hillside clearing, surrounded by woods. Below house to east is deep concrete pool foundation, used once as a reservoir. House's feeling of seclusion is reinforced by steep dirt lane approaching it and the overgrown vines and shrubbery around the house.
