The Warden's House is a two-story brick structure with an attached two-story wing on the east. It is located on the southwest corner of the block bounded by Laurel, North 7th, Main and North 8th Streets. It was constructed in 1838-1839 as a portion of the Louisiana State Penitentiary, which was then on the outskirts of Baton Rouge. The structure was built to provide a home for the prison clerk (on the second floor) and serve as the prison store. The wing has served as a kitchen, servants' quarters, and storage space. The building later served as the home of the prison warden.

The main building is a rectangle, with a gable roof. The State prison complex was moved from the city in 1925 and the house was used for a variety of purposes. When it was restored in 1966, the interior plaster was beyond repair, and, as a result, much of the notched and pegged interior framework has been exposed. The Classical Revival structure is of load bearing brick wall construction with floors, joists, interior wall framing, and roof systems of native cypress. Interior walls were originally plaster on wood lath.

The exterior brickwork is especially well detailed with running bond offset by soldier course lintels and a continuous corbelled top course under the gutters. The soft mud brick ranges in color from soft red to orange and was made by prisoners. The wall which originally surrounded the property has been shortened to enclose only the courtyard in front of the east wing. The present wood gallery was reconstructed during the recent adaptive restoration to house an architectural firm.

The gable ends of the structure are enclosed with decorative brick parapets. Early chimneys have been removed with the exception of the one on the east wing. All interior fireplaces and mantels have been retained.

Two large double doors provide access to what was the store area. The original doors, provincial in character, have been retained and have large transoms. A single door on the southeast provided access to a large two-story entrance hall with a stair leading to the second floor. The original door is intact, and is exquisitely designed with Classical mouldings, scroll brackets, and early 19th century hardware. The stairway to the second floor has been replaced. First floor windows are 8/8 double hung with transoms matching those of the double entrance doors. Second floor windows are 6/6 double hung with louvered shutters. Turbin-bladed fan-shaped vent remains in the attic.

In the yard the circular brick foundations for the original cistern still exist.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

The Warden's House is the only remaining part of the once extensive State Penitentiary located in what is now the center of Baton Rouge. It is one of the few structures in this area with Classical Revival detailing and styling.

The prison complex across the street from the Warden's House covered an area approximately 317' x 714' bounded by what are now called Laurel, 7th, Florida and 9th Streets. The property on which the Warden's House stands (7th and Laurel) was acquired by the State of Louisiana in 1837 by Act 105 of the Louisiana Legislature, and \$15,000 was appropriated for the building. Construction was begun in 1838 and completed in 1839. The structure served as the prison store and the residence for prison In 1906, Act 189 authorized the sale of the penitentiary grounds with the proceeds going toward "construction of buildings, purchase of machinery and other improvements on the state farm." For some time after that, the House continued to serve as a residence for prison officials who remained in Baton Rouge to process prisoners and send them to the new complex in West Feliciana Parish. the building was leased for commercial purposes until Nicholson Post #38 of the American Legion bought it from the state and converted it to a U. S.O. lodge ( It was purchased in 1966 and adaptive restoration began shortly thereafter.

The Classical Revival structure retains its notched and pegged cypress frame, now largely exposed. The existence of the original heart cypress lintels above the doors and windows testifies to the enduring quality of this now scarce species of wood. The structure is characterized by excellent proportioning and detailing of window openings, wood and brick details, and the quality of the design of the main entrance door. There is a considerable similarity between this building and the popular New York styles of the 1840's.
